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Swimming Club Duo Recieve Community Award

A couple of hours before revellers ushered in the New Year, Olive Grayson and Bob Main were formally informed that they had been selected as the 2013 Burntisland Community Award winners for their outstanding contributions over many years to the Burntisland Amateur Swimming Club. This was only the third occasion on which the award had been given jointly. Both Olive and Bob were totally surprised with the award and modestly shared the view that it was more of a reflection of the hard work of a number of people over the years in the Club, rather than of them as individuals.

Olive, who is originally from Edinburgh, settled in the town with her late husband some 38 years ago and raised her family of four in the town. She became involved with the Swimming Club over thirty years ago when her youngest son took up swimming. Olive became keenly interested in the Club, developed her own skills and expertise and over the years she has taught and encouraged hundreds of youngsters to swim. Her organisation abilities have proved indispensable as she has officiated as Gala Convenor on a number of occasions, served as Chairman of the Club between 1989 and 1991 and now holds the position as Honorary President which ensures that she maintains her place on the committee and that her vast experience is not lost.

Bob on the other hand, was brought up in Burntisland, attending the local Primary School and Kirkcaldy High. I grew up with Bob and we played rugby together at school and afterwards. Quiet, unassuming and modest are not words that I would ever have used to describe Bob's character - and I won't begin to use them now! On the rugby field Bob was very determined and competitive, a powerful centre-threequarter with explosive pace and a fearsome tackler. He would have scored many more tries had he been able to master the art of catching the ball!

Bob also became involved with the Swimming Club many years ago when his children took up the sport and was even encouraged to learn to swim himself. From thereon he began to teach the youngsters, officiated at galas as time keeper and judge, and has been Chairman of the Club for the past eight years. Bob is an inspirational leader and as he was at rugby, gives his all whilst striving for perfection and expects the same high standards from those that he mentors.

Olive and Bob have continued to serve the Club long after their offspring had left and their industry and dedication over such an extended period has proved to be an inspiration to others. Their voluntary efforts serve to generate a community spirit that makes local organisations such as the Swimming Club so successful. Both of our Citizens of the Year have been involved in other community organisations and Olive still regularly delivers library books to the housebound through the public library service.

Thriving communities such as Burntisland could not survive without such exemplary assets. Their community awards are richly deserved.

Editorial Comment.

We started the New Year with the traditional announcement of the winner of the Community Award. This year it has been awarded jointly to two individuals who have dedicated their time and considerable efforts to the development of Burntisland's youngsters through the Swimming Club. To Olive and Bob, we offer our sincere congratulations.

We extend our thanks to Keith Gibb, Burntisland's community police constable for the past nine years, who has been transferred to another posting within Fife. We wish him every success in his future career.

Anyone who attended the bonfire and fireworks display on the links on Guy Fawkes night will agree that it was the most spectacular ever, and probably the best in Fife. Crowds estimated at over 7,000 enjoyed the free display and were invited to make a donation towards the cost in numerous collection buckets on the night. Total revenue worked out at less than 25p per person, a disappointing figure. A more generous response in future would ease the financial concerns of the organising committee and ensure that this magnificent spectacle continues.

This issue contains information about two consultations - the first (page 4), is the preliminary salvo from the Community Council in an initiative to improve communications with the Burntisland community - the second (page 20), is conducted by Scottish Water, seeking the views of their customers before setting their priorities for their next five year strategic plan.

Readers could be forgiven for adopting a cynical attitude towards these consultations, following Fife Council's dismissive reaction to the groundswell of public opinion against the site for the new primary school. However, apathy and non-participation is not the answer. Such an attitude would suggest that you are happy with the status quo and you will have no grounds for complaint when future decisions are taken contrary to your wishes. Let us hear your views.

Finally, may we wish all our readers a joyous and prosperous New Year.

Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend and listen to discussion or to raise matters of interest to them. The full minutes of these meetings are displayed on the town notice board and in the Library. A summary of issues raised during the last three meetings is set out below.

Community Council bullets

- By a narrow majority, the Community Council took a neutral view on a planning application to develop shops on a *brownfield* site at the *Kirkton*. On the one hand, it will serve nearby homes and passing traffic on *Aberdour* Road. On the other, it will present competition for existing shops in the High Street.
- Following a grant of £22,000 from Fife Environment Trust, it is now possible for the conservation and restoration of the War Memorial to go ahead at a total cost of £57,000. However, subject to the approval of the funders, the landscaping of the area immediately adjacent will be put on hold and run as a separate project. A further £40,000 will need to be raised for that purpose.
- Work to temporarily dismantle the clock tower of the Burgh Chambers has now been completed. The legal consent for the take-down includes a legal requirement to re-build. Although investigations continue in the background, Fife Council have not yet given any indication of cost, timescale or source of funds
- A review of summer activity on the Links highlighted the possibility that the Links may in future be run by a Community Trust, with significant local input, rather than directly by Fife Council. No details are yet available but the Community Council will be offering to play a key role.
- On a casting vote by the Chair, it was agreed to support a Common Good Fund proposal for new play equipment on the Links. Whilst there was strong support for new play equipment, there was extreme concern that the Common Good Fund was being manipulated to subsidise Fife Council's statutory responsibility.
- New legal advice says very strongly that the Toll Park cannot be used as the site of a new school unless alternative parkland is first provided elsewhere. Precedents in Portobello and Wick, with input from 5 different legal sources, all point to the same conclusion. A reply is awaited from Fife Council.
- Members were pleased to note that dog wardens have been present in the town, equipped with cameras and long lenses. As a result, it is hoped that irresponsible dog owners will be traced and prosecuted.
- A formal objection has been lodged against the closure of the Royal Bank of Scotland branch in the High Street, which is due to take effect in March. We have asked RBS to come up with a more creative solution which will ensure continuity of service in Burntisland. If the closure goes ahead, the Community Council will close our account and transfer our business elsewhere.
- An objection has been lodged to the detailed planning application for the new school. Based on the legal opinions described above, we are asking for alternative parkland to be provided before any part of the Toll Park is closed to the public. We will also comment on the potential effect elsewhere in the town of slowing traffic by the use of speed tables at the Toll roundabout.

The Burgh Polis

With the festive season behind us, we look forward to the New Year, when we have a mostly new team at Burntisland Police Station. Our new faces are already familiar around town, from myself, Sgt Rachael Burns to new Community and Response Officers.

PC Keith Gibb who has served the community for over 8 years, has transferred to a new post at Police Headquarters in Glenrothes and we all wish him well. He has been replaced by PC Andy Pearson who has previously worked in Kirkcaldy, Dunfermline and North East Fife. Your new Community Team is now: PC Jez Graves, PC Andy Pearson, PC Tony Kinsell

The Community shift pattern has also changed which should result in a dedicated Burntisland Community Officer and/or Response Officer on duty at all times.

The recent Police Community Engagement (CEM) Meeting identified priorities as Antisocial Behaviour and Road Safety.

Antisocial Behaviour: I am pleased to report that there are currently very few calls of this type and no particular area of concern. Nevertheless, underage drinking and any associated antisocial behaviour remain high in our priorities and the Community Officers will continue conduct both high visibility and plain clothes patrols as a deterrent and to identify offenders.

Road Safety: Speeding continues to be an area of concern and at the latest CEM Meeting it was decided to concentrate efforts on the Kinghorn Loch Road/Kirkcaldy Road. Arrangements have been made for the Fife Police trailer/billboard to be positioned at the junction of the Kilcruik Road and B923 Road in Kinghorn to heighten driver awareness and Speed Monitoring will continue there during the coming months.

Community Traffic Wardens and Burntisland Officers have been tasked to monitor parking on Burntisland High Street and in the area of Burntisland Primary School and to take positive action when necessary.

Additionally, as we enter the New Year we are embarking on the following initiatives:

Operation Nightlight: With the dark nights still upon us, we are continuing to highlight any properties that are potential targets for thieves. The officers pass on crime prevention advice to the owners of any properties they identify as being at risk during the course of their patrols.

Women's Safety Course: We are finalising details for a Women's Safety Course. The venue and dates have still to be confirmed but this is a great event organised and run by our Community Team, Community Safety Officers and our partners and focuses on personal safety, internet safety, first aid, simple car maintenance and self defence. A visit from the Kinghorn and Burntisland Youth Fellowship who told us about their trip to Malawi, answered questions and showed fabulous pictures and video clips; a surprise visit to one of our Assemblies by representatives from Bernardos who presented certificates to four pupils, Emma McCullough, Aimee McLeod, Ellie Bruce and Leona Bruce, in recognition of their excellent fundraising efforts; P1's study of Katie Morag and all the fun things she gets up to on the Island of Struay; P2s travelled back in time to visit Rossend Castle as part of their Castles topic work; P3's pirate afternoon where parents and friends joined them in school to find out all the amazing things they had learned during their project; P4s had a very energetic outing at the Sky Community Games at Pitreavie where they tried lots of different sports; P5 classes all attended Youth Music Initiative workshops where they learned about the music of China; P6 classes enjoyed workshops with the Fire Service which were very informative and enjoyable. They also became 'Book Detectives' working together to take on different roles to help each other learn through reading books; and finally, P7 classes had a big mystery to solve last term as part of their 'Kidnapped' project. They investigated the disappearance of Jack and Sarah Green. This project covered numeracy, literacy, science, technology and expressive arts.

Congratulations to Mrs Whatmore who will be awarded with a certificate of Professional Recognition In Creativity at a ceremony to be held at the Scottish Parliament on the 29th January.

This term we have been joined by Sara Sierra, a teacher from Spain who will teach about her culture and language as part of a Comenius project, funded by the British Council. We are all really looking forward to learning about Spain between now and May.

Some of our senior pupils are excited about the prospect of performing at the Adam Smith Centre as part of the Fife Festival of Music at the end of January. P7s are looking forward to their trip to Ardroy in March which will afford lots of opportunities for outdoor learning, team-building and confidence-raising! We know they will have a fantastic time.

Floral Action Burntisland

Most of the planters around the town have been planted with bulbs and winter bedding plants. FAB decided to go through with this as it keeps some floral displays within Burntisland over the dreary winter months.

FAB volunteers and around twenty Scouts, their parents and leaders helped plant approximately 900 daffodil bulbs on the grass area between Kirkcaldy Road and Leith Avenue. There is already some daffodils within the grass area but it was felt that by planting more it



would enhance this entrance to the town. Hopefully we shall see our efforts in early spring when the daffodils come through the grass.

More bulb planting happened within the boat on Cromwell Road. This was part of FAB's link with the school and around a dozen children and their teacher helped us plant 400 bulbs. FAB volunteers also helped with planting winter pansies within the school grounds in early November.

Meetings have taken place with representatives of Fife Council to ensure a joint approach to this years plans for the town. We have taken delivery of new planters and basket trees which will be going up throughout the town over the next couple of months. Grants are being applied for and fundraising ideas discussed. This year we envisage the cost of our project to be in the region of £2000. We will be approaching local businesses in early spring to see if they will support FAB financially with either a donation or sponsorship.

The New School build is due to start in spring this year, with completion in August 2014.

The "Launch" of Boat 422

A couple of months ago, in Kirkcaldy High Street, I bumped into an old acquaintance from Burntisland whom I had not seen for years - none other than "Joe" Johnstone, former Superintendent at the old Swimming Pool, exshipwright at the Burntisland Shipyard and probably the most talented swimmer that the local swimming club has ever produced. Joe, who will shortly enter his eightieth year, lives with his wife in Dysart and keeps abreast with happenings in his home town through the Burgh Buzz.


We had a long chat about old times and he told me that he still had an amusing poem written by a shop steward (Hoppie the Shoppie) which tells the story of the launch or "failure to launch" Boat No 422 from the shipyard in early April 1969. This ship, the "Helen Miller", was the last to have been built in Burntisland Shipyard and the story of the

launch failure is also featured in the Heritage Trust publication, *Burntisland Voices*. Joe later passed on a photograph of the ship and a copy of the poem which is reproduced below. Peter George has identified the "poet" as Hoppie Innes, a shipwright at the time. Of the individuals featured, Tam Stenhouse was a chargehand shipwright, Andrew Nicol, head foreman shipwright and Tom Lawrence, a welder.

The poem, which bears a striking resemblance to another which appears in *Burntisland Voices*, is hardly an epic but it describes in simple language, the atmosphere of a launching ceremony, the industry of the workers and the rivalry between the various tradesmen in the "yard".

The wind was blawin', cauld an' loud
The time wis near - here comes the crowd
At three o'clock they got the cue
The time had come - launch 422!
The finest shipwright in the land
Tam Stenhouse cut the final strand
The "nobs" aw waited - aw weel dressed
We stood and watched them - unimpressed

But Christ Almighty - whit wis wrang? Efter aw this dance and sang
The bloody boat jist wid'nae budge
An' if it did - 'twis wi' a grudge
The carpenters aw puffed and blew
Auld Nicol's face a bright red hue
His worthiness he had tae prove
But still the boat refused tae move



Tammy Lawrence looked quite sick Tae him this did'nae tak a trick This wid look bad tae future buyers "Git oot the char - licht aw the fires"

We watched the shipwrights work and graft But we as welders - we just laughed. They tell us welders hiv' nae brains But we wid'nae burst nae veins Trying tae move thon bloody boat We just hung aboot tae gloat.

Whit a crown - an whit a show A bloomin boat that wid'nae go But heids up lads - don't be forlorn We can aye try again - the morn!

Opportunities Fife connecting learning, skills and jobs

Toll Centre Job Club

Looking for work? - We're here to help!

It's over a year since the Job Club moved to the Toll Centre and during that time about 50 local residents have taken advantage of the support available for job search (including

help with CVs and applications), training and career planning. In November Job Centre Plus introduced Universal Job Match (a new method of on line job search) which, over time, all job seekers will be encouraged to use. Not everyone has access to a computer with an internet link so it is anticipated that the Toll Centre computers available to job club members for online job search will be even more popular this year.

However, while there is a core of regular members, Ian and Alison, the Opportunities Fife development workers, are concerned that fewer new members have been signing up in the last couple of months. This is an important and useful facility for Burntisland but its continuation will depend on the use made of it by the local community. The Job Club runs throughout the year every Friday from 10 until 12.30 and individual appointments outwith these times are also available. For those not confident using a computer for job search, there are classes on Tuesday mornings.

Reproduced below is a letter received from the Blood Transfusion Service in response to a complaint from a regular donor which was carried in the last issue of the Buzz.

To the Editor.

The Scottish National Blood Transfusion Service would like to offer their sincere apologies for the level of service delivered on our visit to Burntisland on 3rd September last year. This is not the level of service we aspire to deliver to our blood donors in the area.

Donors will be aware that we have introduced a new process of sending the Donor Healthcheck Questionnaire (DHQ) to our donors' homes, in advance of the donating session, to allow them to complete the DHQ at a time that is convenient to them. This should then allow them to move more quickly through the donor session when they arrive to give blood.

As with most changes, there have been some initial problems that we are working hard to resolve, but feedback from most donors and staff has generally been positive. In addition, we have received a number of suggestions of areas for further development. Donor feedback is vital in helping us make further adjustments and improvements to the changes we are implementing.

To reduce unnecessary waiting we try to provide donors with as much information as possible in advance of the session, and indeed, at the donor session. Unfortunately we cannot display, or provide, all the criteria for donating blood in advance and would ask any donor who has a query to contact us on 0845-90-90-999 to ask any questions, and potentially avoid a wasted journey.

On our recent visit a large number of donors arrived in a short period of time and we, therefore, plan to introduce appointments to our donating sessions which will allow donors to book a time to donate that is convenient to them and will allow us to spread the attendance of donors over the duration of the entire donating session, helping to reduce unnecessary waiting times. We anticipate that these measures will reduce waiting times and improve the donating experience of all our donors. I am very sorry that we have not achieved this during our recent visit.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our donors for the many donations they have given in the past on behalf of those patients whose lives they have saved and improved by giving blood. I hope we are able to welcome back our donors to donate blood on 4th March 2013 and provide them with a much improved service.

Por more than 30 years The Toll Centre has provided a learning, leisure and community focus for the residents of Burntisland. The centre continues to be a popular venue for activities and clubs for all ages as well as providing a regular Job Club to help with CVs and job applications and also conducts regular computer classes.

Over the past year there have been some major changes at the Toll. Like other community centres, as Fife Council has adjusted the staffing and financial support it can offer, the Toll Centre now operates as an independent voluntary organisation employing its own Centre Supervisor and support staff. Whilst the Centre still receives a small grant and certain youth and learning activities are supported by Fife Council, we now need to raise essential income independently. This additional funding can be from lets, independent fundraising and from grants for the staffing and upkeep of the Centre which is essential if we are to survive and thrive.

The Centre with it's Supervisor and small team whose members work part time, are always looking for new helpers and volunteers to assist in manning the Centre during busy periods.

The Centre runs a successful Kids Club for Primary 4 -7 on Tuesday evenings which is very popular and is constantly on the look-out for volunteers to help out. Support and training will be provided. Fife Council runs youth clubs on Monday and Thursday evenings and a Music Project on Friday evenings.

Refurbishments and improvements are in train to make the Toll a more attractive venue. New French windows in the hall now opening directly onto the garden area. This provides a lovely, light venue for the recently established Tuesday Tai Chi classes which run from 1.45 to 2.45pm. This activity provides gentle exercise and is great for improving posture, reducing stress and relieving back pain. For the more energetic exercisers there is a Zumba class on Friday afternoons from 1.30 to 2.30pm - just time for young mum's to squeeze in a class before the school collection! A new Zumba Gold class for the less energetic will be starting on Thursday afternoons between 1pm – 2pm followed by the ever popular gymnastics class starting at 4pm. Garden improvements are also planned so by next spring the hall and garden should provide a fantastic venue for summer parties and activities.

The Toll also intends to consult with existing Centre users and the wider Burntisland community about ideas for improving and even adding to Centre activities. This consultation exercise will take place throughout the Spring.

Community Speed Watchget involved!

If a vehicle hits a pedestrian at 40 mph there is a 90% chance that the collision will result in death or serious injury; at 30mph it reduces to 40% and at 20mph to 10%. These simple statistics alone, demonstrate the need for speed restrictions within urban areas. However speed limits are futile without effective enforcement. Our local police do their best with limited resources and competing priorities and recognise that despite their efforts, speeding in Burntisland and on the approach roads continues. They therefore, would like to enlist the assistance of local residents by establishing a Community Speed Watch (CSW) squad.

CSW would operate in teams of three and after appropriate training, would be deployed at speeding hotspots in Burntisland. They would be equipped with visibility jackets, warning notices and a speed gun and would take note of speeding vehicles, details of which would be reported back to the police. Vehicle owners would then be issued with warning letters and repeat offenders would receive a visit and personal warning from the police.

Each duty session would be between one and two hours, possibly twice a week and could be less frequent, depending on the numbers in the CSW team. Turn out is entirely voluntary and there is no requirement to operate in inclement weather.

CSW teams are operating successfully in other areas of Fife and Alan Taaffe, the leader of the Kinglassie CSW, told me that his team has experienced very little adverse reaction from motorists, a perceived fear of prospective volunteers, and that his team's deployment has resulted in a noticeable reduction in speeding through the village.

Why not offer your services to improve road safety in your community. You could save a child's life!



Infortunately not a lot of football has taken place since the last issue as the weather has once again taken its toll. However, off the field plenty has happened or is about to happen in the coming year.

Firstly, the club was delighted to be awarded a "Standard Quality Mark" for youth football. The Quality Mark Award – part of the Quality Mark Accreditation Scheme run by the Scottish FA in partnership with McDonald's and Sportscotland – recognises pro-active clubs and schools working to increase youth and community participation. Our youth football programme will also be subject to licensing but as we stand, with the Quality Mark gained and our policies towards youth development having been approved, we are satisfied with the progress made so far.

Together with the guidance of Scottish Football Association and the Scottish Football Partnership, the club, hopefully with the backing of the local community, will endeavour to achieve a license.

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

Readers will be aware that measures to permanently solve the Haugh Road and Kirkton Road flooding and related issues fell outside the Company's current strategic priorities. We now have an opportunity to encourage Scottish Water sit up and listen to our views and hopefully have remedial action included in their next five year plan.

However, it will require as many Burntisland residents as possible to take the time to express their views to the Company.

The Sound of Silence

As you walk along Burntisland High Street there is a definite sense that something is missing, and when you look up, you realise that the thing missing is the clock tower. There is a definite sense of resignation about it and people have been heard muttering "I'll not see that back in my lifetime.."

Fortunately this pessimism is unfounded and the truth is that a lot of work has been going on behind the scenes since the tower was dismantled. The stone has been analysed and a source of replacement stone has been identified. The amount required has been assessed, funding has been sourced to purchase the stone and work has commenced on the design for reassembly. There is still some work to be done on sourcing funding for the actual rebuilding but it looks very positive that this will be achieved. It is certainly very encouraging that the replacement stone is to be bought as you would hope that this investment signals a real intent to rebuild in the near future. It is also worth remembering that the clock tower is a category B listed building which means that it has to be restored. Interestingly during the dismantling it became apparent that the tower had been dismantled and rebuilt before (over 100 years ago) so it is not the first time Burntisland has faced rebuilding of the clock tower.

Hopefully the project will keep ticking along smoothly and we will not have to wait too long until the striking of the hour is marked with something other than a deafening silence. It would certainly be nice to prove the pessimists wrong in this case.


