A Glorious Games Day



s Burntisland basked in glorious sunshine, thousands of visitors and residents converged on the Links to enjoy the spectacle of the 367th Burntisland Highland Games together with the supporting fairground attractions.

The day's proceedings kicked off early with the traditional "Exiles Reception" hosted by the Community Council in the Burgh Chambers. This was an impressive gathering attended by the Provost of Fife, our elected Member of Parliament, Fife Councillors, the summer King and Queen, our present and former Community Award winners and invited guests. Senior Community Councillor Christine Dewar, issued a warm welcome to all present who included former Burntisland residents from Arizona, South Africa, Canada, Australia, England and even Dunfermline! Provost Jim Leishman and Lesley Laird MP also addressed the gathering and both expressed their pleasure and thanks for being invited take part in such an auspicious event.

Following the informal reception which included a sumptuous finger buffet, attendees lined up behind the Burntisland and District Pipe Band (comprising an impressive number of young pipers and drummers), then paraded along the High Street to the arena on the Links, watched by hundreds of spectators who lined the route. At 12 noon precisely, the Honorary Chieftain, Davey Adamson officially opened the games. Throughout the afternoon the enthusiastic spectators enjoyed exciting competition by runners and cyclists on the track, keen rivalry in the traditional heavy events and the more refined spectacle of highland dancing on the stage.

At 3.00 pm a disappointing field of only 8 runners set off in the race over the Binn. In extremely hot conditions the race was won by Ben Potrykus who retained his title in a commendable time.

Throughout the afternoon, huge numbers enjoyed the fun of the fair and the numerous food and drinks outlets, in particular the ice cream vendors.

Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month, at 7.00 pm in Burntisland's Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Electric vehicle charge points are now installed at the Links car park.
- Cleaning and maintenance of the Links water feature has been inadequate and it has been reported to Fife Council.
- There is a proposal to set up a new Paths Group to identify, map and improve local paths. The group would have charitable status. Interested people are invited to contact Anne Smith or the Secretary of the Community Council.
- Steps are in hand to review and update the Community Action Plan, so that groups who use it to secure funding can accurately identify the current priorities. The Toll Community Centre, Burntisland Community Development Trust and Central Burntisland Tenants and Residents Association are among the active participants.
- A meeting with Lesley Laird MP noted that there is no immediate prospect of funding being available to support disabled access on the Northbound side of the railway station. However, longer-term efforts are continuing.
- Better signage and physical barriers seem to be having the desired effect of reducing the number of cars parked on the Links.
- A number of playparks in the town need to be upgraded but there are no plans on the part of Fife Council to do so. Fuller information is being sought on the overall strategy for local playparks. It may need local groups to drive separate projects.
- Anne Smith and Brendan Burns attended a question & answer session with senior managers of ExxonMobil's Fife Ethylene plant at Mossmorran.
- John Bruce reported that an environmental architect will be commissioned to come up with proposals for improving the burn at the Toll Park.
- Some of the Christmas lights at the Links have been vandalised and steps are in hand to repair them. Funding-raising events will continue for future lighting.
- Alex MacDonald and Anne Smith met senior managers of Forth Ports to seek better access to the harbour area when ships are unloading. Whilst it is recognised that safety is paramount, steps had been taken to enable pedestrian access to appropriate areas. A derelict caravan has been removed from the harbour area.
- We continue to challenge Fife Council over their inappropriate use of Common Good funding.
- The business plan for conservation and development of the Burgh Chambers has now been completed and will shortly be made public. It's a critical development for the well-being of the High Street and for the town generally, so we will be inviting interested people to set up an independent trust to take the proposals forward.

ike other areas in Fife, Burntisland experiences antisocial behaviour involving youths, especially in the summer months, the majority of which often involves the consumption of alcohol.

The introduction of *Challenge 25* has made it more difficult for those under the age of 18 to buy alcohol themselves however there is still more work needing to be done to combat the widespread practice of proxy purchase. Much of this problem stems from the fact that certain members of the public, and youths themselves, may not actually realise that to either purchase alcohol for, or on behalf of someone under 18, or to ask someone to do so, is a criminal offence.

During the summer months last year we piloted a very successful scheme called "You're Asking for It" in Burntisland which saw a reduction in anti-social behaviour type calls in the town. See www.youreaskingforit.com for more information.

On Friday 7th June 2019 with the support of the entire local licensed off sales premises, we re-launched the campaign in the town to coincide with a launch in Kinghorn. The aims of the campaign remain the same and they are to educate members of the public that it is a criminal offence to:

Buy or attempt to buy alcohol for a young person or to supply alcohol to a young person.

Also to make people under the age of 18 aware that to buy or attempt to buy alcohol is an offence.

The campaign will again run over the summer months and due to the penalties that can be incurred on conviction in court (3 months prison sentence and/or £5000 fine) any person found committing any of the aforementioned offences, including those persons under the age of 18, will be reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

As the local Community police officers for Burntisland it is important to us that any kind of anti-social behaviour issues are dealt with and that residents in the town work with us to combat it. This is your town and we rely on you all to help us, the police, deal with it. And, while we don't expect anyone to

patrol areas affected by anti-social behaviour as that is our job, we do ask you all, as always, to report things to us directly on 101 and not via social media. We also ask you all to please respect this campaign and if you are aware of anyone who is involved in proxy purchase to again report it to us either via 101 or directly at the below email addresses.

The summer months tend to see an increase in many people going away on holiday and although break-ins to houses are not commonplace these days we do advise those lucky enough to be going away for any length of time to ensure that their property is secure with alarms and outside lighting fitted and in good working order where possible. Anyone worried about their home security or looking for advice can either look on the Police Scotland website under "Keep Safe" or they can book a free home security survey with the local Community Safety Officer.

We would also advise anyone going away to take care with what they post about their travels on social media sites as this may alert those within the criminal fraternity to vacant properties.

he CBTRA is now looking forward to the summer season and all the extra people that it brings to the town. Burntisland has a lot to offer visitors, whether they be visiting family or are tourists. Without these visitors we may not have our thriving High Street.

Walking hand in hand with the increase in visitors, we see an increase in alcohol related incidents so we applaud the efforts of our local Community Police Officers in re- invigorating the "you're asking for it" campaign. This campaign is aimed at young and old alike who attempt to buy alcohol when they are either not of an age to buy it or are adults buying alcohol for young people. Last year's reduction in mindless, alcohol related vandalism and crime was very noticeable within the boundaries of the TRA. Long may it continue.

We are continuing to work with Fife Council to make our area a better place to live for all residents and I am pleased to announce that we have just achieved our first milestone. "Permit Parking" for the residents of the Kirkgate, Somerville Square

and West Leven Street has been approved by Fife Council, (Kirkcaldy Area Committee), so hopefully in the near future we should see the implementation of this project.

The TRA is continuing to work on behalf of its residents and hopefully, in the not to distant future, a number of planters (working in conjunction with FAB and Fife Council) and new benches will appear in our area.

However, there is an emerging problem. In recent weeks we have seen an increase in fly tipping. It is important that any resident who witnesses anybody leaving rubbish on the streets, reports the offender to the Safer Communities team who will arrange for items to be disposed of and who will investigate who was responsible. It is a criminal offence to fly tip and hefty fines are in place for those caught doing it.

Our next TRA meeting on the second Thursday (8th) in August but if any problems should arise in the meantime the TRA can be contacted via our Facebook page.

The Burntisland Common Good Fund

he previous issue of the Burgh Buzz reported on an audacious decision by Fife Council to help themselves to £100,000 from our Common Good Fund. It was an appalling decision and one which continues to have repercussions. So why does it matter?

The fund has been used in recent years to support a huge variety of local events and organizations, including the Heritage Trust, Sailing Club, two playparks, Civic Week, Christmas lights and many more besides.

The Links is owned by the Common Good Fund, as are other properties in the town. Fife Council pay a nominal rent for their use of the Links, in return for which they take full responsibility for repairs and maintenance, whilst keeping all of the rent from the fairground. They say their action in taking an extra £100,000 from the fund for electrical maintenance was "perfectly lawful". No, it wasn't. This was a change in practice of such magnitude that it easily falls within the legal requirement for consultation.

They also say that their action "...would not compromise the sustainability of the fund". Such financial illiteracy is disturbing. There hasn't been a payment from the Common Good Fund on anything like this scale for 25 years. You can't take £100,000 out of the pot, knowing that the rent from other Common Good properties has diminished, and claim that it will have no effect.

The Community Council have decided unanimously to oppose Fife Council's action and we are pursuing several avenues to that effect.

One is the Scottish Public Services Ombudsman. Their role is to investigate maladministration which has led to a "personal grievance". Whatever the merits of the case may be, the Community Council is not legally a "person" so we have had to adjust our complaint accordingly.

We will also approach Audit Scotland, who oversee the financial management of local authorities. They are certainly open to a complaint from the Community Council and will act on poor financial management, service failures or unlawful spending. There is a further option of separate legal action, given Fife Council's eccentric approach to the legislation.

In the first instance, we have to give Fife Council a final opportunity to take their own corrective action. It's a straightforward decision: they have to acknowledge the existing contractual arrangements and their own management failures, by taking full responsibility for the £100,000 gap in funding.

Given that we are now in the peak holiday period, there is every possibly that changes over the next month or two will be slow. However, our own action will continue throughout that period and will be reported in due course.



art of the inventory of the Burntisland Common Good assets comprise three oil paintings which are currently displayed in the Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Just over a decade ago these paintings were examined by Conservation and Restoration professionals at the request of Kirkcaldy Museum (now Fife Cultural Trust) and Burntisland Heritage Trust. The recommendation was that all of the paintings were in need of restoration.

Unfortunately at that time Burntisland Heritage Trust lacked the resources to proceed with the restoration and conservation project. The trust has now, thanks to a generous donation, the Co-op Locality Fund and the Common Good Fund, secured sufficient funding to take the project forward. This project will restore the common good paintings to their original condition and will retain and possibly enhance the value of these Burntisland Common Good Assets. Importantly, the paintings will be protected and conserved for the benefit of the community, visitors to the town and future generations.

Two of the paintings are by Andrew Young (1854 - 1925) who was a professional photographer who lived and worked in Burntisland. He was a distinguished artist and eleven of his paintings all belonging to the Burntisland Common Good now hang in the Burgh Chambers.

Andrew Young's most well-known oil paintings are 'The Bridge of Life' and 'The Magistrates' Seat' and it is these paintings which are in need of restoration. The Bridge of Life painting depicts 85 characters who all lived in Burntisland at

the time the painting was completed in 1923. A further oil painting by S. Humble is dated 1834. It is one of the oldest paintings of Burntisland in existence and shows a view of the town from the Lammerlaws prior to the arrival of the railway and the extensive development of the harbour.

Burntisland Heritage Trust has in recent years, from a donation and a purchase, added a further 12 Andrew Young paintings to the existing collection in the Burgh Chambers. This collection of 23 paintings comprises a unique and valuable heritage asset to the community.



Museum of Communication

or one of our Exhibition displays for 2019, we thought it would be a good idea to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Ultimate Communication - Man's first landing on the Moon which also ties in nicely with Burntisland Civic Week's chosen theme this year. We've built a 1/50th scale model of the HUGE Saturn V rocket (real height - 363 feet - more than 60 feet taller than the Statue of Liberty) which, when fully fuelled for 'Lift-Off', weighed about the same as 400 elephants. When built, it cost 375,000 dollars - which equates to several billion dollars today.

We've also got a large and fascinating Globe of the Moon itself, (complete with craters), on which we show the Sea of Tranquillity, where 'The Eagle' landed, 50 years ago this month. No Little Green Men alas!!!!.... but we saw plenty of them in Burntisland recently. On that memorable day last month, the Sun shone a wee bit, on the newly crowned Queen. but



when you read the following statistics, you may start to realise why regular sunny days are not too predictable. Here are a few 'Facts and Figures' to make you think.

The SUN is the most important source of life and energy on Earth. It is just an ordinary STAR - like millions of others and is much larger than the Earth. Our Planet would fit inside the Sun over one million times!! It is the centre of our Solar System, and pulls several major planets into orbit round it. After Mercury and Venus, EARTH is the third closest to the Sun, at a distance of about 150 million km - or 93 million miles from it. Even though LIGHT travels at the mind-boggling speed of 186,000 miles per second, it takes about eight and a half minutes for the Sun's light to reach Earth.

Scientists estimate the temperature at the Sun's core to be about 15 million degrees centigrade.



Word Search - Burntisland and the Bible?

he BBC reported that the Folio Society (on behalf of UK Gov.) took a survey of 2,000 British adults asking those polled to choose the most significant book of today's world. Basing this on the books influence on humanity the poll chose the Bible as number one at 37%. This was followed by The Origin of Species (35%), A Brief History of Time (17%), Relativity (15%) and Nineteen-Eighty-Four in fifth place (14%). It should not be surprising that the bible was at the top since it is not only the best-selling book of all times, but it has topped the best seller list year after year.



Below are some interesting facts about the bible...

- The Bible has 66 books that were written by 40 individuals over a period of 1500 years.
- It was written in three languages: Hebrew, Aramaic, and Koine Greek.
- According to Guinness World Records, the Bible is the best-selling book of all time, with an estimated 5 billion copies sold and distributed. Over 100 million copies are printed a year.
- The shortest verse in the bible is John 11:35 'He Wept', referring to Jesus grief for Lazarus.
- It is estimated that Shakespeare alluded to the bible over 1200 times.
- Some well-known phrases taken from the bible include, a wolf in sheep's clothing, am I my brother's keeper, a thorn in the flesh and a leopard cannot change its spots.

Another more local fact is the role Burntisland played regarding the Bible. In May 1601, King James VI of Scotland attended the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland at St Columba's Church in Burntisland, Fife to argue in favour of a new translation of the Bible into English having translated a number of psalms himself. This helped in making the bible accessible to the Englishspeaking population which attributed to many of the above facts.

In light of this St Serf's and the All Souls Churches are inviting people along the Fife Coast to join us starting at the end of August for what is known as **The Bible Course**. The Bible Course is an 8-session course that explores the world's bestseller. Accessible and interactive, it will enhance and inform ones understanding of the Bible, whether you are new to the Bible or want to go deeper. Using a unique storyline, the course shows how the key events, books and characters all fit together. You'll get to see the BIG picture and discover how the Bible applies to your own life.

Whatever the name, it's about all wildlife just as the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) is about "Giving Nature a Home". All nature. To protect birds we have to protect the rest too - insects, mammals, landscapes...

So, hedgehogs. After three-quarters of a year of worrying about no hedgehogs in the garden we've had all of June with two snuffling around most nights. If you haven't heard them, hedgehogs are noisy creatures. Huffs, puffs, sighs and grunts. One particularly distinctive blowing noise, like someone sweeping the patio slabs, was heard by our neighbours through double glazing. I heard the same a few nights later and under the hedge got to watch two hogs - the smaller one backing away from a really large one, the large one making the noises. Possibly courtship, possibly dispute. We hope courtship and that they birth their hoglets in the homemade hog house behind our tumbledown shed.

It's brilliant to have hedgehogs in urban Burntisland as across the UK they're doing very badly, in large part due to loss of habitat. Charity Hedgehog Street has a great website with ideas to help protect from extinction including letting bits of gardens grow long, cutting small access holes at the bottom of fences, putting out food and water, not using pesticides, driving slower on residential streets.



Now birds: Flocks of young starlings have been all over the town. Blue tit and robin and house sparrow chicks are visiting our feeders. After five years of seeing goldfinches in the garden only a few times, usually feasting on dandelion clocks, never on the specially-bought nyger seeds, suddenly we've had two or three every day, eating both the nyger and mixed seed. I often hear them flitting overhead but they never came down, so why are they suddenly dropping in now? A male chaffinch fed with them some days, another species we've almost never had.

House martins are nesting on a few buildings. Swallows I'm not sure if anyone has any at all. Swifts too are worryingly low in number. All three were hammered by extreme weather earlier in 2019 during their migration flights back from Africa. On top of this when they reach us each spring they find fewer and fewer old buildings suitable to nest on. Since 1995 we have lost half of UK swifts and without offering help we'll lose them all. Put up the correct nest boxes to offer places they can raise their young.

Butterflies have been interesting, the final weeks of June bringing many painted lady butterflies blown in by southerly winds. Also I've seen and heard of some red admirals, meadow brown, small whites and a very few small tortoiseshells. A great spot to see all these has been the lush strip of thistles, nettles and other wildflowers between the school fence and the burnside path. Thistles are excellent food for pollinators and of course are our national flower! Another nice place to watch insects is the biodiversity garden at the far east end of platform 2 at Burntisland station.

The Trust Walking Group meets on the first Wednesday of each month, at 10am at the entrance to Craigencalt Farm road. Walks

cover the local area along the coast and inland and last approx 2hours. New walkers are welcome. If you would like further information, contact 01592 891330.



In June the Trust held its annual photo competition which was judged on the evening of our Friends Get-together. To neuter or not to neuter?

his is one of the most common questions at the vets, but the decision is down to you.

If you wish to breed your animals, obviously you won't get them neutered. But if you don't want to breed them, neutering will prevent unwanted pregnancies and reduce the risk of cancer in later life.

Neutering or castration of male dogs is advisable from 6 months of age. He will have less chance of suffering from testicular cancer and prostrate problems as he gets older. Sometimes castration can help with behaviour issues, but not always and it is not a quick fix.

Neutering or spaying of female dogs (bitches) stops them from coming into season. A dog's season can last up to three weeks and she can have one every 6 to 8 months. Your dog does not need to have her first season before she can be spayed. In fact, if you spay her before her first season she will be less likely to develop mammary tumours and she will never have a false pregnancy. If you don't spay, she is more likely to develop

infections of the uterus as she gets older, leading to a very poorly pet and a hefty vets bill.

Castrating male cats can be done at any time as long as they are over 2kg. It can help to prevent territorial marking, fighting and roaming.

Spaying female cats can be done from as early as 4 months.

Typical signs of a female cat (queen) in season are excessive calling, being overly affectionate and rolling on her back. If she is an indoor cat, she will try everything to get outside to find a mate. Spaying massively reduces her risk of mammary and ovarian cancer too.

Animal welfare charities agree: getting your pet neutered is the best thing for your pet. It is expensive, but worth it. A one-off payment with long term benefits—it could save your pets life in later years.






