# **Are you Happy With Your Railway Station?**

## Editorial and Community Council

### Editorial Comment

It is gratifying to note that not all of the copies of the Buzz "go straight in the bucket"! I have had insufficient space to include all of the letters and apologise if yours has been omitted.

On the other hand, I have included all of the letters that I received opposing the Buzz's view on the proposed commercial development at the Kirkton. Also included on page 7, is an article which summarises the points which have been made in favour of the development. The original article has certainly given rise to debate within the town and although I have not changed my stance on the issue, it has served to draw my attention to the negative aspects of adopting a firm stance on a local issue in a quarterly publication. Any reader who may oppose the published view, does not have an immediate opportunity to respond. A 3 month old response will never have the same impact. This will be taken into consideration if a similar situation arises in the future.

On the topic of local issues, the question of poor access to Burntisland railway station is the focus of a newly formed "action group". Much research has already been carried out and the individual responsibilities and policies of Transport Scotland and Network Rail have been identified. If you wish to find out more or express your own opinions or suggestions, make sure that you attend the public meeting at the Toll Centre on Wednesday 14th August.

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Burntisland has just experienced a very busy couple of months during which visitors and residents alike, have experienced the town at its very best. Although the recent fine weather has contributed, the environment and associated events would not have been so successful without the hard work and dedication of the large number of volunteers and officials. Special mention must be made of the Civic Week and Highland Games Committees and of the sterling efforts of Floral Action Burntisland who have done so much to make the town more attractive.

The fact that this issue contains an amazing pictorial record of all these events is due almost entirely to the diligence and professional expertise of our young photographer, Michael Booth. Thank you Michael for all your efforts.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who contribute regularly to this publication and above all to our advertisers, many of whom have been with us for almost four years.

Without your continued support we could not afford to publish the Buzz and distribute it throughout the community, free of charge.

# **Community Council**

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend and listen to discussion or to raise matters of interest to them. The full minutes of these meetings are displayed in the Library and on the community notice board in Union Street. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

# Community Council Bullets .....

- Stairs between the shipyard and Shepherd Crescent were closed by one department of Fife Council on the grounds that they were unsafe and there was no budget to repair them. However, there are conflicting reports on their true condition and the potential cost of reinstatement. Options for repair to an appropriate standard are being investigated.
- Traffic calming is planned for Leith Avenue, Laburnum Grove and Kirkcaldy Road.
  - A proposal to develop a Community Action Plan for Burntisland has been discussed with the STAR Development Group. They are experts in preparing such plans, which have led to large grants for community initiatives elsewhere. However, the initial plan should ideally include community consultation to a professional standard. Work is in hand to seek the necessary financial support, but it will not be a quick process.
- Quotes have been obtained and funding is being sought to conserve and restore the historic furniture in the Burgh Chambers.
- Four members met the Emergency Planning team at Fife House to help identify a possible role for the Community Council in the event of a major incident. Example scenarios might include fire, flood, power outage or similar large-scale events. In Burntisland, a key resource would be the Toll Centre. However, there also has to be a process for cascading help and information throughout the community. Follow-through discussions will take place over the next few months.
- Grounds maintenance has now been carried out at the cemetery, following a gap in the schedule, and plans are in hand to ensure continuity of upkeep.
- Weed growth on the footway approaching Starley Hall has been reported and dealt with.
- Recent studies show that wind turbines near to *Mossmorran* have no effect on emissions to the atmosphere, which are already well below the normal background level for rural areas.
- Steps will be taken to clarify the guidelines for using the community notice board at Union Street, particularly to help identify what is or is not a commercial advertisement.
- Five members will shortly meet officials from Fife Council to discuss Burntisland's Common Good Fund and in particular the identification and management of selected properties.

# The Burgh Polis

e are now firmly established as a unit of Fife Division of the Police Service of Scotland but

other than the appointment of Sergeant Stuart Davidson, there have been no discernible changes in Burntisland. Local policing priorities have been identified through bi-monthly Community Engagement Meetings and consultation and agreement within the Multi Member Ward Plan.

These priorities are currently Road Safety, Anti-Social Behaviour and Substance Misuse.

**Road Safety** - Officers with speed detection devices have targeted areas, including the main routes in and out of Burntisland, which have been identified by members of the public. Numerous drivers have been given advice and warnings and a further two issued with fixed penalty tickets and automatic penalty points on their licence. Additionally, increased efforts are being made to educate the driving public as to the dangers of exceeding speed limits, particularly in the Burntisland area.

Anti-social Behaviour. – The dedication and industry of local community officers is reflected in the safer Burntisland environment. The incidence of anti social crime is down and the detection rate of offenders has increased. Regular, high visibility, foot and mobile patrols, particularly at weekends and based on sound intelligence, serve to prevent crimes occurring and ensure a quick response to any incident that may happen.

**Substance misuse** - Community officers have conducted regular checks of licensed premises and are developing good working relationships with landlords and staff. Illegal substances were seized and a cannabis plantation detected as a result of raids under warrant, with both occupiers having been reported to the Procurator Fiscal. These raids will continue as Community Officers are fully committed to reducing the harm inflicted on the community through the abuse of illegal substances.

We would like to thank the public for the information and assistance that they continually give us which helps to make our streets safer. We have demonstrated our commitment to investigate and act upon information given to us by the public and would implore anybody who has information to contact Police Service of Scotland on 101 or Crimestoppers on 0800 500 111. All information will be dealt with in the strictest confidence and you have the option of remaining anonymous if you so wish.

The Burntisland, Kinghorn and Western Kirkcaldy Community Policing team is committed to allowing you to directly influence local policing. You can have your say on local priorities by attending the Community Engagement Meetings

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
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Parent Council News

# Common Good Fund - in all our interests!

A cres of land, property in prime locations and cash investments are all reserved for the benefit of local people. Whether we derive the benefit to which we are entitled is an open question.

Fife Council received an adverse auditors' report in 2009 over their management of Common Good Funds. For example, it was noted that "there is a risk that the Common Good funds do not receive rental income which is rightfully theirs". In response, they started to set up a register of Common Good assets, which they reviewed with the Community Council. However, little has been done since 2010.

#### So there are still two key problems.

One is simply in identifying the relevant assets. Some are obvious and agreed -e.g. the Burgh Chambers, the Links, the Young Hall, Unity Hall and so on. Others remain in doubt -e.g. the Roundhouse car park and some housing.

The second problem is in the management of those assets. Records are held in different places and on different systems. So there is often conflicting information about the true financial position. Often, the responsible department does not know about the Common Good status of the property in their care. So they overlook the legal requirement to manage it "having regard to the interests" of the community.

Sometimes those interests are perfectly clear. If the Community Council and the local elected members of Fife Council are in agreement, then it's a powerful statement of where the local interest lies. If we disagree with each other, then Fife Council does have the power to decide which opinion is the more truly representative.

Agreed Common Good properties include: The Links Galahill Haugh Road Unity Hall Young Hall War Memorial Toll Park Beach Burgh Chambers Ross Point

It's fair to say that in some respects the law relating to Common Good Funds is not clear. For example, where there is any dissent the Courts require local authorities to seek their permission before disposing of Common Good property. However, different lawyers earn their crust by placing a particular spin on the details of the law. So they may challenge what is meant by "dissent" or what is meant by "disposal".

It's complicated further because Common Good Funds are managed ultimately by the local

authority, who may in turn have a conflict of interest. It's clearly tempting for them to save money on their other budgets by drawing on Common Good assets.

#### So where does all of that leave Burntisland?

Firstly, mistakes are made and the Community Council does its best to hold Fife Council to account. One example is the rent which Fife Council pays for its own use of Common Good property. In the past, the agreed period for a rent review has been seriously overlooked. Sometimes the terms of lease are not what local people want, but the deal is done before we find out.

In addition, cash assets may be depleted beyond the point where property can be maintained. From time to time donations have been made for very worthy causes, but they're difficult to define as being in the wider interests of the community.

So we're now exploring other possible options to ensure that the community does indeed get full benefit.

We need to be able to say accurately "this is what local people want" from our Common Good assets. To get the best result, it means carrying out a reliable survey of local people. We're already in discussion with consultants who specialise in exactly that field. However, it will be best if we can complete the survey and prepare a Community Action Plan with a mixture of voluntary and professional support.

That means raising money to carry out the survey and it's a very slow process. However, once the action plan has been prepared, we will have solid evidence to support other funding applications which will have clearly defined outcomes.

One possibility is whether a Community Trust could take responsibility for some or all of the Common Good Fund. That would mean, for example, that local people would manage the Links – by setting priorities, conditions of use and so on. As a result, maintenance (and funding) would become a local responsibility. It would also mean that we can drive local initiatives to bring underused properties back into use. So the Burgh Chambers could be used much more actively and perhaps the Young Hall could be more easily integrated into the High Street.

The possibilities are limited only by local imagination and endeavour – and by a willingness on the part of Fife Council to devolve significant responsibility.

The key message is that it's "our" Common Good Fund. If we want to maximise the local benefit then we should equally maximise local responsibility. Right now the Community Council are in discussion with Fife Council on how that could best be done. There are no quick solutions, but knowing what local people want will be critical to a successful outcome.

# **Proposed Kirkton Commercial Development...... An Alternative View**

**F** rom the reaction to last month's front page article, it would definitely appear that people do read the Buzz. The whole point of the article was to bring to the fore and invite comments and debate on an issue that is never going to be clear cut one way or another and which seemed to be very much in the background. It was encouraging to see so many people taking the time to put their point across, both on Facebook and in direct communication with the editor, the first time this has occurred since the current team took over the Buzz over three years ago. There is no doubt that a lot of people feel strongly about this proposal and hopefully this article will redress the balance and put across some of the views of those in favour of the development.

Obviously the new development would be convenient for those who live in the surrounding area but it has also been pointed out that if the town is going to expand in any direction, it will be towards Aberdour. Consequently, what we now know as the town centre may no longer be the centre of town geographically. Parking on the High Street is not always easy so perhaps people who currently go out of town to shop would stay locally rather than going to surrounding towns which would benefit the local economy. The point has also been made that for a community the size of Burntisland, there are a lot of goods and services not available in the town and perhaps the new retail units would attract these things rather than competing directly with the shops we already have on the High Street. This could only be good for the town and could create new jobs without threatening existing jobs and businesses. Others say that the shops we have on the High Street could do with a bit of competition as they are too expensive! Although to be fair, these are not the easiest times to run a retail business and perhaps to compare High Street prices with the internet and large multiple retailers is unjust. One reader pointed out that it is difficult for those who work out of town to use the High Street shops as they are closed by the time they get home. They also suggested a late night shopping evening on the High Street to address this. What would the High Street retailers think of that? The Buzz would love to hear.

There are a lot of good, well thought out arguments for both sides of this debate and people will have made up their minds for themselves by now. Whether you favour tradition and the historical status quo or whether you are for progression and development, the proposal is now in the hands of the planners and only time will bring an outcome.

Once again the Buzz would love to hear what you think about this and also any other issues that you feel Burntislanders should be aware of, and people should be talking about.

With reference to your front page article "The Slowing Heartbeat", I would like to tender a different viewpoint:-

Not so long ago, the Kirkton area, which encompasses approximately a third of the population of Burntisland, had a thriving retail and business sector with Haxton, Blackhalls, Pops Store, Kirkton Dairy, Kirkton Laundry, Petrol Station, Joinery, Chip shop, Post Office (Grange Road), Leonard Hotel and Auld House all now gone or closed. Previously I was against the new retail development but like most High Streets I now acknowledge that ours is in a natural decline. The previous, modernisation of the High Street has been an abysmal failure and major surgery is required to resuscitate it. Meanwhile the town of Burntisland is changing shape with the west side set to expand dramatically. I believe that objecting to this new retail initiative does more harm than good to Burntisland as a whole. We need to recognise this and find a compromise that encourages the regeneration of the Kirkton area to support this expansion. I welcome any initiative that builds on the example of David Sands, who revitalised the old Co-op so much that the Co-op bought their old shop back. This development could breathe new life back into the Kirkton area, bringing new jobs and 70 parking spaces.

By the way, the Kirkton also used to have its own public toilets but that is another story.

People may say that not many disabled people use Burntisland station. Well, how about giving them a chance?

All these and many more clubs and societies are illustrated on panels prepared by Burntisland Heritage volunteers as usual to very highest standards.



Come into the world of Burntisland after the working day. There are the many football teams, rugby, archery, bowls, skating, tennis and curling. Then we have the clubs and organisations Masonic, Rural, Townswoman, Temperance, Speakers, drama, dance not to mention the various church and youth groups. The list goes on and poses the question how did we have time for all this? The exhibits have a lot of interesting pictures of the activities which are bound to stir memories in the older generations provoke questions from the younger.

The exhibition also has some superb displays by Primary 7 pupils at Burntisland from their project work on the organisations that they belong to in the community. In addition to this special Exhibition, Burntisland Heritage's many volumes of historical material and DVD's will be open for viewing by visitors.

Burntisland at Play is open until 31<sup>st</sup> August. The opening times are Wednesdays 1.00 to 4.00pm and Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays 11.00am to 4.00pm. Entrance is free.



# **Museum of Communications** By Dorothy Brankin

*ll our Yesterdays – Life before the Mobile!* is the title of the Museum of Communication's latest . exhibition in Burntisland. It is a nostalgic trip down 'Memory Lane' for our more mature visitors and an astonishing 'eye opener' for the young!

The phone-in-your-pocket that we all take for granted, has been around about 30 years now, but before the mobile, all these functions were performed by individual devices, invented or perfected many years ago. At the time, they seemed 'marvels of the age' and it was difficult to imagine how they could ever be improved.

Our Exhibition invites you to discover – or remember – how some of these old technologies worked. On display is a replica of Alexander Graham Bell's original telephone of 1876 (made of oak – of course!) alongside a 'Blackberry' its modern counterpart. Everything else on show can now be found in the mobile in your pocket...

We have examples of telephones from the 1890s through to a very early 'Mobile' of the '80s - known as 'The Brick' for obvious reasons! - and not forgetting the notorious 'Trimphone', which everyone remembers but nobody liked! Also included is our very popular working Strowger Telephone Exchange.

No mobile phone is complete without music – so we have various wind up Gramophones dating from the early 1900s to the teenagers' 'Must Have' portable record player of the 1960s - as well as a couple of 1890s Graphophones, complete with wax cylinders. Bring us your records and we'll play them for you!

We've also got the world's first Video Recorder on display. It dates from 1964, is the size of a large suitcase, Black+White, (only 2 channels were available at the time!) and cost a staggering  $\pounds 1,200$  More than a family car – and far more than the average annual salary!

We take a look at Radio, with a few of our favourites, including a 1922 AJS, with valves sitting on the front; Wartime Civilian Receiver made out of plywood; a couple of very attractive Bakelite models from the '30s, a few 'trannies' and a 'pop-art' radio in the form of a 1928 Sports Car, whose spare wheel is the volume control!

Television also features and we pay tribute to John Logie Baird. On display is a kit version of the 'Televisor', Baird's first television set, dating from 1930. (The commercially produced Televisor was 'beyond the reach' of many purses, so you could buy the components in kit form and build them into your own case.)

Finally, we have a sort of 'catch-all' of many of the other components in your mobile phone: typewriters (no delete button!), adding machines, cameras, wire recorders - everything from Snakes and Ladders to computers... and the list is growing steadily and rapidly.

Additionally, we have lots of 'Hands-On!' equipment..... Signalling Lamps, Semaphore Flags, Morse Keys, Speaking Tubes, Phones, Railway Block Telegraphs.

The Exhibition is open every Wednesday and Saturday from 11. 0 h to 4.00 pm.

Admission costs £3 and includes refreshments in our upstairs cafe.

The Toll Centre opened in 1975 and provides a home for a wide range of community activities in Burntisland. Many people think the centre belongs to Fife Council, however it is actually owned by the people of Burntisland and managed by a small voluntary committee, along with the help of 5 paid members of staff who all work part time.

The Centre was originally formed out of Youth Clubs Burntisland, and there is still a real focus on providing services for children and young people. The Playgroup and Burntisland Out of School Service are both based at the Toll, along with evening youth clubs, football coaching, Taekwon-do and Gymnastics.

However, there are also lots of activities for 'more mature' Burntislanders – from computer classes and job club, to Tai-Chi and the Wednesday Social Club.

Recently the Centre worked with Colinsburgh Community Cinema to set up a 'BIG SCREEN' showing of Brave – this was really popular and there are now plans underway to make the 'Toll Cinema Experience' a regular part of the programme of activities from this autumn.

Other events that people can look forward to include a family barbeque on 28th July, and a quiz night on 24th August, along with more of the ever popular kids discos.

As well as the activities organised by the Toll Committee, there a number of rooms available for private let – including the main hall and a new meeting room. The Ramsay Budd suite has been upgraded and, thanks to a grant that BOSS received from Kirkcaldy Kanes, the old shower room has been removed and the room is now much larger, lighter and brighter.

The Centre is financially supported to some extent by grants from the Council, but now relies more than ever on grants from other organisations, private lets, and fund raising to meet running cost the source is a 50/50 club that allows people the chance to win a cash prize every month – forms are available at the Toll Centre and on our website www.tollcentre.org.uk.

Most visits are one to one but the group contains one married couple and two ladies who perform their visits together. These are social


weeks, and many friendships have been formed as a result.


