

BiFab's Bright Future!

uring the current period of economic uncertainty, one bright light on the horizon has been local engineering firm Burntisland Fabrications Limited. Earlier in the summer, it was widely reported that Burntisland Fabrications Limited won two major contracts to design, procure and construct mammoth structures for the off shore oil industry giving them orders through to April 2015. These projects will involve BiFab's manufacturing facilities in

education. The BiFab Management team are to be congratulated on their ingenuity and foresight in

establishing a skilled workforce, operating within facilities that are mutually compatible and ideally placed to take advantage of the expected expansion in the renewable energy field.

MAJOR REPAIRS TO CLOCK TOWER

Following a routine inspection of the Burgh Chambers clock tower by Fife Council, it was revealed that the structure had serious cracks and other problems. Fife Council called in independent conservation specialists to confirm the extent of the damage. These experts found severe weathering, cracking and open joints in the sandstone faces of the tower, which will now have to be partially dismantled to below the clock faces to allow the tower to be reconstructed and repaired using as much of the original stone as possible.

The experts have confirmed that the work needs to be carried out as a matter of urgency. The tower was dismantled in October so that basic the repairs could be completed before the onset of the worst of the winter weather.

Unconfirmed reports indicate that the whole structure including the Burgh Chambers, and the Exhibition rooms may have to remain closed and out of use until possibly Christmas, under the provision of Health and Safety considerations.



Up, Up and Away!

Editorial Comment.

The lead article on our front page contains some welcome news for Fife and for Burntisland in particular. Local traders should reap the benefits of the busy local "yard" over the next three years and hopefully beyond.

On page 10 Alex McDonald, the Chairman of our Community Council (BCC) summarises a number of controversial issues which have concerned the town over the past few years. Some have led to heated public argument and acrimonious exchanges in the mass media, particularly social networking sites. Recognising the need for more meaningful communications between BCC and local residents, Alex set up a subcommittee to examine the problem. In his column he expands on the measures that BCC now proposes to implement in an attempt to improve dialogue with the public at large. For this initiative to succeed there must be a two way exchange of ideas between the BCC and all sectors of the community. To cease communication because of disagreement achieves nothing.

The Buzz, which is under no obligation to support BCC, should be an important component in this initiative. Use us! Give us your views, opinions and ideas and we will publish them, to be read by every household in the town and beyond.

On a completely different tack, Burntisland Shipyard AFC have made an encouraging start to the season in the East of Scotland League. Of particular note however, have been the impressive performances of the Under -14s who are unbeaten after four games and sit proudly at the top of Division 1 of the Fife Football Development League.

It is completely unacceptable that during the winter months, the senior and junior players will have to travel to Cowdenbeath for training because of lack of facilities in the town.

A substantial sum has been set aside for a multi purpose, all-weather sports facility adjacent to the Beacon Centre. When will this project become a reality? In this period of austerity, if the money is not used it could be diverted to a project elsewhere in Fife.

Finally, I would draw attention to the announcement on page 17 in respect of Remembrance Day services on 11th November.

Plans are at an advanced stage to refurbish the war memorial and its surrounds. Hopefully this refurbishment will be completed by the centenary of the outbreak of the Great War in 2014.

Nevertheless, the memorial remains a stark reminder of those brave soldiers from Burntisland who gave their lives in the service of their country.

We have a duty to attend and remember them.

Community Council Bullets.....

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend and listen to discussion or to raise matters of interest to them. The full minutes of these meetings are displayed on the town notice board and in the Library. A summary of issues raised during the last three meetings is set out below.

Community Council bullets

- Bruce Stuart has been elected to fill the vacancy on the Community Council arising from the resignation of Martin McDonald.
- The Binn footpath from Cowdenbeath Road has been repaired and re-opened.
- An objection was lodged to the planning application for an Eco Village at the Widow's Land. The reasons were poor access from Kirkcaldy Road, possible impact on ground stability, and the visual impact of the proposed design.
- The balance of funding for the War Memorial project is being sought from Fife Environment Trust and also the War Memorials Trust. The rough tarmac area next to the War Memorial will also be landscaped and significantly improved if funds permit.
- Advice and information on issues relating to older people can be obtained from the Fife Elderly Forum (<u>www.fife-elderly.org.uk</u>).
- ExxonMobil will sponsor the attendance by local senior citizens to the Lochgelly Centre for this year's pantomime. They will also sponsor a Burns Lunch in January.
- Fife Council have denied that they need permission from the Court to use Common Good land for the site of the new school. They also appear to have disregarded guidelines which say that the intention to grant planning consent must be notified to the Scottish Ministers. According to the guidelines, the Community Council and other bodies will be able to make further representations to Fife Council and to the Scottish Ministers before a final decision is taken.
- There is concern over the condition of land at 147/149 Kinghorn Road, which is in private ownership and is an eyesore. Communication will be opened with both Fife Council and the landowner.
- There are concerns over safety and environment at the Palais Steps, the Shipyard Steps and the Rossend archway. All will be referred to Fife Council.
- The Police have reported a high rate of detection on crimes such as assault and vandalism. Police attention has also focused on High Street parking, speeding and underage drinking.

Where does the time go? In the last Buzz I spoke of plans for the summer activities and the like and



we are now looking at Autumn initiatives, plans for bonfire night and the forthcoming Christmas market.

We are currently focusing on youth disorder and underage drinking in the town and although not yet a major problem, we are tackling it on two fronts. All the off-license premises in the town have been visited and proprietors reminded of their responsibilities regarding the sale of alcohol. They were advised of potential Test Purchase operations in the area. Both plain clothes and high visibility patrols have been deployed in areas highlighted to us by members of the community. In the first weekend alone, over of 15 youths were found in possession of alcohol and a substantial amount of drink was seized. Warning letters have been sent to the parents of these youths.

With the clock change at the end of October we would advise residents not to leave their homes in darkness as it is a clear indication that the premises may be unoccupied. To raise awareness of simple crime prevention measures, over the next few weeks, local community Officers will be present at the Beacon Centre to offer advice.

A security marking clinic at the Police Station over the Christmas holidays will allow local kids to have their bikes, mobile phones etc. marked with a security code to deter potential thefts. Details of this will be circulated through the local schools prior to the Christmas break.

We continue to act positively to problems raised at Community Engagement Meetings. These have primarily concerned Youth Disorder/Anti-Social Behaviour and Road Traffic Issues.

Youth Disorder/Anti Social Behaviour:

Positive inroads have been made in tackling drinking and social disorder by youths at the Broomhill Viewpoint and surrounding area. We would urge you to report any similar problems so that we can take appropriate action.

Road Traffic:

Parking and speeding continue to be areas of concern in Burntisland. Local Community Officers and Community Traffic Wardens have conducted speed surveys in problem areas and numerous fixed penalty tickets have been issued in respect of dangerous/inconsiderate parking. If you have any traffic related problems that you feel we can assist with, either contact the Police Station or come along to your next Community Engagement Meeting which will take place as follows:

The Castle-ites

Deter George was born and bred in Burntisland. He was raised 'up the Castle'.

The Castle", as it is known locally, is Burntisland's original council housing scheme. Fanned around Rossend Castle and built in phases from the mid 1920's to 1937, it consists of well built, spacious dwellings, many with bay windows, large gardens and most with stunning views. Big families, unlocked doors, a close and supportive community; the busy, noisy shipyard flanking the south side and on the north the productive Aluminium works, both giving regular employment. This was the culture Peter grew up in from the late 40's. when gas lighting was still the norm, electricity not reaching the Castle until 1950. Peter can still describe with absolute precision the replacing of gas mantles bought from Stephenson's at the bottom of the High Street.



Childhood is remembered vividly as being divided into the seasons which dictated outdoor play. Spring and Summer - home from school, hardly stopping to change into play clothes or eat, in the rush to meet other Castle-ites at Rossend Point. Hours of football on the makeshift pitch, or cricket, until players peeled off in response to calls from mothers' for bed. On the balmy nights that prevailed women would meet at the Point, to gossip and watch over younger children. Peter and his 'gang' had an extensive playground. They learned to swim at Starleyburn and spent hours up the Bluebell woods on the south side of Easter Heughs. A game they called Levoy had two teams each trying to capture members of the opposing team and bring them to the home base at the Castle. The 'catch' area spread from Starlevburn round to the Golf course, Lammerlaws and home. Each game could last a week. Endless football included painting goal post on a high wall down from the Castle Stables. A plastic 'football' would be kicked to destruction where upon pennies and tuppences were pooled to purchase a replacement for 9d. There was always a half crown to be earned at the shows doing some job or other. Under the leadership of Provost Livingstone, boys from the Castle would load benches onto the local coal merchant's lorries, to and from the various church halls, to the Highland Games arena, earning another 2/6.

Harry Crawford of the Castle Tenants Association would organise an annual

mystery tour when six full buses including many eager children would inevitably end up in Alva and Anstruther.

Winter - brought snow and dare-devil sledging on the 'Coo hill' to Haugh Road. Break-neck sledging was saved for the fearless on a custom made ice track from the Monk's Walk, down Dury Park and Rossend Gardens, packing snow into the few steps to smooth and speed the route. "How no one ever got seriously hurt......" Remembered too, the adult size see saw in the play park beside Rossend Castle (a hotel until the late 50's). Up to six children could fill each end of the board, with the one on the end clinging on for dear life to avoid being catapulted off when the other end thumped down on the unprotected ground. "How no one ever......"

Then there was the gang hut, down the slippy slope above the shipyard, where they had a pot belly stove and every comfort "short of wallpaper".

The weekly Speaker programme offers a platform for all organisations and individuals with an interesting story to share. The Club remains committed to service of all sorts both locally and internationally.



The Scottish Blood Transfusion Service has written to thank all those Burntisland donors who gave of their time (and blood) at the donor session in Burntisland on 3rd September. A total of 123 people attended the session of whom 104 donated. Six donors earned their bronze

awards for 10 donations whilst Jason Donovan was awarded silver for 25 donations.

It was a truly magnificent effort from Burntisland donors but according to the following letter, there appears to be a requirement for the Blood Transfusion Service to review its operating procedures or regular donors may become reluctant to continue to give their support:

Dear Editor,

I am writing to express my disappointment with the Scottish Blood Transfusion Service. Myself and my wife attended the session on 3rd September in Burntisland.

On arriving, we had to wait in a queue thinking, this is great, a very good turn out. Wrong! We were advised that they were trying out a new system involving donors filling out questionnaires at home having received them beforehand by post. This system appeared to be slower.

Eventually we were seated but waited 45 minutes to give a sample. My wife was called first and eventually emerged to tell me that we could not give blood as we had recently returned from a holiday in Turkey where there had been an outbreak of Nile Flu.

We both appreciate the reason for this refusal but why did we have to wait for over an hour before we discovered we could not donate? Even a simple notice at the entrance would have been sufficient.

As for the new system, it does not work! A neighbour left her two young children with a friend and was really worried about them as she spent over an hour and a half giving blood.

In our opinion, eight donor beds are insufficient. We were also informed that by the end of the session prospective donors were being turned away. This situation is totally unacceptable and cannot be allowed to continue.

More recently two lavishly illustrated books (he takes all the photographs) are fascinating in many ways. "The oldest Post Office in the World (and other Scottish Oddities)" - in which our nearest is the Kirkcaldy museum's collection of furniture made of coal and the furthest away a bus stop on Unst arrayed with couch, computer and other comforts. "A Scottish Gravestones Miscellany" covers all you could wonder about! Did you know, in West Wemyss, there is a stone to a boy who died on April 31st, or what about George Ramsay, near Montrose who was "born 1859 and died 1840"?

Hamish of course sprung to prominence with his first book, "Hamish's Mountain Walk", the story of his first continuous walk over all the Munros. "Climbing the Corbetts" more simply describes days on those hills and Hamish's Goats End Walk was the first ever foot – link of Ben Nevis, Scafell Pike, Snowdon and Carauntoohill, while walking the country end to end. All three have been stylishly reissued with great colour pictures.

"The Mountains Look on Marrakech tells the story of another epic trek of 96 days and a thousand miles from one end of the Atlas Mountains to the other, becoming an instant classic on everything to do with the Berber people of Morocco's mountains. Recently, the Cicerone Press have published Hamish's "The Atlas Mountains" which narrates experiences on the biggest and best in the ranges with superb illustrations.

Hamish has edited several volumes of poetry and had several collections of his own published (a small booklet, Achnashellach is still available) and is also known as a story teller (several have appeared in the Buzz of course). He edited two volumes from the 27 books by Scotland's first photographer naturalist: "Seton Gordon's Scotland" and "Seton Gordon's Cairngorms" and is now putting together a Tom Weir anthology.

Hamish maintains interests locally and is an honorary member of the

Burntisland & Kinghorn Rotary Club. His writings have brought him honorary degrees from St Andrews University and the Open University and his pioneering work in outdoor education an MBE. Most of his books are available from local libraries but Hamish says he will happily autograph and sell copies if he can be caught at home. new DVD based on the theme of the 2011 Burntisland Heritage Exhibition has been produced. The DVD was originally intended for use in the summer exhibition; however, by popular request, it is now available for sale. All proceeds from the sale of this DVD will be used to further the Trust's work in protecting and promoting Burntisland's heritage.

A Worthy Campaign



Your voice ...

The furore over the Toll Park as a site for the new school is not going to go away.

The silent chimes of the town clock exposed a fiasco at the heart of decision-making.

The clock tower of the Burgh Chambers is suddenly found to be dangerous.

Common Good properties were once protected by formal leases which have been allowed to lapse.

Planning guidelines from the Scottish Government appear to be ignored.

In the Community Council's view, public consultation should be full and frank. When it's done properly, we should all be able to see the result and accept it, even though we may disagree with the outcome.

We're convinced that proper consultation on each of the above topics would have avoided much anger. Even better, it would have allowed all of us to look positively to the future rather than spend fruitless days, weeks and months trying to undo the errors of the past.

We can't force Fife Council or other agencies to consult in a meaningful way. However, we can set an example ourselves. With your help and co-operation, we will do exactly that.

We welcome people who have a view to express, whether at our regular monthly meetings in the Burgh Chambers or occasional public meetings in the Parish Church Hall.

However, we want more. We want to capture local opinion quickly, clearly and often, so that our own decisions can be responsive to the changing circumstances which surround us.

So here's where we need your help.

In addition to monthly or public meetings, we will hold surgeries where two members of the Community Council will listen to your views. You can have a discussion, away from the formality of an open forum, knowing that your comments will be taken into account in the more formal debates. Location, times and dates will be published in the Burgh Buzz.

We will also ask questions from time to time of everyone in our community. We will pose those questions through the Burgh Buzz and we ask for your support in responding fully.

We will ask the same questions via our website and in other ways so that people can respond in a way which suits them.

We will do what we can to analyse the responses from all of these different sources and present an overall picture. In so doing, we will take steps to ensure fairness and accuracy.

This is only a starting point, but the process will begin with the next issue of the Burgh Buzz.

Closure of Toilets will Damage our Town

With the possibility of the public toilets on the Links closing, Burntisland is just one of many towns in Fife to lose a vital public service which Fife council should provide. So we find ourselves asking – what will be done to compensate the loss of these crucial facilities? The council believes that a 'Comfort break' scheme would work. This is where local businesses are paid a small fee from the council to allow the general public the use of their toilets. This is supposed to encourage visitors to use the businesses facilities such as having a sit down meal in a café or a few drinks in a pub. This scheme may sound beneficial to all but why should local businesses allow a lot of tourists say on a busy summer day to use their loos and make a mess without paying to use those facilities?



Not only does this scheme encourage people to use the toilets without paying for what the business provides but it will also encourage children to trudge in and out and mothers to bring in toddlers and babies to the facilities when there are perfect working order toilets just one minute from the town's High street.

This would also bring us onto the fact of the toilet building that is currently in use – a perfectly working and clean and sanitary toilet building. The building is in great condition so wouldn't it be an extreme waste to leave it sitting abandoned when it could still be used?

I would understand if the condition of the toilets was in great disrepair and it would cost too much to bring it back to required standards but it is not so I don't see why Burntisland should lose such a valuable feature from our bustling tourist industry from the fair and the coastal path trekkers.

Fife Council given an assurance that the public toilets will not be closed until other arrangements have been made. However, I believe that the provision of public toilets by Fife Council is a public service similar to bin collections for which we pay rates. This essential amenity should not be withdrawn.

Starley Hall's Generous Donations

The Buzz's own Linda Briscoe was privileged to attend a recent function at Starley Hall School. Here is her account of a wonderful experience.

I e were invited to attend a special assembly at Starley Hall, where the pupils were presenting money they had raised for two of their chosen charities. Ann Murray welcomed us and explained how the young people have an ongoing programme of sponsored activities to raise money for a variety of causes, to which they all contribute in different ways, by sponsored bike rides, swims, a walk over the Forth

Road Bridge, baking, jammaking and any other ideas that they come up with.

She then introduced **A Group Presentation** John Halliwell to tell us a bit about Mary's Meals. He gave some examples of individual children in India, Liberia and Malawi who have been supported by the provision of a daily school meal. He then showed us a photo of his grand-daughter, who it transpired is Martha of the famous 'No Seconds' Blog which has raised such amazing amounts of money for Mary's Meals. He used her story as a

clear example to the young people of how a simple action can have such positive results for so many people in need. He was then presented with a cheque for £300, which he told us would be enough to provide a school dinner for 30 children for a year. The young people also

Pupil of the Week handed over an impressive number of backpacks containing basic items to support children in attending school and giving them an opportunity to improve their lives.

The next guest was Ken Hunter from the local Rotary Club, who explained the work done to provide Shelterboxes for any part of the world where natural disasters leave people homeless and

unable to provide everyday necessities for their families. Each Shelterbox contains a tent, a stove, basic tools and cooking implements, water purification kits and essential emergency items to help

people survive in desperate situations. Starley Hall had previously collected enough to provide a box and the young people were able to trace where it had been used. They now presented a cheque for £500, almost enough to fund another Shelterbox.

The assembly was concluded with a lively and entertaining address from Provost Jim Lieshman, who took the opportunity to praise the hard work and caring attitude of the young people and to encourage them to make positive choices

as they faced whatever challenges lay ahead. He also presented a 'Pupil of the Week' certificate to a rather embarrassed young lady. His talk was very well received and his 'blingage' (Lord Provost's Chain!) was closely inspected.

It was most heartening to see the young people, who have not had an easy start in life, so responsive and eager to make a real effort to help others and to see their efforts recognised and encouraged. Starley Hall currently has 16 resident pupils, and others who attend as day-pupils. They have three houses in the local community where ex-pupils, at college or in work-experience, are supported by fulltime staff whilst they find their feet and learn the skills they will need for independent living within a community.

First Aid update.... By

It has been an interesting summer. We saw fairies dancing at the side of Kinghorn Loch on a glorious day. We also saw riders

trying to stay mounted as their horses coped with the wind, rain (and sometimes sunshine) atop a hill at Glenfarg.

However, that was then. We're now into our winter season. So our current schedule of events includes ice hockey, fireworks and student balls, as well as regular and one-off training.

It's tempting to focus on the here and now, but we also have bookings for events as far ahead as next September. It's great to be in demand, but that means we also have to consider what equipment we need in order to do the best possible job.

We'll shortly be launching a fund-raising campaign to raise money for a new defibrillator.





It's a life-saving piece of kit, which is the only way of re-starting a heart which has stopped beating.

Our ambulance is always fully-equipped – including defibrillator - when it's attending an event. However, there have been several occasions in recent months when our members have covered up to 5 or 6 events in a single weekend. Clearly the ambulance can't be at all of them, but we still have to match the resources to the risk.

So we want to have a second defibrillator, which can be deployed with our second set of emergency kit. At around $\pounds 2,500$ it's not cheap, but it's the only thing that will work when it matters most.

Using a defibrillator is a key skill for all of our members and is taught in most of our public courses. It's a simple skill to learn and can be enhanced (in our Interme-

diate course) by the use of airways and oxygen. The latter are key topics for our January course, which is open to people who are already qualified in first aid but want to learn more. Enquiries – whether for courses or events - are always welcome to <u>alex_mac@btinternet.com</u> or on 873314.

e've been fairly busy at the Museum (MoC) recently!..... A couple of years ago, we decided that we needed to raise general awareness of the MoC's presence in Fife. We have successfully achieved this, via our continuing outreach activities and very popular lecture programme, along with regular press releases and our new website - not to mention our own Facebook page and Twitter feeds.

In early September, MoC Chairman, Prof. Tom Stevenson and I (Dorothy Brankin), gave a very well received talk in the University of Aberdeen, as part of the prestigious British Science Festival. After a quick dash across town, we boarded the ferry for Kirkwall, where the Orkney Science Festival had been opened earlier in the day, by the great Jane Goodall.

A hectic week followed, during which we presented two Talks: 'Sun, Clouds and Inspiration', that told the story of the great 19th century Orcadian scientist, Prof. Balfour Stewart and 'Dots, Dashes and Links through Stormy Seas' which traced the progress of maritime communications from the 1780s to 2012 with particular emphasis on Orkney's role in events.

Two of the items we took with us were of very particular interest to our audience in Kirkwall: an amazing 'World's First' horizontal hologram of the wreck of the Royal Oak, sunk in Scapa Flow by U-boat in the early days of WW2 and a Morse key salvaged from the battleship Grosser Kurfurst, scuttled in Scapa Flow in 1919. (The German Fleet was mustered at Inverkeithing, prior to being interned in Scapa Flow and after the salvage operation in the 1930s, many of the ships were broken up in Inverkeithing).

We displayed the hologram in Kirkwall Museum for several days and photographed the Morse key in the Stromness Museum, which has a large collection of relics from the scuttled German High Seas Fleet.

Back at the MoC in Burntisland, our 2012 exhibition 'Attention All Shipping', officially closed at the end of September, after a successful summer run.

Our exhibition may be closed, but we're still 'Open for Business' in Burntisland!





INVASION OF THE FLAT WORM

I 'm generally the sort of person who likes all creatures great and small, my bathroom in a haven for spiders as I can't bring myself to destroy their webs. However there are a few creatures that I would happily get rid off, usually ones that have been unwittingly imported and have no native

predators and so can run riot destroying local ecosystems. One such imported invasive species is the New Zealand flatworm. Originally it arrived on imported plants in the 60's. It is spreading across the UK and has arrived in Burntisland. The problem with this worm, which eats the humble earth worm, is that it's main predator is the New Zealand Kiwi and there are not many of them in Fife!



Earthworms are vital to a

healthy soil, they breakdown plant material and other organic matter, aerate the soil and produce rich and nutritious compost. Without them the soil becomes compact and less fertile. Flatworms can all but eradicate a population of earthworms. Whilst the flatworm is never likely to be totally removed it's spread can be slowed and we can make our garden's a welcoming place for the earthworm.

Flatworms are easy to identify - they're errr....flat rather than round like the earthworm! They are dark brown on top with a light band round the edge and a light underside. They often curl up like a Swiss roll and like hiding under objects close to the soil so regular checking under stones, bricks, pots and bits of wood can be the best way of discovering if they are in the garden. If you discover you do have a flatworm invasion check regularly under suitable hiding places, pop any you find into a jar and pour on boiling water. The Crop Research Institute are tracking their distribution so if you find any you can contact Dr Boag at the Institute (01382 562731 <u>bboag@scri.sari.ac.uk</u>).

Encouraging earthworms is even easier -a simple way is to start a compost heap. Compost heaps can become a great breeding ground for earthworms, and they'll soon spread out from the compost heap across the garden. If you don't have many, ask around and some one will, I'm sure, be happy supply you with a few to get you going.

A basic compost heap can be little more than a pile of grass clipping with some old newspaper or torn up cardboard mixed in. Almost everything that's organic can be composted so you can add food waste, plant cuttings, cardboard, sticks and chicken poo! There are as many different recipes for compost as there are gardeners but to begin with you don't have to worry about the exact mixture too much. If you have any problems then most garden's will happily give you some tips, you could contact the Broomhill Gardens or the Ecology Centre in Kinghorn and more info is available at <u>www.tinyurl.com/compostfife</u>.

Earthworms can also be encouraged by leaving an area of the garden 'wild'; avoiding pesticides and over use of fertilisers and make sure the ground is too compacted.




In January this coming year, along with two colleagues, I have the privilege of leading the first group from the wider Diocese of St Andrews on a visit to Kolkata. It will be a mixed group of clergy and laity from all parts of our Diocese, some are seasoned travellers and for some this will be their first venture beyond Europe. They will find that the Diocese of Calcutta is very different from our own and yet there are important similarities and strong

historical connections.

The Diocese retains the name Calcutta for legal and constitutional reasons, going to law in India is a protracted and expensive business, but there is also a strong feeling of identity with that older name among the church people. They are part of the Church of North India (CNI) which is a united church, a coming together of Anglicans, Presbyterians, Methodists and others. The congregations are still recognisably attached to their roots in the way they conduct worship but they are all part of the one church with their Bishop. I have much admiration for the clergy there for having the flexibility to serve in any of these diverse local churches within the Diocese of Calcutta. This then will be an interesting experience for our people and one to share on their return. There will be important ideas to feed back into our own Casting the Net Diocesan programme for growth and to share with our ecumenical partners. The Church of North India is very strongly and actively involved in matters of social concern. We will of course be offering our own Scottish experience of the way of Christ to our friends in Kolkata.
