It is now up to Fife Council to consider the results of the most recent consultation exercise and make a decision in mid-September. It will take the wisdom of Solomon to arrive at a decision that will satisfy all!

The Buzz has always attempted to present both sides of the debate impartially. At this crucial time, it appeals to all for calm and level headed thinking to ensure that the town's children receive the state of the art school facilities that they are entitled to - the stated aim of all parties involved!

It has been a busy period in the town and the disappointing weather has failed to suppress the enthusiasm of the many volunteers who have organised events. The Jubilee High Street party organised by newly established "Burntisland Unlimited" was a tremendous success. The sunny conditions helped to transform the High Street into the thriving pedestrian thoroughfare of old.

The wet weather programme on the opening day of Civic Week ensured that the main events took place as planned and throughout the week various organisations and licensed premises organised related events.

On the third Monday of July, The Civic Reception for Burntisland Exiles preceded the traditional procession to the Links for the official opening of the 360th Highland Games which progressed smoothly under clearing skies.

The continued success of these important events is entirely due to the dedication and hard work of volunteers within the local community and generous financial support of local businesses, organisations and individuals. Our grateful thanks go out to all of them.

Readers will have noticed the brightly coloured floral planters and baskets which adorn the High Street and surrounding area. We see them daily and I think that most residents take them for granted. However, these are also planted and maintained by volunteers to whom we owe thanks.

Some of you will have visited the Heritage Society Exhibition in the Kirkgate, also manned by volunteers.

Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend and listen to discussion or to raise matters of interest to them. The full minutes of these meetings are displayed on the town notice board and in the Library. A summary of issues raised during the last three meetings is set out below.

Community Council bullets

- * Thanks were given to PS Scott Murray in respect of his time at Burntisland police station and a welcome was extended to his replacement, PS Ross Davidson.
- * Following expressions of interest from 4 people, Gordon Langlands was elected by secret ballot to fill the single vacancy on the Community Council.
- * Concerns about parking at drop-kerbs on the High Street were passed to the Police and 6 tickets were issued in the space of 5 days.
- * The establishment FAB (Floral Action Burntisland) means that funds for that purpose formerly managed by the Community Council will now be managed directly by FAB.
- * An exchange of ideas continues, led by Zoe Williamson, Ed Pybus and John Russell, on how best to ensure accurate and full communication with the wider community.
- * A decision on funding towards the War Memorial conservation project by the Heritage Lottery Fund is expected at end-July.
- * The Chairs of the Community Council and Parent Council met to clarify their different objectives and to ensure that discussions about the school could remain constructive.
- * Neil Millsop represented the Community Council at a recent meeting of the school stakeholder group.
- * A successful clean-up of the Fife Coastal path near the Seamill Pond was led by Gary Cummins.
- * Following challenges led by John Bruce, Fife Council now say there are no plans to close public toilets on the Links.
- * The Community Council website will have information about the planned shutdown for maintenance purposes of the ExxonMobil plant at Mossmorran and the consequential flaring at the beginning and end of the period. There will be a significant rise in the number of contractors working on-site and therefore using local services.
- * It was decided, by a significant majority, to oppose the planning application for a new school on the grounds that the location is inappropriate. The Community Council strongly supports the provision of a new school. However, the evidence shows that most local people believe the Toll Park is not an appropriate site. We are again asking Fife Council to carry out an objective survey of other sites and to submit a new plan accordingly.

The Burgh Polis

The one thing that is constant in the Police is change.

Since the last issue of the Burgh Buzz Sergeant Scott Murray has moved on to be replaced by myself.



I have joined the team at Burntisland from a six month secondment as the Police lead for the UK Border Agency Crime Team, based in Glasgow. I have spent most of my promoted service in Criminal Investigation roles with periods as a Response Sergeant at both Cowdenbeath and Dunfermline.

Although Community Policing is new to me, I intend to use the skills that I have accumulated throughout my service to add to the good work currently being undertaken by the local Community Officers, Keith Gibb, Jez Graves and Tony Kinsell. From my time working with other agencies, I fully appreciate the importance of working partnerships and how tackling problems from a variety of perspectives can be far more effective than from a purely law enforcement angle.

We will continue to focus on the local issues that you have raised with us at Community Engagement Meetings - primarily Youth Disorder/Anti-Social Behaviour and Road Traffic Issues.

No **major disorder issues** have arisen recently but with the school holidays upon us, patrols will be increased to nip any potential problems in the bud. A couple of seizures of alcohol have been made from youths in the Burntisland area and test purchase operations are regularly carried out at local licensed premises in an effort to identify likely places of supply.

Parking and speeding continue to be areas of concern in both Burntisland and Kinghorn. Regular patrols have been undertaken by both local Community Officers and Community Traffic Wardens and where appropriate, advice has been given. Additionally, numerous fixed penalty tickets have been issued in cases of dangerous/inconsiderate parking. Speeding vehicles have also been targeted with a number of speed detection deployments having taken place at speeding hotspots, Kinghorn Road, Burntisland and on the Loch Road, Kinghorn. A number of warnings and fixed penalty tickets have been issued.





The paintings and photographs of local man Andrew Young (1854-1925) form the main focus of this year's exhibition. The works chosen are a mixture of originals and reproductions and a most useful printed guide accompanies them. His three most prominent works, The Magistrate's Seat; A Scottish Fair and, perhaps most well known, The Bridge of Life, can be viewed in the High Street room along with views of the Lammerlaws and beach. The Kirkgate Room contains a selection of local views and some portraits while the Back Room is reserved for some of Young's photographic work.

But, just because Young's work is the theme for this year, do not be misled into thinking there is little else. To visit the tiny exhibition space is to enter the Tardis! Surely every aspect of Burntisland: its history, archaeology, industry, people and architecture can be found in this space. It is not until one begins to study the collected material that the rich seam of information available about



Burntisland is exposed; whether it is the informal collection of local news compiled over many years by Cathy Watson, detailed recollections of Burntisland at work and play or the highly emotive 'Burntisland Now and Then' playing on a loop.

This exhibition will appeal to visitors, returning exiles and local people alike. Even if you have already visited, you have definitely not seen everything; so go back for a second or third visit. The volunteers are welcoming, well informed and delighted to share their knowledge with visitors.

I will continue to hold surgeries in Burntisland and Kinghorn prior to the Community Council meetings and am also available by phone, email or appointment outwith those dates.

am delighted to be re elected to serve the constituents of ward 10 for another five years. It has been a great privilege to have been able to serve the people of our communities over the last seven years and I look forward with enthusiasm to my next term.

My main consideration in the next five years will be to offer to the residents of the ward my attention to the many problems and frustrations which they encounter in their dealings with the Council and other national organisations. 
he group have had a very productive couple of months after establishing themselves earlier this year. This has included the setting up of a bank account and applying for funding from Fife Council to help purchase plants for the floral displays around the town.

FAB had a stall at the Traders Jubilee Fun Day held in June. "Three sponges for a pound" was broadcast as passers-by were given the opportunity to soak a face that was poking through the body of Igglepiggle! £60 was raised to help towards the purchase of water bowsers to water the plants. FAB also managed to recruit 2 new volunteers that day.

Additionally, we have benefited from donations from local businesses including BH Plumbing and Gary Clark Gardening Services. The hanging baskets on the High Street and planters and troughs around Burntisland were planted and hung at the beginning of June – slightly behind schedule due to the Scottish weather! Burntisland Girl Guides planted the small precinct planter outside the Burgh Chambers and have agreed to maintain this for FAB as this will help them towards achieving one of their badges.

The floral displays are maintained by a small number of volunteers who are braving the elements to ensure they are watered, fed and deadheaded. The plan was to water them twice weekly but so far, due to the wet weather, this has been reduced to once weekly.

As we maintain the baskets, troughs and planters we constantly hear comments from passers-by on how lovely they look and that they were unaware that the operation was manned entirely by volunteers. We are



To maintain the existing project and plan for the future the continual support from the local community is essential. This can be made in a number of ways. If you want to help with planting or watering, if you have great fundraising ideas or if you are a local business which is willing to make a donation or provide sponsorship, we would love to hear from you. We meet on an ad hoc basis and generally communicate via email. The summer months' commitment is mainly maintaining the floral displays and in the winter time it will be more planning and organising for the year ahead.

Community Clean-up Day By Gary Cummins



n 22nd April members of Burntisland Community Council along with two members of the public and a handful of children spent the Sunday clearing rubbish from the town's coastal

This event, organised by the Community Council, was part of Fife's own annual community clean up. Fife Council provided a skip, bags and protective equipment in the form of gloves and litter picking tools

The principal aim was to clear the Fife Coastal Path of rubbish prior to the summer visiting season Burntisland as a coastal town has plenty of coastline to choose from. The selected area

was the Seamill Pond and the adjacent footpath leading to Aberdour, which is particularly prone to general littering, flytipping and dog fouling.

After about four hours of clearing litter, bottles, drinks cans, even an ancient fly-tipped bathroom suite, we managed to fill about two thirds of a skip. As well as clearing the footway and playpark around the pond, volunteers worked their way through

the woods along the back of the houses on the Seamill Park and cleared the playpark area of litter and windblown rubbish. Fife's environment officers paid us a visit and we raised with them the issue of the regular dog fouling on the Seamill Park.

This event offers an excellent opportunity to deal with some of the litter and rubbish in the public spaces of Burntisland that the regular council services don't tackle. Hopefully more folk will join in next year.



Toll Centre Job Club Looking for advice and information? - We're here to help!

n the first 6 months since the Job Club moved to the Toll Lentre, over 30 local residents have taken advantage of the support available for job search (including help with CVs and applications), training and career planning. Access to 8 computers for online job search has proved very popular with iob club members and, hopefully, this makes up for the fact that many locals are travelling quite a distance to the Toll Centre.

Numbers using the facilities fell in June and Ian and Alison, the Opportunities Fife development workers, are keen to encourage regulars and new members to come along. This is an important and useful facility for Burntisland but its continuation will depend on the use made of it by the local community. The Job Club runs throughout the year every Friday from 10 am until 12.30 pm and individual appointments outwith these times are also available. MUSEUM OF COMMUNICATION

The Museum of Communication's new Summer Exhibition is now in full swing!

This year, we thought we'd do something a bit different, so we're telling the story of some of the major developments in maritime communications over the last 200 years.

'Attention All Shipping' starts with the role played by the Stevenson family of Lighthouse Builders. (We are grateful to the Northern Lighthouse Board for copies of the original, very fine drawings). There was one 'Black Sheep' in the Stevenson family, who had no interest whatsoever in Engineering, but ironically, his name is known far more widely today, than the rest of the family put together. Robert Louis Stevenson was the grandson of the founder of the family engineering firm!

Wars are often the birthplace of great inventions! In the 1790s, hostilities with the French resulted in the British Admiralty commissioning the building of a string of Optical Telegraphs, radiating from London to where the fleets were anchored at Yarmouth, Deal, Portsmouth and Plymouth. This – in preelectric days – was the first time that messages could be transmitted over long distances at speed. It is said that a test message was sent AND acknowledged, from London to Plymouth (215 miles) in about 8 minutes but obviously, the telegraph could only be used in good daylight conditions!

There is a section about Shipwrecks. With valuable input from Burntisland Heritage Trust, we are able to detail the biggest wreck in the Forth - *HMS Campania* - that lies just outside Burntisland.

The Forth has been an important shipping area for hundreds of years but for much of this time, there were no lighthouses, and ships were simply at the mercy of the wind.

One of the Museum's most prized artefacts is on display this year – the Morse key from the German battleship *Grosser Kurfurst*, scuttled at Scapa Flow in 1919 and subsequently salvaged in 1938. This is the only key ever recovered from the German Fleet and was presented to a press photographer who covered the salvage operation. His widow donated it to the MoC, after hearing a BBC interview with Harry Matthews (the Museum's founder), in 1986.

We devote one section to the *Titanic* tragedy, in its centenary year. It is interesting to note that the label 'Unsinkable' was coined by the Press and not the builders! On display are artefacts of the period –including Spelterware figurines, magic lantern, typewriter, telephones and gramophones – and we draw a chilling comparison between *Titanic* and the recent foundering of the *Costa Concordia*... We unravel the mysteries of the Shipping Forecast and recall the Pirate Radio stations of the 1960s.

We are grateful to the RNLI for their very significant input in the exhibition and ask that our visitors will support their good work.

First Aid Update

Our summer season got off to a very rewarding start when four of our members saved the life of a man whose heart had stopped beating.

We were covering an event in Fife when one of our first aiders was asked to attend a man who had become unwell. He sent a radio message to alert others that he was on the way. A second member picked up the message and was nearby so went to the scene in case assistance was required.



On arrival, they realised that the man was unconscious and had stopped breathing. They then used the radios again to ask our ambulance to attend, whilst they started CPR. Our ambulance carries a defibrillator, oxygen and airways, all of which were used to excellent effect. The bottom line is that by the time we transferred the patient to the Scottish Ambulance Service we had been successful in re-starting his heartbeat, though he remained unconscious and gravely ill. However, I am very pleased to say that he was discharged from

hospital only 10 days later and continues to make an excellent recovery.

We also found time to celebrate some recent successes, when 9 members completed the First Person On Scene course at the Intermediate level. It means that they are qualified in the use of oxygen and Entonox, as well as airway management, spinal injury stabilisation and other topics.

In the final assessment, the winners of the trophies for Best Theory and Best Practical were Brian McGill and Phil Reid respectively. At the same time, Maureen McQuade was presented with the Quaich to mark her success in raising £1,500 for our funds entirely through her own efforts.

Meanwhile, we are also planning ahead for our next public course (FPOS Basic) which will start in September. It will run on Wednesday evenings for about 12 weeks. 

The next venture in the fund-raising campaign for Action Medical Research, in July, will see Val lead a Linton-family trio up Toubkal, at over 4000 metres,




With these standards being met, the Club was disappointed to hear that our attitude and commitment to youth football was called into question at a Community Council meeting earlier this year after a match had to be postponed.





A Life-Changing Experience

Fifteen teenagers and five adults from Kinghorn and Burntisland Parish Churches' Youth Fellowship recently returned from the trip of a lifetime to Malawi. It was the culmination of 2 years of fund-raising and preparation, and has given the youngsters an experience they will never forget. They travelled out to Ekwendeni where they were based, and met many children, young people and adults from the town and surrounding villages.

It was a real exchange of cultures with the Scottish teenagers teaching Scottish Country Dances and learning to join in with the local dancing celebrations, playing football and nukem ball in Malawian 'free for all' style, performing Christian mimes to music and participating in Malawian Church worship. The youngsters are local food and learned of local customs, visited schools and AIDS

education sessions, and saw living and education conditions at first hand that were very different from their own experiences at home.

Their fund raising meant that they were able to take useful equipment and resources from Scotland into the area. Malawi has always had strong links with Scotland and the group was made incredibly welcome everywhere they went and were impressed with the friendliness and open-ness with which they were received. They were inspired by the dedicated work of both local people and organisations and Scottish/UK missionary partnerships.

Our sister church in Strathearn, St Serf's Comrie, proposed earlier in the year that we should embark on a joint pilgrimage sometime around the 1st July, our patronal festival. The idea being that some of us would meet up in Comrie in the morning and then make our way by car and minibus to St Serf's, Dunning; on to Culross Abbey and then make our way to Burntisland for fish suppers and Evensong. In the event the best day for us was the 7th July.

Pilgrimages are not the same thing as going on retreat. A retreat involves withdrawing from the world for a time of prayer and spiritual renewal. Pilgrimage on the other hand is more to do with stepping out into the world from



the routine of ordinary life in order to make a journey with and towards God. If anything it means engaging more fully with the world; through conversations with other pilgrims and with the people who will, inevitably be met on the journey. The whole of life is a pilgrimage but this is about setting aside a special time for reflection on life but again also for spiritual renewal.

The weather on the 7th was pretty bad and so those of us travelling from Fife were held up by the volume of water on the roads. In the event we turned aside at Auchterarder to go straight to Dunning and awaited our friends there. The Comrie contingent began their morning by walking the prayer labyrinth recently cut in the grass of their garden (more about labyrinths at http://www.labyrinth.org.uk). At Dunning we were given a very good presentation on the church and the famous Dupplin Cross by the local Historic Scotland manager. The Dupplin Cross is a rare and important example of an early, medieval high cross dating from c800 and commemorating a king; Constantine, son of Fergus. From Dunning we went over the hill, by way of the den where St Serf is said to have slain a dragon, to Culross. There we were welcomed by the Church of Scotland folk who run the Abbey Cafe and the Session Clerk told us all about St Serf before taking us on a tour of the Abbey itself. By this time we were running late so that phone calls had to be made to warn the hospitality team at St Serf's, Burntisland and to put in our order for fish suppers to the Links Fish Bar.

Pilgrimage like life is unpredictable, things don't always go as planned. Receiving and giving hospitality is also part of pilgrimage and so it was a group of grateful pilgrims who sat down to a very late lunch in the Hall. Then on to the church to participate in the worship led by the ABI Singers, our ecumenical choir. A very worthwhile day spent discovering many things about our Christian heritage here in Scotland and about the present day life of Christ among us.

a s of 13th July, the **Earthship Fife Visitor Centre** will be open from 1pm to 4pm every Friday. They're holding a free event, 'A Day of Stories', on Saturday 22nd September, from 10.30am to 3.30pm in the Centre. There will be three family activities on offer - an opportunity to hear the story of the Earthship and how it came to Scotland, storytelling in the yurt, and making something to take home. There will also be a free buffet lunch and refreshments.

SCI's plans for an ecovillage on the Widows Land are still progressing. There are 2 community events scheduled for the autumn. You shouldn't miss if you'd like to be involved in a discussion on possible future management of the site as a eco-project. On Sept 1st and Oct 27th Tony Wilson, a countryside ranger, will be delivering workshops (10a.m - 3pm at the Toll Centre) on woodland management, wildflower meadows, ponds and hedges. Tony will give a presentation at the start of the morning and share his experience, opening up a discussion to gather ideas and wishes for the land from community members. The gardens held a successful Craft Fair last month which raised some much needed funds, there'll be more events over the coming weeks, including a BBQ and a series of volunteer days where you can turn your hand to vegetable growing – and weeding! And finally - a recipe from Fife Diet:

Asparagus and spring onion tart with wholegrain mustard - Serves 6.

290g short crust pastry, 2 tbsp oil, 200g spring onions, 100g sour cream, 1 egg + 1 egg yolk, 2 tbsp wholegrain mustard, 110g asparagus, 10g grated Anster cheese.

Roll out the pastry onto a lightly floured board to a 0.5cm thickness. Line the pastry in a deep tray(approx 31cm) and place in the fridge until chilled. Pre-heat the oven to 200c/400 F. Heat the oil in a pan and cook the spring onions until soft. Mix together the sour cream, egg, egg yolk and wholegrain mustard until combined Spread the softened onions evenly in the middle of the pastry and place the asparagus, (one tip up, one tip down) across the tart. Pour the mustard mixture over the asparagus and sprinkle with the grated cheese. Place in the oven for 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Remove from the oven and leave to cool for 5 minutes, slide onto a large plate cut into slices and serve warm.







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
