New Primary School For the Toll Park

F ife Council has decided that the old and crumbling Burntisland Primary School in Ferguson Place will be replaced by a newly built structure on the Toll Park. All going well, the new facility should be ready for occupation at the start of the autumn term in 2014. This was not the first choice of the majority of respondents to the Buzz survey last year. However, townsfolk may still have a say in the content and design of the new facility through Education and Planning consultations provisionally set for late September, and through a Local Development Group specifically set up for that purpose.

Existing recreational space will be absorbed by this development, but could be replaced in part by artificial grass facilities at the Beacon Centre.

The editorial on page 2 and articles on pages 5 & 6 may encourage you to voice your opinion.

Haugh Road Flooding -"Scottish Water" Responds

ollowing a recent meeting with Fife Councillors, Scottish Water has set out its position in an article to the Buzz (Page 6).

Regrettably, because current policy focuses on internal flooding, a permanent solution is not imminent. However, the company has taken steps to improve the efficiency of the pumping operation and have given assurances that they will respond immediately to any reports of future flooding. Additionally, such reports will be accurately recorded so that the Haugh Road problem may be given an appropriate priority should external flooding be accorded precedence in the new investment period commencing in 2015.

Although the current situation remains far from satisfactory, your elected councillors should be congratulated for continuing to pressure Scottish Water into dealing with this continuing problem.

Editorial Comment.

Pollowing the excellent inspection report earlier this year, the Deputy Head of Burntisland Primary School, in her article, gives a comprehensive account of how the pupils and staff are striving to contribute to and learn from the community. These activities should be considered in the context of the commendable results achieved in complying with the traditional curriculum. It poses the question "What could be achieved in premises fit for purpose?"

The decision has been taken to provide a new school on the Toll Park. There are conflicting views as to the manner in which this decision was arrived at and still there could be an opportunity, during the forthcoming consultation exercises, to press for a rethink. But could forcing further delay in the project prove counter productive? In the Councillors' report (page 5), a shortfall in the budget for the Burntisland plans has been able to take advantage of "slippage" in other projects. In the prevailing, very tight, financial climate, could further delay see the allocated funds siphoned off to educational projects elsewhere in Fife?

The Buzz is of the view that the decision should be accepted; the community should unite to ensure that the best facilities possible should be included in the new-build school - not only for the pupils during school-time, but also to be shared by members of the community, possibly in partnership with the many groups which currently make use of the Toll Centre. The best practice of several excellent examples of community school partnerships could well be adopted. Whatever you may feel on this issue - make your views known. Otherwise, you will have to take what you get!

A partially related issue is the plan by the Sports Group to provide artificial sports pitches adjacent to the Beacon Centre. Partial Fife Council funding has already been allocated to this project. The provision of these facilities could go far towards compensating the town for the loss of green space at the Toll Park. We must ensure that these previously allocated funds are not diverted to the shortfall in the new school budget.

And a slight diversion - the assertion in "the councillors' article" that the Common Good Fund may benefit from the Toll Park being designated common good land is ironic. Should this come to pass, you can be take comfort from the fact that the Toll Park sacrifice has not been wasted - the Common Good Fund was plundered by Fife Council to pay for a substantial proportion of the considerable expense incurred in removing and reinstalling the town clock mechanism - following the Council's own faux pas!

Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend and listen to discussion or to raise matters of interest to them. The full minutes of these meetings are displayed in the Library. A summary of issues raised during the last three meetings is set out below.

- Police noted inappropriate driving rather than speeding at the Colinswell roundabout. There
 are likely to be fewer traffic wardens over the summer months. A new Dog Warden has
 been appointed.
- The increase in charges for the evening use of the Burgh Chambers coincides with a reduced grant from Fife Council. The Chairman and Treasurer will seek a lower rate because of the Common Good ownership and also local management arrangements.
- Burntisland Development Trust has released funds for design and planning work on the War Memorial. All necessary consents will be secured, together with final costs. An application will then be made to the Heritage Lottery Fund for the main project.
- Electronic chimes for the town clock are being installed and will enable chimes to be heard over 24 hours at sound levels which are not open to challenge.
- A review of the furniture in the Council Chamber and other rooms is under way, with a
 view to restoration to a standard which reflects the dignity and community use of the
 building.
- Martin McDonald and Lorraine Simpson have been co-opted as full members of the Community Council. One vacancy remains.
- Scottish Water have agreed an action plan which will help to alleviate the frequent flooding
 and discharge problems at Haugh Road. Funding for a permanent solution will depend on
 the priority given in the next round of capital budgets. Local residents are strongly urged to
 report all instances of flooding at Haugh Road to Scottish Water, so that they have a full
 and accurate record of the extent of the problem.
- Fife Council have re-activated the Compulsory Purchase order in respect of the Palace Cinema site in the High Street, with a view to resolving what has been a long-term eyesore.
- Footpaths leading from Cowdenbeath Road to the Binn have been severely eroded due to
 water damage. However, Fife Council have now cleared blockages at the Binn pond, giving
 a reduced water level and therefore less likelihood of further erosion.
- Two additional brownfield sites are being considered for housing purposes, both near to Grange Road / Kilmundy Drive. Concern was expressed by local residents. The Community Council agreed to support the findings of an earlier public inquiry and seek a reduced housing density in these environmentally-sensitive sites.
- Concern was expressed that Fife Council ruled out the possibility of re-building the primary
 school on the current site, despite expectations that prior consultation would take place with
 the Community Council. A statutory consultation will take place in September, in which
 Fife Council are obliged to respond to all inputs and in which HM Inspectorate of
 Education will review the consultation process. Discussions continue with a view to getting
 the best overall outcome for Burntisland.
- A small group of interested people has been formed to ensure regular watering and maintenance of the various hanging baskets in the vicinity of the High Street.
- ExxonMobil are making changes at Braefoot Bay in order to enable easier management of
 shipping movements. The capacity will increase, but actual movements per year will be
 much the same as now. Consultants AD Little have completed a risk assessment and
 concluded that the resulting change is not significant.



"New - build" School Agreed for Burntisland

The Education & Children's Services Committee of Fife Council which met on 19th May took a major step forward in the process to agree the consultation, design and planning to give Burntisland a school for the 21st century.

This Committee approved the proposal to build a new school at East Toll Park.

Previously, several sites in the town had been considered but this had been narrowed down to the East Toll Park last November. There was no 'ideal' site available in the town but the East Toll Park was considered to have many advantages such

as it's size and central location. It therefore, was selected as the 'preferred' site.

The report that was considered at May's committee meeting looked at three options: the status quo with the current buildings, refurbish and extend the existing buildings or a new build school on the East Toll Park.

The current buildings that house Burntisland Primary School in Ferguson Place date back to 1883. Despite numerous adaptations and renovations and on-going maintenance these buildings are struggling to cope with the rising school population and the demands of a modern curriculum, and would require a huge amount of money to be spent in the coming years, without addressing the main issues of space and suitability.

The option to retain the status quo was examined in detail but it simply cannot offer adequate accommodation, lunch facilities, playground or teaching facilities.

The Education Committee also considered refurbishing and extending the current school buildings. This would create new PE facilities and links between the buildings. However, the cost is almost as much as to build a new school but would not actually address the problems of lack of playground space or additional teaching facilities. Also, there would be no additional space for an increasing school population.

The option, which was agreed by the Committee, is to proceed with the plans and consultation for a new build school on the preferred site. Despite the current difficult financial situation, Fife Council is committed to their new school building programme as one of its priorities. The budget for Burntisland has been able to take advantage of slippage and other projects coming in under budget, and these funds have been allocated to Burntisland. The final financial arrangements will continue to be put in place over the next few months.

The next steps will be a statutory consultation about education provision and the planning process for a new building. A Local Development Group for Burntisland new build project has been established which has representation from all local stakeholders including: Parent Council, After School Club, Playgroup, Community Council, Sports Group, Toll Centre Management and local residents. The remit for this group was defined by the Education & Children's Services Committee and agreed by the group as follows:

- Be a forum for discussing the benefit outcomes and design development of specific school estate projects;
- Provide good communication links amongst Fife Council Services, the design team, construction contractor, school and community representatives, parents, pupils and other users of the facilities;
- Cascade information to stakeholders represented by members of the group;
- Participate in surveys and workshops and other feedback sessions on specific school estate related projects;

Receive reports on the progress of specific school estate related projects.

An outline timeline for the project has also been drawn up:

- Pre Application Notice will be submitted to Development Control for Planning Consent in principle July/Aug 2011;
- Education Consultation will commence on Monday 12th September through to Friday 11th November on the relocation of the school with a public consultation event at a local venue on 28th September (provisional);
- Planning consultation event at a local venue on 28th September (provisional);
- Detailed Planning Application will be made 1st Quarter 2012;
- Construction works commence 1st Ouarter 2013:
- Construction completion 3rd Quarter 2014;

Building occupancy for the start of the new school term in August 2014.

The additional information that the land selected as the preferred site, East Toll Park, may be re-designated as Common Good, could mean further good news for Burntisland: if this is the case, then an independent valuation will determine the value and the level of the payment to Burntisland Common Good Fund. This would add to the funds available for local groups to use for community benefit for many years to come.

"A brand new building will address all the problems with the existing building and provide facilities to deliver a relevant and modern curriculum. Children in Burntisland deserve the best facilities we can provide for them and this is what they will get with the decision to go out to consultation on the new build option. This is a building for the 21^{st} Century, we owe it to future generations to create a building that can deliver a modern curriculum and modern facilities that take account of the latest energy efficient building and heating systems. It is our duty to provide the best possible opportunities for the next generation, and generations to come, and we are glad that this decision means that we can fulfil that duty."

New School - An Alternative View

I do not think that any consensus remains between your councillors, as the Administration pushes forward with school proposals without any consultation or engagement with the community on the preferred site.

When Education carried out its appraisal of the preferred "new build" site for a school, it apologised to the Community Council for its inadequate consultation and promised to do better for the final decision. In the event, at the final decision stage, nobody was consulted – not the community council, not the Area Committee and certainly not the residents – before the Education Committee approved the taking of the Toll Park for a new school in 2014. It was supposed to be an options appraisal of 'new build' –vs- 'refurbishment and expansion' of the

existing school, but nobody in Burntisland saw any proposal for refurbishment and expansion; not even the Parent Council. When the three councillors were shown the plan (providing the required facilities in a complex fit for 21st century) it was enthusiastically presented by the architect, and considered by him to provide an excellent school. However, councillors were never officially consulted of any appraisal of the two options. Now, Fife Council is to consult – after the decision is taken. This is no way to follow Scottish Government guidance on engagement and no way to find out what the town wants. Obviously the Administration of Fife Council knows best. Whatever decision is the best, this is no way to treat our constituents.

PROPOSED OUTDOOR PITCH FACILITY AT THE BEACON

Plans for an outdoor pitch facility at the Beacon Leisure Centre continue to move forward.

Burntisland Sports Group has been able to secure more land at the Beacon site and plan to develop a community sports hub comprising of:

1 x multi-use games area (MUGA) – similar to the one at Beveridge Park. This pitch would be open 24/7, would be use and would be suitable for a variety of activities including basketball, tennis, netball, football, other sports and activities, particularly related to youth work such as dance and out of school games and

2 x top quality 5-a-side pitches that would operate through a booking system managed by the Beacon Leisure Centre reception. It is expected that opening times will mirror those of the Leisure Centre, opening during the morning through to late evening.

The area will be overseen by the Beacon Leisure Centre CCTV system to provide necessary security to all of the courts and the neighbouring Skatepark.

£125K has been approved already by Fife Council for development of pitches on the Beacon site and Sports Scotland have indicated that the project would attract funding. A planning application is ready for submission however there is a fear that the £125K funding may be diverted to supplement funding for a new school at the Toll. The Sports Group has been assured by Fife Council that the funding remains in place for pitches at the Beacon and not for education services. Once planning permission is granted the project would move very quickly. It is hoped that the pitches could be completed within a year. The Group would like to gauge support for this project and would ask for feedback from the people of Burntisland by sending an email to the following address:

Do you want to see a hard court pitch for basketball, tennis and "youth diversion" activities, together with two synthetic 5-a-side pitches, within a Sports Hub at the Beacon? These would be operated by the Beacon and bookable during normal opening times, depending on demand. My belief is that you do. But if you do, please join the Burntisland Sports group to make it happen, otherwise it won't. Why? - because there is a move within Fife Council to use the £125k "match funding" money for the Sports project for a pitch at the proposed new school. This is despite the fact that there are huge doubts on how this could be run for any benefit other than to the school within school times, with little advantage for the general public and a delay to 2014. So if you want to get this great facility at the Beacon for all to use, then get involved.

Haugh Road Flooding – Scottish Water Responds

Scottish Water

S cottish Water is working with the local community in Burntisland to help reduce the frequency of flooding in the Haugh Road area.

We empathise with customers affected by flooding in the Burntisland area and we realise that this has been an inconvenience for those living and commuting through the Haugh Road area for a number of years.

At a recent meeting with local Councillors and officers of Fife Council to discuss the flooding issues, we detailed the work that has been carried out to help reduce the frequency and severity of flooding and what is planned for the future at the Haugh Road Pumping Station.

The following measures have been taken or are planned for the near future:

- Extensive root cutting of outfall pipe at Haugh Road Pumping Station
- Amendment of pump arrangement to improve performance of storm pumps
- Repair of ultrasonic control of foul pumps to improve reliability of storm pumps
- A request for capital investment has been submitted to reline the outfall pipe at Haugh Road Pumping Station to prevent further root ingress A request for capital investment has been submitted to change the overflow screen from a static screen to a powered screen

In addition to the measures outlined above there will also be regular cleaning (every 2 months) of Links Car Park Pumping Station to help reduce the risk of odours from the pumping station as well as further discussions with our environmental regulator, the Scottish Environment Protection Agency to discuss the possibility of an alternative pumping arrangement.

Although the above work has helped to reduce the frequency and severity of flooding at Haugh Road, significant capital investment is required to fully resolve the flooding issues at this location. While we would like to be in a position to resolve all deficiencies with sewerage systems across Scotland, the current funds available to us simply do not enable us to do this.

When Scottish Ministers established investment priorities for our 2010-15 programme, priority was given to those properties at significant risk of internal flooding. Unfortunately, because of the focus on internal sewer flooding, we do not have a reliable record of the number of properties with external sewer flooding issues. However, external flooding from the sewer network is an increasing priority for Scottish Water and, for the new investment period (2015-2020), we have been tasked by Ministers with establishing an accurate record of external sewer flooding. Haugh Road will feature on this register.

We will therefore continue to closely monitor the situation at Haugh Road, attending as necessary to any further flooding events and ensuring our records are up to date to allow the correct prioritisation of this case when funding does become available.

In order to accurately build this register we would ask residents in Burtisland to play their part and report directly to our Customer Helpline on 0845 601 8855 whenever there is any sewage spilling from the sewers. This will allow us to quickly arrange for the area to be cleaned up and importantly it is the most accurate way for us to monitor the extent and frequency of the problem at this location.

We understand that local residents have been frustrated in the past by the helpline emphasis on postcodes. Haugh Road is designated as a 'Hot Spot' area and we would ask residents to report any flooding under 'Haugh Road' or if possible, post code KY3 0BZ.

It is our view that the priorities of customers should be taken into account when the investment priorities are set beyond 2015, and we are now beginning a programme of Scotland-wide customer research to establish just how customers view these matters. This research is at a very early stage and we will be happy to provide further information at a later date.



BURNTISLAND LIBRARY 'DROP IN' JOB CLUB - ON THE MOVE?

The Friday 'Drop In' Job Club is now an established part of a routine for many Burntisland residents looking for work and/or training.

Every Friday between 10 am and 12.30 pm on average, a dozen members pop in to check on vacancies, discuss their plans and seek help with C.V.s and applications. Alison Hamilton, Fife Council Development Worker, or one of her colleagues, is on hand to offer practical support as well as up to date information and advice. We are also keen to respond to clients requests for training and recently, working with the Council's C.L.D. team we were able to run First Aid at Work and Food Hygiene Certificate courses at The Toll Centre. My colleague, Ian Bowles, also ran a number of workshops for members wanting to improve their understanding of using the internet for job search. They are now more confident and use the Library's computers regularly. If there is sufficient demand, we would hope to repeat these local training opportunities.

Alison has also been looking for temporary premises for the Drop In Job Club in anticipation of the library's refurbishment programme. Fortunately the Toll Centre management committee has agreed that the Job Club can use the Computer Suite on Friday mornings. Alison commented 'We are very grateful to Toll Centre staff and the committee for this offer. Many of the Job Club regulars have attended courses at the Toll and although the venue is not as central as the library, we will have access to 8 computers. There is no definite date for the move but autumn seems likely. There will be plenty of advanced publicity and we will notify Job Centre Plus'.

For the moment, the library's facilities continue to be available to job seekers.



Change to Local Postal Services

The Burntisland Delivery Office which serves residents in the KY3 postcode area, relocated to the Kirkcaldy Delivery Office, Forth

Avenue Industrial Estate, Kirkcaldy on Monday 25th July. Burntisland and Kinghorn residents will now be able to pick up parcels and packets (when a "while you were out" card has been left by the postman) at Burntisland Post Office, 192 -196 High Street.

Call and Collect and surcharge items for the KY3 area will have to be collected from the Kirkcaldy Delivery Office. However, Royal Mail can still arrange for Call and Collect items to be delivered to the address of any Burntisland resident who does not wish to travel to Kirkcaldy.

Mail deliveries to households and businesses will continue as before and no major changes to delivery times is anticipated.

BURNTISLAND NOW AND THEN A TOWN IN CONTRAST

The 2011 Burntisland Heritage Exhibition has as its theme, the old Burntisland contrasted with the present day town. The displays have much to interest and catch the imagination.


Starting with maps some dating from the 17th Century, the development of the town is demonstrated. The earliest maps rather than having the modern scheme of North at the top of the map, actually show Burntisland and the Forth from a sailor's view point with the mouth of the river at the bottom of the map. One particularly interesting exhibit superimposes a map from the 1740's onto a map of modern Burntisland. It shows how accurate the old time map makers were and also how much Burntisland has grown from the old town based around the High Street. Many of buildings may have changed but the simple street plan remains remarkably unaltered.

There are over 100 black and white photographs of old Burntisland. Many of these have been rephotographed in colour from the same vantage point. This must have been a painstaking task to get the correct angles. The images show many changes in the Burgh. Alcan has been completely cleared, the docks are bereft of cargo vessels and acres of new housing have been built since the Second World War. Then again, the views east along Kinghorn Road from the Bowling Green have hardly changed in 100 years give or take a few motor cars. There is much to stir memories in this display.

One wall is graced with superbly crafted ship models by the late George Aitken, who was a native Burntislander. George was a railwayman all his working life but it was from the sea that he got inspiration for his models.

Beneath this there is a display showing the evolution of cameras from the 1890's up to the start of the digital era.

The exhibition also includes a collection of recently discovered



photographs from Andrew Young, dating from around the 1890's. They show a town dominated by the 3 great chimneys of the Binnend Oil Works. The streets seem to be very quiet. But then the photographer would have to take relatively long exposures and would choose times when there were few people about.

Several fine plans of the Burntisland Primary School prepared by Primary 6 pupils are on show.

This exhibition more than maintains the high standards of Burntisland Heritage and is highly recommended for anyone interested in the town.

(These personnel blokes are all the same – talk round anybody!)



Museum of Communications

The Museum of Communication's new exhibition for 2011 is now in full swing.... 'Words, Wires, Waves and the World Wide Web' traces some of the major developments in communications during the last few hundred years.

The first area to be explored is **WORDS**. In pre-electric days, messages could either be written and hand delivered or, if there was a line of sight, coded signals could be used. See and use elderly typewriters and discover how the introduction of this machine in the 1880s and the invention of Pitman shorthand revolutionised commercial practise across the world. Also on display are dictation machines and examples of various aids for the blind and deaf (including Braille and Sign alphabets).

Moving on to **WIRES**, we have examples of early Electric Telegraphy, including the diamond - shaped Cooke & Wheatstone 5-needle telegraph, which dates from 1839 and was used on the Great Western Railway. Next comes Telephony and includes our all-time favourite Strowger telephone exchange, and examples of telephones throughout their history - including a replica of Bell's first telephone – made out of oak *(what else!)* and completely unrecognisable today!

We illustrate **WAVES** with a few 'milestone' examples of Radio....from 1922 crystal set to recent solar powered /wind-up set; and Television..... from Baird's 1930 '*Televisor*' to the world's smallest TV with a 6mm screen! - designed and built in Edinburgh and intended as a viewfinder for digital cameras.

Finally, we trace the development of computers from the 1940s up to the present time. Early computers relied on valves and were huge, slow, expensive and power - hungry. With the advent if integrated circuits, they have become increasingly smaller, faster, cheaper and more complex and with much lower power consumption. On display are items ranging from a mechanical bomb - sight computer from a Lancaster bomber, through the first PCs of the 1980s, leading to the development of the WWW and today's technology - which, in little more than a decade, has become a major part of our everyday life, and is completely taken for granted.

One of the Museum's main objectives is to interest young people in science, so our exhibitions always have lots of 'hands on' experiences - Signalling Lamps, Morse Keys, Semaphore Flags, Speaking Tubes, Optical Telegraph, Telephone Exchanges, Typewriters, Feely Boxes and much more!




Burntisland Highland Dancers Off to Paris

Mary Stuart, daughter of Burntisland's "Fair Trade" family and former pupil of Balwearie High, is spending a gap year in South Africa working within the local community under the guidance of Project Trust, a widely respected gap year organisation. Last year, Mary came through a rigorous 4 day selection process and subsequently raised almost £5,000 to finance her year's voluntary work at an outward bound centre in South Africa. Here is Mary's 3rd and last blog covering the last four months.

his is likely to be my last blog as I now only have 33 days left in South Africa! The last 4 months have had some pretty L major ups and downs. In April my Mum, Dad and brother, Alasdair, came over to visit for 2 weeks. We stayed based on the garden route and did things from stroking cheetahs to paragliding to crawling through the Cango caves! It was great fun and I think they enjoyed the country a lot.

More recently, as some of you may already know, one of my fellow instructors and close friends. Grant, was involved in an accident which left him in a critical condition in ICU. His condition has been improving but he is still currently in a coma nearly a month later. As you can imagine this brought the morale of the instructing team down to what felt like an all time low, especially for the 4 of us who were 'first on scene' at the accident.

However, everything has been slowly going back to normal and the morale has increased a lot over the past few



weeks. A group of us recently returned to Bloukrans Bridge, site of the world's highest bridge bungy, and yes, you've guessed it, we did the bungy again!... Only this time I did it BACKWARDS! So it was kind of like a 216 metre trust fall...

Last month I spent 8 days in Durban, which was awesome! I visited uShaka Marine World, Moses Mabhida Stadium- where myself and my friend Bizo did the 'Big Rush Big Swing', which is a 106 metre fall and a 220 metre swing from the stadium arch!

I also spent a lot of time at the beaches, unfortunately we weren't allowed to swim because the sardine run was happening and there were sharks everywhere! I also met up With 2 people I met in Cape Town at Christmas last year!

After Durban I headed back to work in Harrismith near the Drakensburg. This was my last course with Outward Bound and it was great, but freezing! I'm now in Potchefstroom for my last week of work with outward bound then I'm going to travel for my remaining 3 weeks in South Africa.



I am currently looking forward to a two month sabbatical later this year; an opportunity to visit the wider Church in a diversity of settings. We start off in

Moscow but with only two days there it will be a matter of visiting the cathedrals in the Kremlin but not really connecting with the people of the Church. Still, it will be interesting to get some flavour of a Church that refused to be crushed by the ferocity of Bolshevik and then Stalinist persecution. We travel on by train to Beijing via Mongolia and hope to have contact with the growing Church in that city during our five day stay. Language may well be a difficulty in communication but the music of praise is the same in all languages. Flying on to Hong Kong we will meet again with the Revd Bill Robertson who was a ministry student on placement with us at St Serf's. He now serves as chaplain to the Bishop's School in Hong Kong. I will be interested to hear about the place of an Anglican school in Hong Kong society, having recently visited the St James School in Kolkata. Onward then to Melbourne and hostel accommodation beside the Anglican Cathedral there and a chance to look at the diversity of Anglicanism in the Commonwealth of Australia.

Our main destination is New Zealand and I have to admit that the Rugby World Cup extravaganza comes into it, though we could only afford tickets to one match. However, we will be making contact with our church friends in Wellington and Southland; Anglican in the first, Presbyterian and Anglican in the second. I spent two years in New Zealand in my early twenties so it always has a feeling of coming home about it. Twelve years ago I was in Canterbury and Southland looking at local collaborative ministry and I learned much that helped in the setting up of the ABI Group of Churches of which St Serf's is the lead congregation. I also experienced the healing ministry in the Cathedral at Dunedin, a form of ministry and service sensitive to Anglican order and, let's admit it, reserve. This too has become part of our ABI churches ministry.

I hope to have much to share when I return in November.



Kinghorn & Burntisland Youth Fellowship - MALAWI 2012

For the last three years a Youth Fellowship from Kinghorn and Burntisland Parish Churches has been meeting weekly for bible study, friendship and Christian youth events in Kirkcaldy, Edinburgh and beyond.

Earlier this year, when those at Balwearie were discussing the possibility of visiting a developing world country in 2012, we wondered if we could offer our YF an equally exciting experience, but with more besides. The church in Kinghorn has strong links with Ekwendeni in northern Malawi: one of the members heads up the charity EMMS International (http://www.emms.org/), which supports health care programmes in that country, while the church's mission partner works in Ekwendeni Secondary School. By visiting Ekwendeni we considered that we might be able to provide an experience of a lifetime for our young people, enabling us all to learn from another culture, deepen our faith and hopefully, challenge us to think about our life style and future life choices.

The plan is, therefore, that in June 2012, 17 teenagers and 6 adult leaders from Kinghorn and Burntisland, will be setting off for Malawi. EMMS will help co-ordinate the trip for us. When there, we expect to spend a week at Ekwendeni. One of the adults going is a teacher and she and others hope to be able to provide one-to-one support to children who are struggling with reading or writing. We intend also to run an after-school sports club for a week and to visit some of the work of the HIV & AIDS programme at Ekwendeni, including orphan care and youth work. For the other week, we aim to have a short safari and a visit to Lake Malawi. We are aware that our input will be minimal - we are young and there for only a short time and we know that we will receive far more than we will give.

Ultimately, our prayer is that seeing God at work in another culture might influence all our lives in a profound way that might lead to......well, who knows what? We need to raise a considerable sum for everyone to go, but we are hard at work - clearing gardens, baking cakes, running marathons, washing cars, organising ceilidhs, car boot sales, sponsored cycle runs and applying to trusts. Please support any of these ventures that you can. In the unlikely event that the trip is does not come to pass, all funds raised will go to work in Malawi.

The 40 mile route branches north at Auchtertool to the roundabout at the east of then east to Auchterderran and Kinglassie, south to Cluny and Newliston before turning west to south to Auchtertool then following the same route back as the 15 mile circuit.

The 75 mile route starts as for the others but turns at Fordell for Crossgates, Hill of Beath, Keltiebridge, and north to the Glenrothes turn just south of Gairniebridge, then round Loch Leven counterclockwise to Wester Balgedie, turning east on the Dryside Road to Strathmiglo, Falkland and Freuchie continuing east until the turn to Burnturk. The route then goes east to Pitlessie and Ceres, turning south at Pitscottie for Elie where the long return run along the coast west to Burntisland begins through Upper Largo, Lundin Links, Scoonie and the new off road cycle track to Windygates roundabout, onto the Wemyss road, through Dysart and Kirkcaldy promenade and then returns from the railway bridge to Dunearn as for the 15 and 40 mile routes. Participants may need the downhill stretch by then!

The routes have been made as "cycle friendly" as possible and are certainly very scenic but are clearly quite hilly in places. The ride is entirely non-competitive. First riders (on the 75) will depart at 10 am and if any should wish to break for lunch, advice on hostelries will be available! Water stops will also be provided and there are plans for medical emergencies. Fife Council and the Police are also fully informed and great assistance has been given by Fife House, not least in giving the event publicity at two recent cycling events in Kirkcaldy.


Burntisland Festival of the Word and Spirit May 2011




Views Sought on Widows' Land Development

Sustainable Communities Initiative (SCI) is one the groups behind a proposal to develop a plot of land in Burntisland known as The Widows' Land. The idea behind the project is to build a development with a low environmental impact that provides affordable rented housing and an outdoor education centre. SCI aims to demonstrate ways of living sustainably and this project will showcase a number of innovative ideas and technologies. The development will use sustainable building methods to create permanent low impact buildings such as Earthships. An Earthship has been built by SCI next to Kinghorn Loch. It's open to the public and gives an idea of the type of constructionthat is possible using recycled materials and sustainable methods. The site will be, as far as possible, off - grid - generating its own power, recycling its own waste and growing some of its own food.

In September and October we are carrying out a community-wide consultation on the plans. Following the consultation we'll be commissioning detailed site surveys before submitting planning permission some time next year.

SCI has been working on the ideas behind the project for a number of years and many of you will be aware of our initial consultations. From this we have discovered various community needs: more affordable housing; outdoor education facilities; increased allotment space and the development of renewable technologies. We also identified a number of concerns - the impact of traffic, the viability of technologies at the site and the conservation of green space and wildlife habitat. These issues have been or will be addressed as the plans evolve

The map gives an overview of the proposed site map and we'll be providing more details of our ideas during the consultation. These plans will develop as a result of the ideas and concerns from the community and other interested groups and we're looking for as much feedback as possible. Finally there is Fife Diet who have funded, coordinated and developed this project over the last 2 years. Fife Diet will be stepping back in March 2012 and the management of the site will be taken over by the Broomhill Gardens Association.



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
