Martin Wins Gold for Scotland

ARTIN Hunter, who has lived all of his 45 years in Burntisland, recently brought home a gold medal which he won at the International Bowls for the Disabled World Championships in Wellington, New Zealand where he represented Scotland. Martin's success was a culmination of many years of hard work and dedication to attain a standard which is the envy of many able bodied bowlers. Born with spina bifida which seriously restricted growth and movement in his lower right leg, Martin was introduced to the game at the age of 12 by his father at the former Aluminium Club at Collinswell. When that Club closed he transferred his allegiance to Burntisland Bowling Club where his standard of play has progressed to the extent that he has won two Scottish and three Fife singles championships in the B7 category. This category is for bowlers who have severe problems with balance but are able to stand unaided. Fairness is assured within the various categories by regular professional assessments

of the bowlers' disability.



Martin was one of thirteen Scottish bowlers who took part in the World Championships between 17th and 27th February. A total of 11 countries participated and Martin deservedly won through to the knock-out phase of the singles competition by winning his last round-robin match to finish second in his section. In the semi-final he comprehensively defeated the previously unbeaten Korean bowler (21-9) to set up a final against Australia. In a much tighter contest but playing the "best bowls of his life", the Burntisland bowler emerged victorious (21-16), a tremendous achievement. Martin hopes to build on this success by securing selection for the Scottish team for the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast, Australia in 2018.

Martin's achievement has done much to promote the town globally and he has been officially recognised by the Burntisland Community Council with the presentation of a congratulatory card and gift.

Local Boy Ali McLeod is to play for Scotland.

LI who lives in Burntisland with his mum and dad and his younger brother Lewis has been selected to play Ice Hockey for Scotland.

Ali who is a pupil at Burntisland Primary School first went on the ice in January

Ali who is a pupil at Burntisland Primary School first went on the ice in January 2013 and he seemed to take to it with ease – there was no fear, and very quickly it became clear that he had a natural talent. After watching The Fife Flyers he showed interest in becoming an ice hockey player.

However he was told by the coaches he had to be serious about Ice Hockey if he wanted to join the training team; serious about training, food and nutrition, team encouragement and behaviour on and off the ice, all of which formed the total package expected. He was serious and so he joined "learn to play" at Kirkcaldy Ice Hockey Club. He progressed to their under 10's team, 'The Eagles', and settled well into his position of defence, playing home and away games throughout Scotland and in Sheffield. In his first year of Ice Hockey he gained the award of "best improved player" and often he achieved the accolade of "Man of the Match". In his second year he has progressed to the under 12's team, 'The Redskins'.

After gaining recognition from a Scotland ice hockey scout, Ali was invited to attend a series of intensive Scotland trials in Dumfries and eventually was selected to join the Scotland under 11's squad.

His first International game was against France at Angers on 4th April and a month later, he will play against England in Sheffield Arena.

Ali has done extremely well in a very short period of time to be chosen to play for his local team and for his country. He is fortunate to have the support of his family and significant sponsorship from local company, Briggs Marine.

Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend and listen to discussion or to raise matters of interest to them. The full minutes of these meetings are displayed on the town notice board and in the Library. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Lesley-Anne Cronin has been welcomed as a full member of the Community Council. One vacancy remains.
- 9 members visited the new primary school and were given a guided tour by head teacher Julie Anderson.
- Fife Council announced a new fund for the renewal and transfer of community assets, focusing on feasibility and preparatory work aimed at attracting external funding. At least £50,000 of the total fund has been earmarked for Burntisland. The Community Council has submitted a bid for funding to support widespread local consultation. It will be used to identify what local people want, what is sustainable, and how best to combine the two. Subsequent bids for funding will then focus on the commercial, architectural, social and operational feasibility of selected projects.
- An ad hoc group led by Burntisland Heritage Trust and supported by the Community Council is pursuing funds for the upgrading and interpretation of the Kirkton cemetery.
- Granite setts recovered from the High Street re-surfacing are likely to be used to upgrade the land adjoining the war memorial.
- There is a strong focus on the condition and replacement of play equipment at the East and West Links but we are awaiting a fuller report on the condition of all play equipment in the town. A public consultation will be held on 6th to 8th May.
- Historic furniture in the Burgh Chambers has been re-upholstered to match the original leather.
- A card and memento were presented to Martin Hunter to mark his success in winning a gold medal in the World Disabled Bowling Championships in New Zealand.
- The members gave broad support to a proposal to host "Live on the Links" as a music festival in future years, subject to a more detailed review of conditions. This year's event will be at indoor venues.
- The map panels at the Kirkgate and the Porte are now over 10 years old and need to be updated and replaced. The work is being led by Burntisland Heritage Trust and will be supported by the Community Council.
- Several members will work with the Heritage Trust to help ensure that new fingerpost signs will be appropriately designed and located.
- There is a major concern over parking at the railway station which is clearly inadequate for the demand and has been made worse by new restrictions at Forth Place. We will be supporting investigations into other options.
- There is unanimous support among the Community Council members for Fife Council to prevent parking on the grass at the Links and to ensure that adequate parking facilities are provided elsewhere.

Scots Verse Trophies Presentation

N the evening of 27th February Burntisland Community Council hosted a civic reception in the Burgh Chambers to honour the six trophy winners of the Annual Scots Verse Competition. The Council Chairman Alex MacDonald explained at the outset how the competition had originated in 1986 to commemorate the 700th Anniversary of the death of King Alexander III who was fatally injured in a fall from his horse above Pettycur sands. Over the past 29 years the competition had been extended to include pupils from Primary 1 – 6 at Burntisland Primary School, the main aim being to encourage and improve the confidence and ability of the children to speak in public.

All six winners confidently recited their pieces with feeling, gestures and facial expressions before an appreciative audience of families, friends and councillors. The poems ranged from "Cat and Mouse" by JK Annand recited by Angus Crawford of Primary 1 to the "Magic Pizza" by Alison Fitt in a very amusing presentation by Eilidh Bachelor of Primary 5. All winners were individually presented with their trophies and medals by George Mclaughlan, Community Councillor and partner in local company Hanselled Books, which had sponsored the event this year. Following the presentations, everyone was invited to partake of refreshments and a sumptuous finger buffet in the adjacent Council Chamber.

Civic Reception was held in the Burgh Chambers on the evening of 6th February, to honour the 2015 Citizen of the Year, Walter Anderson. A large number of guests including former Award Winners, Community Councillors, Walter's family and many friends witnessed the presentation of the Citizen's Shield and a magnificent personal certificate designed and crafted by local artist and calligrapher, Duncan Gilfillan.

In his presentation address, the Chairman of the Community Council Alex MacDonald outlined the history of the award and the diverse nature of the winners since it was first presented in 1981. He further explained how difficult it was for the Community Council to come to a decision because of the quality of the nominees. However, Walter had been selected as a worthy recipient because of the dedication and perseverance which he has applied in local affairs over several decades - the local Pipe Band, the Rotary Club and the establishment of the Beacon Centre are but three local issues/organisations which have thrived over the years with considerable personal input from Walter.

In his reply Walter said he felt honoured but surprised at the award and expressed his thanks to all who had supported him over the years, particularly his

close family. He expressed the hope that during the various civic engagements that he is likely to attend throughout the year, he could be joined by former recipients of the Civic Award, who remain active within the community

T seems incredible to think that more than two decades have passed since the news of a search for a shipwreck first appeared in the local and national press. Where is the ferry boat that vanished in the summer storm on Wednesday the 10th July in 1633 off the coast of Burntisland? ... And what happened to its royal cargo, half a ton of silver and the riches of a king? In more recent times it is one of the longest running and most tantalising of treasure hunts. The search sparked off a huge amount of local interest and a support group was formed in the town in 1994. The mission to find the shipwreck was the stimulus for what was eventually to become Burntisland Heritage Trust. Eventually the search itself was taken over and a project team formed by the Trust.

The story of the shipwreck, the aftermath and the quest to find the wreck is brought up to date and told in a seven panel display in this year's summer heritage exhibition. This tale however is only a small part of this comprehensive display which looks at journeys over the Forth from the days of the early pilgrims to the present day and the key role Burntisland has played over the centuries. The exhibition uses over 100 images to illustrate the stories and many topics relating to battles, ill-fated romance, stormy passages, ferry crossings including the world's first roll-on roll-off ferry and of course the world famous Forth Bridges.

In addition to the display and numerous scrapbooks there is a large collection of DVDs for viewing including a time lapsed video showing progress on the new Queensferry Passage Bridge due to be opened in 2016.

Burntisland and Flekkefjord Town Twinning Celebrates their 70th Anniversary in 2016



OST people in Burntisland will (hopefully!) be aware that

V we are twinned with Flekkefjord, a small coastal town on the southern tip of Norway.

The twinning arrangement began in 1946 when a representative from Norway travelled to Burntisland and persuaded the town council to set up the link.

The focus of the twinning has traditionally been on a youth exchange and over the years almost 200 young people have made the trip between the towns. Some of our early exchanges are now in their seventies and eighties and look back with many fond memories of the experience.

A rather younger participant, Bruce Stuart, owner of Food for Thought, recalls his experience:

"I first went to Flekkefjord in 1972 at the ripe old age of 11 with my brother Ron. We drove there in a mini with a tartan boot and bonnet with a saltire on the roof! We delivered a letter from our then Provost to the Mayor of Flekkefjord. We were shown round and treated wonderfully. Everyone spoke to Ron and I in English which made a huge impression on me. So much so that when I moved up to Balwearie, I decided to study Norwegian under a brilliant teacher, William Grahamslaw.


I was chosen to represent Burntisland in the mid 70's and spent a couple of wonderful weeks staying with the Prestegård family. After that it was back and forth on numerous occasions culminating in me working in the Hotell Maratim for a time, which improved my Norwegian no end!

I returned in the early 80's but then life sort of got in the way and the years passed far too quickly. However, I was lucky enough to return to Flekkefjord last year as a representative of Burntisland Town Twinning as part of their 17th of May celebrations. I was reunited with Bøye & Vigdis Prestegård - My Norwegian 'Mum & Dad' - and it was truly amazing. A handshake and a hug made 30+ years disappear magically; it was if I had never been away."

Next year will be the 70th anniversary of our twinning with Flekkefjord and we are planning to have a suitably fitting event to mark the occasion. A whole host of activities will be involved in Burntisland and beyond during the summer. We are primarily looking for young people in the 13–15 years age group, who can host a similarly aged guest from Flekkefjord with a view to travelling to Norway in 2017.

However, whatever your age, if you'd like to be part of this celebration and future town twinning activities, please do get in touch. Also, we are looking at setting up a stand on Parade Day during Civic Week to inspire people to get involved. In WWI the mighty Zeppelin terrorised the land; it was 529 feet long and had a maximum speed of 53 mph... Only 20 years later, the far more deadly Messerschmitt 109 was a mere 29 feet 6 inches long, with a maximum speed of 398 mph! The exhibition opens on 2nd May.

JAMES CLERK MAXWELL is universally regarded, along with Newton and Einstein, as one of the greatest physicists of all time. 2015 has been declared 'The International Year of Light', to mark the 150th anniversary of the publication of his electromagnetic theory of light, on which much of modern physics is built – from radio waves to relativity, the Higgs field and the theory of gases. Maxwell showed that Saturn's rings are made of rocks and also took the first ever colour photograph – all in a life of only 48 years.

A 'Light Baton', resembling the Olympic torch has been specially commissioned (constructed by Mike Stoane Lighting,



Burntislanders push the boat out....to Norway by Sarah Price

AY 'Norway' to the average person and their imagination may float to visions of Vikings, forests and Ifjords. Or perhaps, to the convoluted thrills of their favourite cult Norwegian TV drama. People of Burntisland have extra links with our closest neighbour to the east through the Burntisland-Flekkefjord twinning project (see page 7 in this month's Buzz) which next year celebrates its 70th anniversary.

To celebrate and mark the connection, a small flotilla of yachts from Burntisland Sailing Club is planning in 2016 to reverse the track across the North Sea taken by the early invaders. However, unlike the Vikings, whose arrival may have caused fear and mayhem, the modern flotilla will sail strictly in a spirit of peace and friendship.

One of the yachts planning to make the passage is the 30ft 'Sonas' jointly owned by 2 locals, both brought up in the town. Gordon Alder and Martin Birrell are already preparing for the voyage. Gordon first proposed the idea over a year ago. 'Planning is incredibly important for the success of this trip' says Gordon, 'making sure the yacht is safe and seaworthy and that we are properly provisioned for the crossing, which we estimate will take about 3 days'.

One thing that cannot be anticipated too far in advance however, is the weather, Gordon added, 'When the time comes we will try and pick a suitable window, when the wind will be most favourable, neither too much of it, nor too little'. Modern yachts are considerably more wind-efficient than the old Viking longships. But for both new and ancient sailing vessels alike, it remains a challenge when the wind dies completely. 'Unlike the Vikings, you can be certain that we won't be getting the oars out when the wind drops!' says Martin. 'These days, at the heart of many a sleek yacht is a thumping great diesel

The Environment - Dos Foulins

Let's Clean Up The Town!

HERE'S an infection in this town that affects each and every one of us as we go about our lives. It lies in wait for us in the busiest places - along our most used walking routes, at bus stops, on the way to school, along the High Street and all around our parks and green spaces. Should you come into contact with this infection (which is very easy to do especially for kids) it can stick to your shoes, be smeared onto your clothes and can be dragged through your house. It smells disgusting and is very hard to get rid of. It can give you a sore throat or a stomach ache and in some cases cause blindness or asthma.

The infection is dog's dirt - and, according to many - Burntisland is covered in it!!

Many disgusted and frustrated residents have pleaded with the Buzz to highlight the problem and examine ways to eliminate it.

So what are the main issues with dog's dirt? Apart being disgusting - it can be dangerous if picked up, a ball can roll through it, a shoe can be pulled off that stood in it, kids can roll through it when they're playing, your own pets can run through it and bring it into your house. Cleaning it up is a horrible job but what if it contains Roundworm eggs?

Toxacara canis is a roundworm found in dogs and their eggs live in dog's dirt. The toxins from these eggs cause the main problem but also, they can stay active in soil and on other surfaces for many years – long after the dog mess has worn away.

Disgusted! We questioned Burntisland residents about it and 100% of them had been affected in some way. A mum of three young children, told of dirt being trampled into brand new carpets after a dog had fouled right outside her garden gate and all three children had trampled through it. Another ended up with it all over her hands after pulling off her child's wellies. Others talked of frequently stepping in dog poo and not finding out until it was too late. One local business owner described having to clean dog dirt up from the street to avoid customers bringing it in with them.

One dog owner questioned why people don't train their dogs to do their business in the gutter, so that people can avoid stepping in it. Another felt that most dog owners were responsible and often picked up not just after their own dogs but also cleaned up after others. One owner carried extra dog waste bags to distribute to people who were without but cautioned that advising people about cleaning up their dog's mess could lead to confrontation.

Around the town, there is a strong sense that it is a minority who don't care whether people trample in their dog's mess but people feel that the situation is getting worse and would like something to be done about it.

Our contact at Fife Council confirmed that in 2014, 56 fixed penalties ranging from £40 to £500 were issued across Fife but none of these were in Burntisland. In the same year, the Council received 36 complaints from Burntisland residents but there was never enough information provided for penalties to be issued. Many people suggested that there are not enough

bins along some of the worst affected residential streets. A

Council spokesman intimated that bins could be requested in badly affected areas and reminded us that any bags can be used now – not just the red ones.

If you are fed up and want to complain, the Council can help in four different ways - they can:

- Discuss more bins in residential areas:
- Patrol 'hot spots' under cover if need be;
- Clean up individual piles of mess;
- Start legal proceedings on dog owners who don't scoop.

They can't do any of this without information. If you know there's a time of day in a certain area that is always being fouled – tell the Council. If you give them

the details of the mess, they can clean it up. If you've witnessed someone walking away from their dog's mess and you can give a description and details on the person (and/or the dog) then they can start to take action.

School initiatives also have been very successful – teaching the children about the habit means they'll take the messages home to mum and dad. Burntisland Primary School ran a small poster campaign to draw attention to the problem

and their posters were displayed throughout the

Community groups, schools and businesses in towns and villages throughout Scotland have run successful campaigns to raise civic awareness and instil a sense of pride in their environment to help eradicate the problem. In Portobello, they have even sprayed the offending mess pink to draw attention to the problem.

You can view some examples at the Keep Scotland Beautiful website and take the pledge to do your bit to clean up after your dog. You can register any community events or initiatives to be part of a Scotland wide network of people wanting to take pride in their streets once more.

One thing everybody agrees on is that the problem is worse in winter when it is dark with less people about. As we head into summer, with so much going on it can be easy to forget just how bad dog fouling can get and how unhappy it makes us all. 





'It is beautiful!' A good description one visitor gave was 'it is a hidden gem.'



Celtic Thin Place...


Throughout the spiritual history of Scotland there have been spaces know as thin places, a place where heaven and earth touch. St Serf's is one of these unique places. Celtic

Wildlife in your Garden



POR those who love wildlife, spring and early summer brings a combination of excitement and nerves. This is when a lot of our garden wildlife is especially active - birds building nests, incubating eggs, finding food for their young; butterflies, bees and hoverflies visiting nectar-rich plants; hedgehogs emerging from

winter hibernation



We humans become more active in spring too, and that's where the nerves come in. So often our actions harm and destroy nature, even if we don't mean to: hedge & tree cutting and ivy pulling destroy countless nests each year; slug pellets and other chemicals can lead to toxic build-up and eventual death in hedgehogs and birds, or could even poison a pet, and they kill all the little creatures that the bigger ones need to eat; replacing front gardens with slabs ruins that piece of habitat for ever, and ruins your chance of watching nature.

But don't be downhearted, there are loads of easy and quick ways to have a real positive impact. Some do cost but many are super-cheap, or even free. Here are just a few things to try: - let a patch of grass grow long and sprinkle some wildflower seeds; don't clear away all garden debris, leave piles of cuttings and deadwood; let a tree grow to maturity; build a hedgehog lodge or an insect hotel; put up nest boxes for birds, bats, bees, bugs; dig a wildlife pond; plant a native wildlife hedge or even just a few shrubs or bushes; give your cat a collar with two bells and keep it inside at dawn and dusk; and so much more. Google 'pond'l'hedge'l'nestbox' etc, along with the words 'wildlife-friendly', and endless useful guides and tips will come up. The RSPB website is a good place to start. Burntisland library has some good books.

As well as benefiting your plants (birds eat aphids & other 'pests', and they help pull moss from your search for grubs; insects make our fruit and veg grow by pollinating our plants; hedgehogs, frogs, beetles & toads all gorge on slugs and snails every night) wildlife brings endless fascination and enjoyment. Soon you'll be hooked and discovering that the more you look and learn the more you'll want to look and learn.

In my first year in this house I've had butterflies, bees, two hedgehogs and 25 species of bird in the garden - blue, coal & great tits, house sparrow, robin, wren, blackbird, dunnock,

chaffinch, goldfinch,

spotted

bullfinch, goldcrest, blackcap, grey wagtail, great woodpecker (so exciting!), jackdaw, carrion crow, magpie, feral pigeon, woodpigeon, collared dove, lesser black-backed gull, herring gull, sparrowhawk. This year I'm digging a pond and planting lots of native

fruit and berry-bearing hedging. I can't wait to see which other species start to appear.

You can record your wildlife sightings for science through schemes such as the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO)'s weekly *Garden BirdWatch*, and the RSPB's annual *Big Garden BirdWatch*.


