Community Council Play Project by Morag Douglas

hroughout last year a group comprising members of the community council, local councillors and other interested individuals has been working hard to improve the range and quantity of play equipment currently available on the Links. The project has been split into two parts, the first to enhance the East end of the links with the addition of inclusive play equipment and the second to replace the equipment that was removed from the Spider Park.

The East Links part of the project is led by a local parent Claire Masterton who originally raised her concern that the existing park is of such a complex nature that children with disabilities cannot play there. She says "It is very sad to see that children with disabilities are unable to join in and play with their friends, siblings and peers. Play is such an important part of a child's life and goes a long way to building friendships, breaking barriers and reducing stigma. To have Fife's first Inclusive Play Park will be a fantastic boost to Burntisland. She has had great support from the whole community with funds being raised by the Brownies, Rainbows and Guides, Burntisland Primary School, and the church as well as individual fundraising activities and personal donations including one from local MP Roger Mullen. Claire has also applied for countless grants and is edging ever closer to her target but all further support and donations will still be gratefully received.

The Spider Park has got off to a bit of a slower start as in order to start raising money a set of plans had to be drawn up which required consultation and time to make sure they reflected the needs and wishes of the community. I am pleased to say that we have finally decided on the plans. You can see the artist's impression on page 9 that we have managed to squeeze in a swing which the children really wanted. The project comes in at just under £56,000 and Fife Council have stumped up the first £10,000 so the next step is to begin the process of grant applications and fundraising to acquire the rest of the money. Hopefully this won't take too long and the children will soon be able to enjoy their fantastic new play equipment and as with the East Links project all donations and support will be gratefully received.

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Community Council Bullets.....

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Thanks are due to the Links Showmen who have once again sponsored the reception on Games Day.
- A small sub-committee has been set up to focus on how best to raise additional funds to help support the other civic receptions, such as Scots Verse, Community Award and Remembrance Sunday.
- Thanks to the initiative of John Bradshaw, Fife Council will be erecting "Royal Burgh" signposts at the entrances to the town.
- Thanks to ExxonMobil at Mossmorran, senior citizens were guests at two pantomimes and also a Burns Lunch.
- A contract has been signed with INEOS at Grangemouth to ensure the supply of ethane to ExxonMobil using existing pipelines and thereby extending the life of the plant.
- Work has now been completed to repair the flooding at Cowdenbeath Road which had caused several car accidents.
- We've had an early discussion with Scott Sweaton of Floral Action Burntisland regarding the possibility of developing a community garden at the Links.
- We have opened discussions with the relevant Fife Council officials on the continuing evolution of a Neighbourhood Development Plan for the Castle area.
- The Town Clock chimes have been restored to normal operation, pending reconstruction of the tower at some point in the future.
- Following the success of the Community Futures survey, an application has been made to Fife Council for the release of funds to produce a Community Action Plan.
- Both of the play park projects on the Links are progressing well, with Morag Douglas and Claire Campbell working flat out to get the best results.
- We gave evidence in support of an application for an extra pharmacy in Burntisland, to be located at the old Palace Cinema site. However, the NHS panel refused the application. We are awaiting sight of their reasons, but it is very likely that the applicant will appeal.
- Work is in hand to manage the overgrowth at the Lammerlaws.
- We have responded constructively but critically to a questionnaire from Police Scotland seeking our views on their current organisational effectiveness.
- Thanks to John Bruce, two bins have been located near to the breakwater for holding discarded fishing tackle.
- At the last Council Meeting the nominated Citizen of the Year was a very popular and well deserved recipient Carole-Anne Paterson who will receive her award in early February.

B ryan and I would like to start by wishing everyone "all the best" for 2016. Hopefully you will have more will power than me when it comes to New Year resolutions.

On a more serious note, following the increase in anti-social behaviour an action plan was implemented between mid-October and the end of November. This operation involved the deployment of additional resources including The Alcohol and Violence Reduction Unit of Fife Division and patrols by the Campaign Against Violence staff. Mobile CCTV units were also deployed and with the valued

assistance and cooperation of the community we have achieved a very positive outcome. Some 25 crimes were reported during the period (9 Vandalisms, 9 Assaults and 7 public disorder offences) A total of 21 calls were received relating to anti-social behaviour, mostly involving youths and 12 related to a very busy Halloween. Known offenders have been targeted by the imposition of bail and curfew conditions through the courts and mobile surveillance cameras have been deployed at strategic locations. We thank the public for information which has helped us to identify offenders and urge you to continue to assist in this way.

We have also reacted positively to information relating to drug dealing in the vicinity of Burntisland High Street resulting in the recent seizure of cannabis to the value of £1,000.

The problem of speeding motorists in both Burntisland and Kinghorn was raised at a recent Community Engagement meeting. Bryan and I will be out with the speed gun at identified black spots so please be mindful of your speed.

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MOC News by Dorothy Brankin

Happy New Year' to everyone from all of us at the Museum of Communication !

We're now busily back at work and planning our exhibition and general programme for 2016. We'll be doing our usual school visits and are already booked to take part in the Orkney Science Festival later in the year. Although we'd originally intended our '*Flanders Fields*' WW1 exhibition to last just 2 years, the enthusiasm, very positive feedback and enquiries from our many visitors, has led us to stick with this theme and simply update it as we go!

One hundred years ago, in 1916, violent land battles raged in Verdun and on the Somme. During the year, the Tank – with a maximum speed of 4 mph, made its impressive, lumbering debut. It was originally designed to provide cover for attacking infantry – hence the 'walking pace' maximum speed. (Its formal name was *Land Ship*, but it was nick-named '*Tank*', as it looked a bit like a vast water tank and also, so that the workforce didn't know what they were constructing!)

The Battle of Jutland in May 1916, was the only major naval conflict of the war and although something of a stalemate, was proclaimed a victory by both sides. All these events will be marked and examined in depth, in our 2016 exhibition.

Another milestone event in 1916, was Scotland's first ever air-raid (carried out in April, over Edinburgh, by two Zeppelins). The airships were attempting to bomb the port of Leith, but met with hostile gunfire. They immediately turned inland and started discharging their load, blowing up a Whisky Bond - and thereby illuminating much of the city - in the process. A further 24 bombs were dropped on the Capital, causing 11 deaths and 24 injuries, as well as much damage to public and private property – including hotels and a railway station. Alas, some naive inhabitants ran into the streets to watch the bombs fall – with disastrous consequences!

The airships apparently encountered only 'desultory machine-gun fire from the southern slopes of Arthur's Seat'. However, the authorities were seriously rattled by the attack and this led directly to the setting up of three airfields, in Gilmerton, Colinton and Turnhouse, which, undoubtedly, twenty years later, saved very many lives. Footnote:

The mighty Zeppelin had a maximum speed of 53 mph and was 529 feet long – or the distance from the MoC building in Burntisland's High Street, to The Links Car Park !! The two small communication and power gondolas it carried, were each about 50 feet long; far bigger than any of the existing fighter aircraft of the time... But, as it turned out, size didn't matter: just 20 years later in the Battle of Britain, the heavily armed Messerschmitts and Spitfires were only about 30 feet long, but had a maximum speed of 400 mph!

It was almost impossible in 1916, to comprehend that the Wright Brothers had managed the very first flight only thirteen years previously!!!! This surely, must be the very best demonstration of PROGRESS !

The children in P1 had a wonderful time watching the pantomime and experiencing live theatre. After being inspired by such a wonderful show, the infant children then performed their first Nativity. Pupils enjoyed rehearsing and getting into their costumes, before delivering a marvellous performance to parents, friends and family. The confidence and enthusiasm displayed by pupils was incredible and we are very proud of them all.

In December, Primary 2 and Primary 3/2 hosted a very successful 'Grandparents Afternoon' where pupils shared learning about how the world has changed since their grandparents' lifetime. Many thanks to all the grandparents, parents and friends who attended and shared information about their lives. The children had a great time presenting their learning and it was a lovely afternoon to celebrate this. This term P2 and P2/3 are looking forward to diving into a science topic, with a special focus on water and ice, before moving on to investigate countries around the world.

Primary Three are embarking on an exciting topic this term. Children will be learning all about the 1960's. Pupils will be listening to the iconic bands of the 60's, researching famous people such as Dr Martin Luther King and Andy Warhol. They will also be looking back at the big movies of the time...Mary Poppins and the Jungle Book to name a few. Classes will hopefully create some interesting art displays linked to this topic and learn to compare life today with life back in the 1960's. What a colourful corridor that will be!

This term P3/4 and P4 will be learning about space. Children will be focusing on Tim Peake's recent mission to the International Space Station and learn about the way astronauts live there. In addition to this, pupils will learn about the solar system and the role of the Sun. The children and teachers are all very excited about the topic and cannot wait to get started.

The magic of Harry Potter swept over Primary 5 last term. Children thoroughly enjoyed the topic and made super wand advertisements, along with making wands to match the adverts. Pupils enjoyed learning "Room on the Broom" in Scot's and performing this as a 'stage show' to parents during Scot's week. It was really great to learn a French Christmas song and pupils were very proud of their performance at the upper school Christmas service. P5 were responsible for organising and leading the service, which was a huge success. A lovely morning had by all.

P6 enjoyed a Natural Disasters Topic last term. They had lots of fun making volcanoes, which were caused to erupt using vinegar and bicarbonate of soda. Tornado tubes were used to see the effects of a vortex and pupils looked at many images of the devastation that natural disasters can cause. A highlight of the term was going out to the playground to do the Mentos and Diet Coke Experiment and discussing the various reactions taking place. Luckily everyone went home dry that day. This term P6 will be studying Europe as a topic (with an exciting twist) as the children will be producing their own personal project on a country of their choice.

Primary 7 have just introduced their new topic which will focus on Ancient Greece and Greek Mythology. Related art activities will include building scale models of The Acropolis, making mosaics of mythical creatures and creating shields and weapons from this time period. The writing focus for P7 pupils this term will have an emphasis on creative and imaginative pieces. The children will also construct their own Greek fact-files. Add to this, rehearsals for the annual Burns and Speakers Competitions and it sounds like P7 will have a very busy term indeed.

Our Junior Road Safety Officers led a very successful Park Smart Campaign in our car park last term. JRSOs braved the pouring rain, with some support from Mrs Redpath, to protest against drivers parking in our school car park. First Aid & Kirkton Church



First Aid update by Alex MacDonald

2016 arrived on schedule when two of us supported the Splash for Cash at Lochore Meadows on New Year's Day. A few days later, we had 5 members supporting about 400 very cold but brave souls who ran 15km through mud, along a burn, over obstacles and uphill, ending with a cold bath at the finishing line. It

was the first time that the Tough Guy endurance event had been held in Scotland and was hosted by Knockhill.

Looking forward, we already have 70 events in our diary up to 11 months ahead. In February and March alone we've got a strong focus on ice hockey, show-jumping and student balls. However, we're also trying to increase the range and frequency of courses that we offer.

In mid-February we will be starting our evening course in more advanced first aid. It's for people who already have a certificate, gained over at least 3 days of tuition, and who want to take their skills further. It's always a popular course and leads to the qualification which is held by nearly all of our voluntary





members, enabling them to manage an incident for up to 40 minutes before the arrival of the emergency services. We're also running shorter, 6-hour courses in Emergency First Aid at Work. For the first time, we are trying to schedule those courses more often rather than waiting for a minimum number of people from a single customer.

There's a huge focus now on the early stages of the chain of survival, so that anyone who has a cardiac arrest gets the best possible chance of recovery. So we've already run simple, 2-hour courses on CPR and defibrillation for adults and children. We'll run more if we can possibly fit them in to our diary.

Overall, we're in for another exceptionally active year, so there is scope for others to join us as volunteers. At this point in the year it's essential that new members already have a relevant qualification. If it's of interest, then you should also be willing to learn new skills and experience new events.

BURNTISLAND FOODBANK by Pat Hanson

n the run up to Christmas, Burntisland Foodbank along with the CAP centre made a total of 61 hampers for families, couples and single people struggling to feed themselves. Of those 61, 36 were for Burntisland residents and the rest were given to CAP clients in the Fife area. The CAP centre had a budget for their hampers, so the donations you gave went to local people. Thank you so much to everyone who donated Christmas goodies to the foodbank - the difference these hampers made to folk was astounding, and not just because there was plenty food, as well as gifts, but because people cared for them enough to donate items. At one point we didn't have enough food, but after a Facebook appeal the goodies came rolling in. We actually ended up with too much food and are still giving out the overspill. We were overwhelmed by the number of young families who needed help, mostly through no fault of their own, but circumstances found them struggling to put food on the table. Sad times indeed.

The foodbank was initially set up by Burntisland Parish Church, and is based in Solid Rock. We have since become a satellite point for Kirkcaldy foodbank, which means they deliver us made up food parcels every week. You can hand donations into Potter About Cafe, which is the main donation and collection point for the foodbank. If you or anyone you know is struggling, you can come into the cafe and ask for a food parcel, private message the cafe Facebook page or phone the cafe number and we can deliver food at the end of the working day. We understand it can be embarrassing asking for food, but believe me, there is nothing to be ashamed of! However, using Facebook or the phone does enable us to be discreet and you will always be treated with dignity.

The cafe is also a member of the Suspended Coffee scheme, so folk can buy drink or food in advance for someone who is struggling to enjoy. You can find out more about this scheme at www.suspendedcoffees.com

The display concluded with an explosive climax of colour and sound, spectacularly reflected against the high cloud base which had almost sympathetically risen to a height which had not obscured the magnificent show.

As the crowds dispersed, it was impossible not to notice the happy atmosphere and the expressions of delight and excitement amongst the kids and adults alike. 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





inghorn Loch is recognised as the inland water sports hub for the area, and is a busy, active place all year round. All the sports activities are based at the new jetty on land owned by Craigencalt Farm and everybody is very welcome to come and visit. The Farm has just completed its new toilets, which will be a great bonus for our visitors. The jetty was constructed by the Loch User's Group in 2007, which is now part of the Craigencalt Trust and together we look after the well being of the loch and its varied wildlife.

In May, the Trust co-ordinates its annual "Come and Try" day, and visitors can try out a variety of water sports and leisure activities. It is always a busy day with canoeing, sailing, radio controlled model boat club, open water swimmers, bird watching, walkers, the Earthship and many more activities on offer. Some visitors just come to relax and enjoy the beautiful scenery and hopefully the good weather. As the summer progresses, and because the loch is now so healthy, weed growth can



accumulate and cause problems for the sports groups. The Trust is to purchase a weedcutter soon to cut excess blanket-weed.

The sports and leisure groups hold various events during the year and the Trust has embarked on a new lochside project of work to improve facilities for users, the wildlife and our visitors. This includes making a new car park on the way in to the lochside. Replacement of the aging barley straw rafts, new swan nesting platforms, information boards and a new family/disabled friendly path linking the lochside with the Trust's very popular Troll Bridge on Rodanbraes Path are all part

of our new project. We are very fortunate to have the assistance of Alcan and funding from Awards for All and Fife Environment Trust, and our stalwart volunteers for this project. If you would like

The Trust has recently been successful in getting a mobile defibrillator for the lochside. Funding for this came from the British Heart Foundation and from the Trust. This could be valuable in an emergency which all hope will never happen. It now needs to be installed and we are committed to train up lots of volunteers, and this will take place soon. 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
