### The Town Prepares for a Busy Summer

In the optimistic hope that the pandemic will continue to recede, various organisations in the town are making preparations to hold traditional summer events.

The Civic Week Organising Committee has already drawn up an extensive ten day programme of events to take place in June. These will include the crowning of the summer King and Queen in the Parish Church and the associated parade, the shop window competition, numerous sporting and recreational events making full use of the towns natural amenities including the Links, the Beach and even the Binn.

Although some elements of the programme (page 16) have still to be confirmed the organisers are looking forward to a return of full community participation.

The Highland Games Committee are also making preparations to

stage the Games although as we go to print planning permission from Fife Council is still awaited. It is hoped that the Games will be preceded by an Exiles Civic Reception in the Burgh Chambers, organised by the Community Council and attended by returning former residents,, dignitaries and invited guests. This will be followed by a parade to the games arena on the Links for the official opening.

Last but not least will be the Summer Fair itself, an immense visitor attraction featuring a huge variety of stalls and fairground attractions which if permission is granted, should be in situ for some six weeks.

Finally, these events do not just happen on their own but require the assistance of a large band of volunteers. Why not become involved? It can also be fun!

### **Community Council Bullets......**

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month, at 7.00pm in Burntisland's Burgh Chambers. The dates for the next meetings are **13th May and 10th June** (there is no meeting in July).

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last three meetings is set out below. Full minutes can also be found on the Community Council website.

- We have spent the past two years meeting by Zoom in order to ensure continuity of local representation with official bodies. However, we plan to resume in-person meetings in the Burgh Chambers as soon as possible. Appropriate technology might allow us to share those meetings online as well and we are currently investigating the possibilities.
- We're keen to raise awareness of what we do and to hear directly from local people. One option will be to take a stand from time to time at the Big Green Market in the Parish Church Hall, which will be attended by Community Council members.
- We continue to log our concerns with Police Scotland about dangerous parking in the vicinity of the school and also speeding along Kinghorn Road and elsewhere. Plans are in hand to set up a working group to develop options for action.
- Over 400 saplings have now been planted at 10 sites, as part of the Queen's Green Canopy initiative. We're grateful to school pupils, youth groups and individual adult volunteers who all helped to make the project a success. The saplings have been located to strike the right balance between open space and attractive landscape as the trees mature.
- We anticipate hosting the annual Exiles Reception in the Burgh Chambers on Games Day. However, one effect of the pandemic has been that we have lost some of the key expertise. So we are actively seeking volunteers to help make the event a success, not just on the day but in the essential preparation as well.
- We are in touch with the Showmen's Guild about plans for the summer fair this year. We gave feedback to Fife Council on how the fair went last year and we have shared that with the Guild. We are keen to ensure that nothing is overlooked in the planning, so that clear responsibilities are allocated and actioned well in advance.
- The hugely popular water feature on the Links is rapidly approaching its end of life. Unfortunately, the cost of replacing it is huge. So we are in discussion with Fife Council about options and sources of funding. We are very keen to prolong its life and ensure that any replacement is both durable and of high quality.
- Planning for Christmas lights remains a key issue. There are opportunities
  to extend and revitalise the lights, but only if we have more people
  coming forward who are willing to join the working group.
- We welcome support for all of the above and enquiries or offers of help should please be made to our Secretary or Chairman.

### Top Up at the Tap!

Scottish Water has installed a new water fountain in the town, situated on Links Place near the public toilets. A launch event for the Top Up Tap recently took place, with free refillable water bottles being handed out, part of a drive to help reduce single-use plastic waste.

More than 60 taps have now been installed at sites across Scotland including harbours, beaches, national parks, botanical gardens and other top tourist attractions.

### Community Award Presentation

This year for the first time, two distinct awards were made by the Community Council, one for an individual and one for a group.

Chairman Alex MacDonald visited the Parish Church halls on a Sunday afternoon in March to make the presentation, as the traditional civic reception in the Burgh Chambers could not take place because of Covid restrictions.



Alex explained how the Community Award was first presented in 1981, to recognise those who did something special or stood out in the community, and helped to make the town a better place.



The individual award went to Luke Drummond, chosen as he had been superbly helpful to BEAT and those in need with deliveries and repairs during the height of the pandemic. Luke received a personalised certificate and a coat of arms pin badge, along with the annual Community Award shield.

The group award was made to Burntisland & District Pipe Band—taking time out of their band practice for the ceremony—with a new shield presented to the group. Previous winners of the individual award included Jim Forbes and Walter Anderson from the Pipe Band.

Alex remarked on how the band had been visible in the hardest of times, creative when unable to practice together in person, and entertaining those who were housebound around the town. while continuing to bring young pipers and drummers into the musical community,

## Burgh Buzz — The Way Forward ???

The Burgh Buzz, originally the brainwave of the Community Council and pioneered by Andy Wight Boycott, has kept the Burntisland community informed of local issues for over 20 years. The current team, which has editorial and financial independence, has just completed its 50th issue.

However, several members of the team have attained a "level of maturity" which has persuaded them that the time is approaching when they should hand over the reins to younger minds. The positions which are becoming vacant will be those of Editor and Distribution Coordinator.

**The Editor** has overall responsibility for the publication of the Buzz which includes frequent contact with regular contributors including the Community Council, supervision and vetting of all content, preparing the original draft, liaison with the printer, financial control and overall direction of the editorial team and must be computer literate.

**The Distribution Coordinator** is a very important member of the team whose responsibilities include maintaining an up-to-date record of the contact details of the large posse of volunteer deliverers, alerting them as to the arrival time of each issue, taking receipt of some 3,700 copies and packaging them in bundles and arranging distribution to individual deliverers. A requirement to personally deliver a limited number inevitably arises with each issue.

The current incumbents would prefer a smooth handover to prevent any suspension of publication but personal circumstances dictate that the last Buzz to be published under the existing team is likely to be the autumn issue in November this year.

It must be emphasised that these positions are purely voluntary with no financial reward.

Finally, I can say sincerely that my 12 years as editor has been a continuous pleasure — constantly meeting new and interesting individuals and being able to keep abreast with developments in the town where I was born and in which I was brought up. I am confident my successor will have a similar experience.

I look forward to hearing from anyone who may be interested in taking over the reins.

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### The Queen's Green Canopy – planting update

Further to the article in the February issue of the Buzz, the community planting of the 420 free tree saplings from the Woodland Trust is now complete.

Originally, six areas around Burntisland were under consideration for planting. In the end, after consultation, ten areas were planted, eight of these on land owned by Fife Council. In February, Fife Council withdrew planting permission at the Red Pond due to concerns about disturbing the red mud waste under the soil cap there. Therefore, five additional alternative sites had to be found to accommodate all the saplings that had been ordered.

In addition to giving landowner permissions, Fife Council also provided planting support.

The idea was not to plant a community woodland, but to provide copses and small groups of trees all over the town. The 'baby trees' are the Woodland Trust 'Year-round colour' pack of small to medium sized native trees and were grown locally in East Lothian. As well as helping combat climate change, and providing homes for nature, these should provide attractive blossom, berries, leaves or stems to add amenity value to our local green spaces.

Over two weeks in March, groups of neighbours, volunteers from local community groups, three classes of P7 pupils from our school, Rainbows and Brownies, Scouts and Cubs, and ad-hoc volunteers from toddlers to nonagenarians all turned up to help plant trees. Much fun was had, with several people disappointed that it was all over so quickly. The best bit was seeing the wee sapling pop up when the spade was removed and the T-notched sod returned to ground level. Fingers got dirty, worms were spotted, canes were pushed home, and fiddly recycled plastic spiral tree guards were carefully applied. Care was taken to keep planting well clear of paths and property boundaries and the saplings are spaced out about 2.5m apart. The worst bit was picking up all the dog poo before the children arrived to plant at Meadowfield and Piper Crescent park. Sadly, it only takes one or two inconsiderate dog owners to spoil an area for other walkers and playing children.

If you are fortunate enough to live near or walk past any of the planting areas, please look after your new trees. You don't have



to do anything – they're quite tough and shouldn't need watered. They'll take 8 to 10 years to grow into 6 feet trees, and even longer to fully mature. Landowners remain responsible for them and any future maintenance. However, if you spot any issues in the next couple of years, do let us know.

If you want to plant trees anywhere other than your own garden, please ensure that you have the landowner's permission and source your saplings responsibly.

On behalf of Burntisland Community Council, I'd like to thank all the volunteers who helped with the planting. I've already conveyed thanks to the Fife Council staff involved, especially Derek and his team from the Grounds Maintenance Service.

It takes hope and optimism to plant trees. That's why the Queen chose tree planting to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee – it's an investment and living legacy for future generations. Burntisland is now part of the Queen's Green Canopy of growing trees all over the UK.

### G Walter Anderson

(25/7/1934 - 3/3/2022)

On the early afternoon of 17th March, the Erskine Church was full to capacity with mourners attending the funeral service of Walter Anderson, a gentleman who had contributed so much to the local community throughout his almost 50 years residence in the town.

Walter enjoyed a successful career in education in which he rose to Principal Educational Psychologist in Fife. However, in Burntisland, he had always been recognised for the active role which he played in a wide range of local activities. Indeed, in 2015 he received the Burntisland Community Award in recognition of his huge contribution locally over the years.

Walter's principal passion was piping and he led the Burntisland & District Pipe Band as Pipe Major for a record number of years. He passed on his piping skills to countless youngsters and adults. Walter possessed an industrious and caring nature and was a founder member and first President of the Burntisland and Kinghorn Rotary Club. He also served as an elder of the Erskine Church for forty years, five of them as session clerk.

Walter was a leading light in the drive to replace the old swimming pool as Chairman of BLAST, the organisation which eventually persuaded Fife Council to honour its pledge and



construct the Beacon Leisure Centre. For over 10 years he was the Burntisland representative of the Earl Haig Fund Scotland and organised the annual poppy collection.

During the funeral service Walter's two daughters, Julie and Elaine, delivered emotional tributes to their father's memory which reflected how, although a devoted family man, he also selflessly dedicated his time and efforts towards making Burntisland a more pleasant environment and community to reside in.

May he rest in peace.

### **Burntisland Primary School**

This term, **Primary 1** have continued to learn their phonics and have enjoyed writing creative castle stories based on their topic, Fairyland.

In Numeracy, P1 have been focusing on place value, time, measuring, as well as adding and subtracting. Wow, they have been very busy! For Health and Wellbeing, the primary ones have been developing their understanding of Emotion Works and have been discussing each of the Emotion Works cogs. Primary One have also learned some French. This term, the primary ones have been extremely lucky as they received a visit from a very friendly dragon which they absolutely loved!

**Primary 2** have been super excited about their topic this term – Space. They loved learning about the different planets, reading about Space and writing adventurous stories.

In Numeracy and Maths, they have developed their understanding of multiplying numbers and how to tell the time. In addition to this, P2 have been wowing their teachers throughout their gymnastics lessons. Also, in Health and Wellbeing, Mrs Moffat's class has been learning strategies to help them stay calm while Mrs Cooney's class has been considering the importance of having a growth mindset rather than a fixed mindset.

**Primary 3** have been doing an abundance of fun learning activities relating to their topic of Rainforests and saving the planet.

In Numeracy, they have been working on learning different division strategies and solving calculations.. Primary 3 have also had fun reading Charlotte's Web and learning all about Charlotte's friends on the farm.

In art, Primary 3 have been taking inspiration from the seasons and have used Spring as a theme to their work. They have also created their own self-portraits. Learning has been getting exciting in

Science as classes learned about substances that dissolve and those that don't. Finally, in French, everyone has worked hard to learn numbers and months of the year.

**Primary 4** have been heads down working on an array of exciting topics this term. In Maths, they have been developing their understanding of analogue and digital clocks as well as investigating weight and capacity.

In Literacy, children have enjoyed writing their own newspaper in our Creative Writing topic where they focused on summarising events. As you can tell, Primary 4 have been very busy but there is more! Their main topic this term has been the Vikings and they even made their own Viking coins. How cool is that? Also, in art, Primary 4 have focused on the works of Picasso and Edward Paley. Primary 4 have also been developing their musical talents by learning the recorder.

Last but not least, in P.E., the children have focused on netball, basketball and even Scottish Country Dancing. Great work Primary 4!

**Primary 5** have been working hard in all areas of the curriculum. In Numeracy, P5 have worked hard to develop their understanding of division and the many different strategies that can be used to solve these calculations.

P5 have also enjoyed a writing project in which they have learned about different literary techniques and developed their Alien stories over the weeks. We know their finished stories will be fantastic! This term, their topic has been Space where they have learned about things such as the Solar system and dwarf planets.

**Primary 6** have been working super hard to accomplish and achieve their goals in Maths and Numeracy. They have been learning things such as: time with digital and analogue clocks. As well as this, they

have also explored 3D shapes like spheres, cubes and many more.

Recently, they have also developed their understanding of Information Handling, where they have discovered many different types of graphs. In Literacy, P6 have worked hard to develop the skills covered in Task Mats relating to their class novel, Running Wild. This is also linked to their topic which is Natural Disasters. For ICT (technology), P6 have continued with their Coding project and have been learning how to code simple games and move characters around in their in-game worlds.

Primary 7 have started thinking about the next step on our learning journey, and our move to High School. At the end of February, we had our first transition event at Burntisland Beach and on the Links. This was a fantastic opportunity for us to start to build relationships with children from other Cluster schools who will be starting High School with us in August. To finish this term, we have a very exciting transition day planned at Beveridge Park which we are all looking forward to. In Literacy, we have been reading the novel, Oranges in No Mans Land. This novel has supported our Literacy work this term, where we have continued to develop our understanding of how to answer a variety of questions relating to a text. We have also enjoyed letting our imaginations run wild with our Creative Writing topic, and have worked hard to learn new techniques to develop our writing further.

In Numeracy, we have covered many topics this term, including area and perimeter and fractions. We are all now looking forward to a well-earned rest over the Easter break and are looking forward to our final term at Burntisland Primary School.

We believe this will help parents and childcare providers dropping off and picking up other children at the school.

All the children are now very settled into playgroup and our routines. We are still following all Covid guidance and thankfully we are now allowed to have parents into the building so some normality is resuming. We will be able to have stay and plays and in person parent interviews. Such small things, but they mean so much to us as staff and to parents. All the children have formed lovely, strong friendships and I am sure these friendships will continue for many years to come.



In the last term we have been following the children's interests which have been many. Our main focus has been on colours with lots of colour mixing experiments and opportunities to create art on different surfaces and materials. This resulted in decorations and we helped to decorate the Toll Centre office for Easter. The children loved popping out the hall to visit and view their decorations.

The children have loved being in the garden in all weathers and helped the staff dig out and move two tractor tyres to create new areas. They now have a digging

tyre and a tyre in place where we offer "loose parts." So far this has been a hot tub, swimming pool and castle! The children are also helping us with ideas to redevelop the garden. This has taken longer than we would like however since the planning permission is through for our "hub" in the garden then we can really begin with planning what the children would like in the garden.



The summer term will be filled with many more learning opportunities. We will resume our beach and wood visits which are always our favourite days. #### **Burntisland Harbour Access Trust**

Our applications to register a community interest in the land at the East Dock are now going through the system. Some of the key points are:

- The town and the harbour together constitute Burntisland: the harbour is the town's most defining cultural and heritage asset
- The East Dock is a major element of the town's coastal continuum
- In terms of community use and access the East Dock is of fundamental importance to the town and the broader community
- Community ownership would bring largely redundant, vacant land back into beneficial use from social, environmental and economic perspectives.

Based on suggestions from the townspeople and some consultation with harbour users, tenants and others, we've come up with a whole raft of possible integrated proposals for how the harbour and land could be used whilst retaining existing port activities:

- all weather diving facility,
- decommissioning of caustic tank,
- nature reserve,
- campervan/ camping/ eco-pods, with showers and toilet block also available to fisherman,
- fishing tackle depository,
- Fife Coastal Path loop with on demand bridge,
- heritage museum,
- all tides boat slip,
- extension of artists quarter,
- community owned affordable housing,
- bar-b-que area for all,
- improved access,
- floating restaurant,
- Shank's Pier Boat Reserve,
- bad weather haven for boats,

- improved safety measures,
- removal of security fencing!
- enhanced facilities for north side including electricity points for ships allowing for docking without generators / engines running,
- renewable energy.

These are just some initial ideas as required for the purposes of our application, but would be the subject of widespread consultation and ultimate approval of the BHAT membership. So why not join and have your say? Application forms are available on our website (see below).

If we were to exercise a right to buy, there would be yet another ballot of all those on the town's electoral roll to demonstrate support for our acquisition.

Most of the land is owned by Forth Ports, the remainder being in the hands of Network Rail and Fife Council. Forth Ports' backroom boys are pretty good at dressing an argument up to make it appear at first sight convincing, but like the statement supporting their application for permission to erect the fence, on closer examination there's little of substance.

Their principal claim is that the land is excluded from the legislation, but having gone through the small print we're convinced that it isn't and our view is supported by a legal expert.

They trot out the old health and safety arguments, which we've already debunked. One of their more outlandish claims is that "parts of the Port were regularly used as a rally track by youngsters in cars and for drag races at the weekend". How odd that local residents have never noticed!

They reckon that they "will continue to engage with BHAT and the wider Burntisland community" (we've heard nothing from them)! We've highlighted the absence of any meaningful consultation, during which they have excluded the community of Burntisland from the harbour for the first time in living memory.

They say it couldn't possibly work, that it wouldn't be in the public interest, but we've pointed out that there are numerous examples of harbours around Scotland operated by non-profit distributing Harbour Trusts and in alternative forms of community ownership.

We've made the point that the harbour is a pale shadow of its former self, with the handling of goods at its lowest in over a century, and that most of it has been vacant and non-operational for over 30 years. We've demonstrated how we could deliver genuine and sustainable community development.

It's now up to the Ministers to make the decision. It's due by 19th April. Let's hope that we get justice this time – it's long overdue. If we're successful with these three applications, we will have first refusal should the land ever come up for sale. In advance of that eventuality though, we'll be exploring legislation that came into force in 2018 giving community bodies "a right to compulsorily purchase land which is wholly or mainly, abandoned or neglected....". This provision can give applicants the right to force a sale to them.

In other news, our fund-raising concert at the bowling club was a great success, bringing in £460. Thanks to the generosity of a number of businesses and individuals we also raised £248 for the Ukraine DEC Humanitarian Appeal. Many thanks to the bowling club, the performers and all those who contributed.

By the time you read this we should have had a decision from the Scottish Ministers. Regardless of the outcome BHAT will be looking for ways to ensure community access to our East Dock.

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### **Museum of Communication**

### New exhibition for 2022 celebrating 100 years of broadcasting

After the two year enforced closure of the Burntisland based museum, the volunteers there are planning to open a new public exhibition from May. The exhibition will mark an important anniversary in the history of radio and TV broadcasting.

In 2022, British broadcasting has entered its centenary year, marking both 100 years since the first experimental scheduled broadcasts were made in the UK and the start of the BBC - the world's oldest national broadcaster. The Museum's 2022 exhibition will be in the building located at 131 High Street.

The exhibition will feature a 100 year Broadcasting timeline running from 1922 to 2022 highlighting famous radio and TV programmes and events illustrated by items from our collection-crystal set radios, valve wirelesses to TV cameras, recalling the great moments in broadcasting history, events of the day and other memorabilia. Hopefully, we can set up a broadcast demonstration for young people to enjoy and illustrate some of the technical aspects of the history of broadcasting.

We also want to show how broadcasting has evolved into today's world of on-line streaming, smart phones and HDTV. There will be an additional exhibit covering Royal Broadcasting in the Queen's Platinum Jubilee year.

Alongside this exhibition is another which examines how the advancement in communications and communications equipment has affected health (both positive and negative) over the years. The exhibition showcases objects important to communications and medical history alongside beautifully crafted work by children from P4 of Burntisland Primary School. Following activities in which the children learnt about the telegraph and morse code, two P4 classes created their own articulated hand models which are now on display in the museum for all to see.

Everyone will be welcome to come in to see the exhibition normally on Wednesdays and Saturdays over May to September.

Then on 14 November 1922, Arthur Burrows launched Britain's first national radio broadcasting service from Marconi House in London

Speaking with an authoritative voice, he opened the transmission at 6pm with the words: "This is 2LO, Marconi House, London calling".

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### St Joseph's Church

I am writing this, having just returned from the Palm Sunday Walk of Witness, grateful that we were able to make this public act of witness this year, for the attendance of so many and for the co-operation and friendship between our local Churches.

When we stopped here at St Joseph's, I invited people to reflect that, as we carry our cross through the streets of Burntisland, other people were journeying, holding in their arms not a cross, but their children, their pets and what possessions they could gather together. Innocent people whose lives and homes and homeland are under attack, who have lost so much — people now forcibly displaced, refugees in search of safety and shelter.

And we reflected that Joseph and Mary knew the pain of being refugees, having to flee to Egypt for safety with the child Jesus, seeking to escape from the murderous intentions of King Herod. Before he had learned to walk and talk Jesus was a homeless



refugee with a price on his head.

So we prayed for all who were carrying their crosses at this time, not just in Ukraine, but all suffering the consequences of war, disease, hunger and climate change. And we remembered all those, like St Joseph,

trying to protect their families in the face of danger.

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While we cannot remove the crosses placed on others we can help carry them, and do what we can. Here in St Joseph's at the beginning of March we responded to an appeal for clothing, shoes, medicines, blankets, sleeping bags, to be taken by lorry to Poland. We were completely overwhelmed with the donations people brought and in fact, sadly, had to turn people away. Thank you to all who brought donations, and apologies to those left disappointed. These items were delivered to Caritas International in Warsaw and distributed from there. The greatest need now is for financial donations, and people have been exceptionally generous to the many appeals.

Looking ahead, we have a few weddings to come and a good number of Baptisms arranged, as well as celebrating First Holy Communion for ten of our younger parishioners. On Saturday 21st May there will be a Plant and Bake sale in the Church Piazza (in the hall if the weather is inclement), 2.00pm-4.00pm. The Knit and Knatter group meets in the Hall on a Wednesday morning, 10.30am-12 noon, and would warmly welcome anyone who would like to come along.

### **Burntisland Parish Church**



This is the banner that has been hanging outside the Parish church hall over Easter. I know that Easter has come and gone and we are left with the memories of the uplifting Churches Together Walk around the churches in Burntisland on Palm Sunday; the Hunger Meal and Communion service on Maundy Thursday in the Parish church hall; the Good Friday service in Erskine Church: the early Easter morning services on top of the Binn and on the beach; the memorable shared Easter Day service between Burntisland, Erskine and Kinghorn churches in the Parish church on Easter Sunday. The BEK (Burntisland, Erskine and Kinghorn) churches signed a Covenant on Easter Sunday to work more closely together to serve our communities which gives hope for the future.

The Easter banner talks about HOPE, and I wonder how you would define hope? The English Dictionary defines hope (noun) as "a feeling that what is wanted will happen".

Does that seem optimistic or even wishful thinking? And yet, hope is believing that there is always something better, however difficult the circumstances, and because of that belief, we will not give up. For the people of Ukraine, the hope is that there will be an end to the illegal Russian invasion, that they will survive and be able to return home in safety. Hope is that tiny light in the darkness, which is kept alive by the huge humanitarian effort, the incredible hospitality offered by countries bordering Ukraine and practical support from worldwide leaders, including the UK. My hope is that the 'Homes for Ukraine' UK sponsorship scheme process will be expedited more quickly!

Christian hope is based on what happened 2,000 years ago, early on that very first Easter day. A few days before, Jesus was publicly executed on a Roman cross (an agonisingly painful death), a fact that is recorded in historical records. The long hoped for Messiah had been crucified along with thieves and criminals. It looked like all hope was gone for his family and followers, some of whom had watched him die and some had run away fearing they were next.

Death could not contain Jesus and the discovery of the missing body from the

tomb was made by the women who had come to anoint his body. Nobody expected what happened next and the eyewitness accounts of encounters with the risen Jesus are recorded in the Bible. First a few friends, then more and later around 500 people encountered the risen Christ. Hope is centred on the discovery that the same God, who came in love to this world for all of us, is the same one who died and rose again and who lives and walks beside us during the joys and challenges of our own lives.

This hope does not answer all the questions in the face of the horror of war or the shock of one European country invading another. Instead, this Easter hope has the potential to transform our context and understanding for the present and the future.

But there's more. The 3 BEK (Burntisland, Erskine & Kinghorn) churches signed a covenant partnership agreement during a special morning service in Burntisland Parish at 11am on Easter Sunday (see photo). It's been over two years in the



making, we hope to engage more with our local communities by working closely together.

We know that it's not difficult to make promises, perhaps it's even easier to write them down. But our genuinely shared belief is that it makes a lot of sense to pool our resources and try to make a difference. Please look out for our special events and services under the BEK banner. Watch this space as this new and exciting arrangement slowly begins to take shape.

Jesus' death and resurrection are at the heart of the Christian message, these events have had a huge impact on our history. The story reminds us that there's always hope beyond suffering. Jesus says, "Don't be faithless any longer. Believe! You believe because you have seen me. Blessed are those who believe without seeing me" (John 20.27 and 29, NLT).

Beyond Easter, spring moves imperceptibly into summer with the prospect of longer, warmer days. Upcoming events will include a joint Christian Aid coffee morning, the week itself runs from 15th-21st May. More details will be provided soon, keep an eye out for posters around the town and posts on our Facebook pages.

at the Parish Church; an indication of the friendship and collaboration between the Burntisland churches.

It is good to see that the church garden is full of the daffodils we planted after the harvest service last year. The shape and purpose of the garden is changing. The walkers included clergy and congregation members from the Parish Church, the Erskine Church, St Joseph's Roman Catholic Church, St Serf's Scottish Episcopal Church, and the Salvation Army.



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
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It's Spring! Chiffchaffs are always the first arriving migrants I look out for and this year I found my first near Kinghorn Loch on 11th March. I say look out for but I mean listen out for. Once you learn a bird's songs and calls you start to notice it much more than you ever had before, in fact very often sightings come from hearing the sound then looking up/across/out and spotting the bird. I know I've said it often before but Chiffchaff really is one of the easiest to learn. It sings its name. "Chiff chiff chaff, chiff chaff, chiff chiff chaff...". Listen to it on citizen science website www.xeno-canto.org then go out and try to find it, especially from the end of March, through April and maybe into earlyish May. They sing all over Burntisland: at the station directly outside my studio; in the taller trees between station and West Leven Street houses; all around Broomhill hill and viewpoint; in the woods around the Castle; along the coastal path by Alcan; the slopes of the Binn; the golf course.

A month or so later Willow Warblers arrive from Africa too - almost identical in look but completely different in sound. I heard my first this year on 12th April. A lovely soft descending song a bit similar to but much more musical than the Chaffinch's downwards tumble. Willow Warblers sing at places around the town too, though not I think in as large numbers as Chiffchaffs. The other day I filmed a Willow Warbler singing beautifully between Calypso and Scott Pallets, while I tried (unsuccessfully) not to be totally depressed at how much more bird song was there last Spring before the destruction of most of that brilliant patch of mature hedgerow and maturing woodland.

And a third warbler species you may manage to hear and see locally - the Blackcap. Blackcaps are easy to identify by sight – small, delicate, all grey apart from a black cap on the male and a brown cap on the female – but I find them much harder

to identify by song. Again, give it a listen on Xeno canto. The first I was told of in Burntisland this year was on 15th April but it's known that as our world warms Blackcaps are increasingly overwinter with us rather than migrating south. On 3rd December 2020 a male was spotted on a bird feeder in Burntisland.

I really enjoy these details. Looking into the lives of wildlife. I love to take note of all bird species on a walk, in a garden, from a window, from a train, from a bus. I upload the info on the BTO's (British Trust for Ornithology) free BirdTrack app. Not only are you aiding conservation but you have a handy digital record there on your phone and computer for whenever you should need it.

On 24th March, over a period of a little over two hours I wandered and sat and wandered my way through a square kilometre or so around the Binn Pond.

I used BirdTrack looking back at now can tell you I saw or/and heard Blackbird, Blue Tit, Buzzard, Carrion Crow, Chaffinch, Chiffchaff, Coot, Dunnock, Goldcrest, Great Tit, Grey Wagtail, Herring Gull, Jackdaw, Little Grebe, Long-tailed Tit, Magpie, Mistle Thrush, Moorhen, Pheasant, Robin, Skylark, Sparrowhawk, Teal, Treecreeper, Woodpigeon, Wren, Yellowhammer.

That's 27 species (and I reckon at least half I noticed by ear rather than by eye). Why don't you give it a go?

Another thing – new trees! We have a number of new tall Lime trees filling the gaps along the edge of the Links and now also around 400 new small 'bare-root whips' planted around the town as part of the Queen's Green Canopy. It is massively exciting to see small leaves already visible on lots of these and to imagine how they will look in 2, 5, 10, 20 years. New habitat for Willow Warblers! Community Council, Fife Council, local children, adults, and most especially Anne Smith, must be thanked for doing something so positive for our community and future.

Do you have a space where you could plant a tree or few? Do you have a fence you could plant a hedge alongside? Join the **Burntisland Wildlife and Woodlands** group on Facebook and ask for ideas. It would be especially inspiring to see more and more front gardens being used as nature spaces – making lives richer and happier as we walk to school, to work, to the shops, to the shore.





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### **Craigencalt Rural Community Trust**

There is a definite feeling that we are getting back to normal now. Every year we put barley straw out on rafts in Kinghorn Loch to keep the water free of algal blooms. The straw went out on a glorious sunny day in March, making the workday a pleasure. There was plenty of help from the loch user groups, and the wildlife quickly settled to chose the best spots for nesting, swans taking priority. Some ducks have already had their first broods, a healthy sign of spring regeneration.



The first event on the loch was held recently by the Coastal Rowers, which was a big success. We will be holding a 'Come and Try' day on 7th May, between 1 – 4pm. This is a great way to try out a new sports activity and there are experienced people on hand to advise and help. Other groups are returning to club regattas during the summer.

Our Walking Group has enjoyed two lovely flower walks, a trip to Balbirnie woodland to see the snowdrops in February and a walk around Craigencalt in March to check out the daffodils in full bloom. In May, we will be visiting Lochore Meadows to see the bluebells and a visit to Glassmount House in summer, to view the gardens. Take a stroll around Craigencalt at any time of the year and you are sure to see a big variety of wild flowers in hedgerows and woodlands.

We were pleased to announce the return of the Spring Walking Festival. This was the seventh festival, and the event is always popular. It is a good way to shake off the winter blues and step out to enjoy some fresh air and improve fitness. There has been a great atmosphere, meeting new folk and taking in the beautiful scenery.



The walks cover a wide range, with something for everyone, longer treks for those who like a challenge. Interest walks that go at a more leisurely pace, and family walks, with storytelling at the troll bridge on Rodanbraes. We are so fortunate in this part of Fife to have such good transport links and, even better, great coastline and inland scenery.



When the summer growth takes off, it will be time to trim back paths to keep them open for walkers. 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
