# .....is 20 Years Old

How time flies! The first ever issue of the Buzz was published exactly twenty years ago. It took the form of an eight page, black and white document which was distributed throughout the town along with the Fife Leader. It was a Community Council (CC) initiative and the first edition focussed on CC affairs, the Heritage Trust and inconvenience caused to residents of Links Place by the installation of a storm tank by the water authority. CC business centred on many old chestnuts the Common Good Fund, the Town Clock, Christmas Street Lighting and Links Parking, to name just a few. The front page featured the Community Award Winner and a youthful looking photograph of and welcoming message from Alex MacDonald who was, and still is, the Chairman of Burntisland Community Council.

Amongst the original advertisers were the Kingswood Hotel and Romano's who have both continued to support the Buzz throughout our 20 years existence. It is a great pity that Sergio Romano, a tremendous character in the town, sadly passed away last November and is not around to witness this milestone.

One entire page of the first edition was dedicated to listing contact details and activities of Burntisland Clubs and Societies, a very useful document. Indeed, the current Buzz editorial committee is considering including such a directory, which will also include details of local businesses, in a dedicated page on the Buzz website.

Lastly, we extend our thanks to the many contributors and advertisers who have supported us over the last 20 years. Without you the Buzz would not have survived.

# **Community Award Winner 2018 Scott Sweaton**

Early on the afternoon of 31st December 2017, the Chairman of the Community Council, Alex MacDonald, caught Scott Sweaton completely unawares when he called on him at his home to inform him that he had been selected as the winner of the Burntisland Community Award for 2018. Scott was shocked and stunned by the news, particularly as he was still in his pyjamas!

Scott has been Chairman of the Floral Action Burntisland group since its inception some 5 years ago and has been the inspiration behind its unprecedented success. The fruits of the group's labour is everywhere to see - from the highway entrances to the town to the railway station

and from the colourful hanging baskets and planters of the High Street to the tidy, floral surrounds of sheltered housing and many other sites. As well as enhancing the appearance of the town he has inspired a collective participation by young



and old in making the town more attractive for residents and visitors alike.

Scott has been actively involved in community work since his teenage years in Kirkcaldy which influenced his choice of nursing as his career. Commendably, he does not allow his full time position as Senior Charge Nurse at Fife Hospice to interfere with his considerable efforts to enhance the quality of life in the community.

Scott was also the inspiration behind the fundraising and establishment of a public access defibrillator located outside Burntisland Primary School.

Scott is extremely proud to receive the award but took pains to emphasise that the

success of FAB and associated activities could not have been achieved without the support of many devoted colleagues in the group and above all - the continuous backing of his wife Leanne and their family.

### From the Buzz's First Editor

Look back 20 years, 1998 – internet in its infancy, social media a chat with the hairdresser, mobile phones the size of a brick and Burntisland's Community Council (BCC) "them" to many. Change was in the air and the BCC's need to communicate was obvious - but how?

Aberdour already had the "Village News" a quarterly news sheet that we, the BCC, could emulate. We decided to do just that and formed a small group to produce our own paper with myself as editor. The first and most difficult task was coming up with a name, we ran through almost every combination of Island, Burnt, Burgh, Royal, News, Chronical, Sheet, Journal, Telegraph, Times, Whisper, Chat, that you can imagination. The alliterative Burgh Buzz was not immediately welcome but, in the absence of anything better, it had to do. Then it all came together, the BCC underwrote our venture and the advertisers paid the bills.

Our production team was always small and all too often only two, I did the content, Jinti the advertising and proof reading, and, in a crisis, we both delivered – between us we have climbed every stair in Burntisland more than once. The first edition had a print run of 2700, but sadly its distribution was patchy, I was saddened to find a bundle of 20 copies in a ditch. Nonetheless, that first Buzz covered community events while informing the debate on a broader item – sewage treatment! It also attracted contributors (notably Ian Somerville, churches; Norman Mackie, cinemas; and Ian Archibald, Heritage).

Thus the second issue, print run 3400 and 12 pages, had one of the many items exploiting Burntisland's rich vein of history – the first being the Newbigging Limestone Mine, courtesy of Tom Courts senior! This issue also had space for my first editorial (see box below). As I read it again I recognize my concerns but am delighted that our community has risen to meet the challenges that worried me so.

The next 20 years? This is difficult, but how can a community blessed with a rich history, southerly aspect, sheltered by hills, on a coast with a beach and harbour along with a railway direct to the capital be anything other than a success? I want the Burgh Buzz to be there.

## Use it or.....

Burntisland is losing High Street Traders at an alarming rate, a butcher and fish shop so far this year. If this continues, the town will become an industrial dormitory. Is this really to be the future of the Royal Burgh? What would it take to draw in tourists and trade from Dalgety Bay, Aberdour and Kinghorn? Less lorry traffic, less litter, less dereliction, more light traffic routed through not round the town, more parking close to the High Street, more pride!

A lot has been done, we just don't notice; new lamp posts, buildings cleaned and restored, removal of graffiti, purge on dog fouling, removal of untreated sewage, opening of the Beacon Leisure Centre, promotion of the Fife Coastal Footpath, doubling the frequency of trains etc. but more is

needed, Why does every other community have avenues of daffodils while we have none? Why do we contemplate the desecration of the Links and Leisure Centre with industrial development? Why aren't the Beach and Links cleaner? Why should we have ever more 42 ton trucks bowling down the High Street? Why are the new Alcan buildings so tall?

The Community Council is our front line. We must use it to co-ordinate the many individual and collective initiatives that give Burntisland its distinctive character. Make your views known, come to the monthly meetings, write to the Chairman, last but not least - support local traders. Apathy and Absence will not arrest the High Street slide.

# **Community Council Bullets......**

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Four members visited the police control centre at Bilston Glen and saw first hand how 999 and 101 calls are handled. More information is awaited about how the CCTV cameras in Fife are monitored and managed.
- Our concerns over youth disorder and the available police resources
  were made clear to the Justice Secretary. He replied that the creation of
  Police Scotland "has strengthened the delivery of policing in Scotland"
  and that "members of the public should be encouraged to report all
  incidents".
- We remain concerned at the absence of police reports and crime statistics, which until recently have been available to Community Council meetings for many years.
- At the last minute, Christmas lights were put in place at the Burgh Chambers and also trees at the Porte, thanks to financial help from Fife Council. More lights will be bought next year, so that they will be sustainable for some years ahead.
- We have obtained £8,500 of lottery funding towards the cost of an options appraisal for the future of the Burgh Chambers. Additional funding is being sought and tenders for the work will be invited in the next few weeks.
- Hurd Rolland architects have kindly offered to prepare at no cost an outline proposal for ensuring better access to the scenic views from the Lammerlaws. Discussions about the brief are continuing.
- Work is nearing completion on the conservation of the Kirkton Churchyard and an excellent interpretative leaflet has now been produced.
- A successful beach clean took place on 18<sup>th</sup> November, with 30 bags of rubbish being collected.
- About 70 senior citizens were entertained at a Christmas pantomime, thanks to sponsorship from ExxonMobil at Mossmorran. A similar number will attend a Burns Lunch at the plant in January. About 30 senior citizens will also attend a panto in Dalgety Bay, thanks to the same sponsorship.
- Despite a huge volume of concerns, the Kinghorn Loch road will be closed for 15 weeks. That is significantly less than the original proposal but remains totally unacceptable. There was a clear failure in the planning process as those affected had no opportunity to learn of the closure when consent was given. We have still to learn how Fife Council will avoid any similar situation in the future.


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# **Burntisland Remembers**



he morning of Remembrance
Sunday was cold, clear and calm
as the Burntisland & District Pipe
Band led the traditional parade
comprising representatives from the Armed
Forces, Veterans, Fife and Community
Councillors, the Emergency Services and
Youth and Civilian Organisations from
Harbour Place to the Parish Church at the
top of the Kirkgate.

After receiving the colours of the youth organisations, the Rev. Alan Sharp conducted the Remembrance Service before a packed congregation which observed 2 minutes silence at 11.00 am precisely. During his sermon the Rev. Sharp emphasised the futility of armed conflict and the importance of resolving quarrels and differences through reconciliation and appeasement as defined in the scriptures.

Following the service, the parade reformed and marched along a crowded High Street to the War Memorial to join several hundred members of the local community who had already gathered to show their respects and join in the short service conducted jointly by the leaders of all the local churches. After an emotional rendering of the "Last Post" on the bugle and the "Flowers of the Forest" on the pipes, wreathes were laid by representatives of the various organisations on parade. The Remembrance Service concluded with a collective singing of the National Anthem.

The parade then reformed and marched back along the High Street to the Burgh Chambers for an informal civic reception organised by the Burntisland Community Council.



It was colloquially known as the "Rural" having previously existed in Burntisland as the Binnend WRI. In June 2015, Kay Adams a long time member of the SWI, re-established an SWI group in Burntisland with several informal meetings in the Solid Rock Café before finding a permanent home in St Joseph's Church Hall. The group meets on the second Thursday of each month, except July and August, with meetings starting at 7.00 pm. The ethos of the organisation remains the same - to provide friendship for women and to share skills.

As such, meetings can involve a speaker, or a skills demonstration which encourage members to try new crafts. We also enjoy a variety of competitions and the meetings always finish with tea/coffee and cake.

In June last year, the group celebrated the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the movement with a party night involving friends and relatives, entertainment having been provided by "Rural Blend" a wonderful group of ladies from Perth & Kinross SWI. It was a superb evening with great company, entertainment, lots of laughs and lovely food.

## Nice to meet you, Comrades!

One Saturday in the summer, I was 'on exhibition duty' at the Museum in Burntisland. The weather could best be described as "iffy" and early in the afternoon, I wandered to the door, to see if anybody was bold enough to venture forth.

Three men, speaking a strange – yet somehow familiar – tongue, approached the Museum and asked "How Much to Enter?" I said "FREE!"..... They beamed and came inside! Two of the three had a fairly limited knowledge of the English language, but the third, Andreyev, was very fluent. He told me they were merchant seamen, plying a regular service between Russia and the UK, carrying timber. They were in Scotland (Rosyth) until the following Thursday and wanted to see something of the area. They were concerned about an entry charge, as they carried no UK currency – just cards. He was delighted when I told him they were our very first

Russian visitors, and he and his companions readily added their names and details (in very beautiful 'copperplate' script) to our Visitors Book. One was from St Petersburg, one from Karelia and the third from somewhere near the Urals (but totally unpronounceable for me!)

We spent a wonderfully happy, exhilarating and most memorable couple of hours together!

I showed them round the Exhibition, speaking directly to Interpreter Andreyev, who translated as we went along. This was an amazing experience, and one which I will never forget!

When they left, we all shook hands as we made our goodbyes. Andreyev again apologised for lack of a donation..... but three minutes later, he returned with a ten rouble piece he'd found in a pocket!

I thanked him profusely! About three minutes after that, they again returned, giving us a token for use on the St Petersburg Underground!

This was a truly fabulous experience..... The Anglo-Russian Entente takes on a greater meaning than ever before!

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
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## **Burntisland Primary School News**

Happy New Year from all at Burntisland Primary School! We hope you have all had a lovely festive season and are looking

forward to the year ahead. Here at BPS, we are continuing our work on Learning Powers and the 4 R's of Resilience, Resourcefulness, Reflectiveness and Reciprocity. Since returning to school we have been thinking about making links in our learning by reflecting on our learning last year and making targets for the year ahead. We are going to be very busy as P7 transition events begin and we look forward to lots of sporting competitions – including the Scottish Cup Football matches and the Athletics finals. Watch this space for news! Here is a little taster of what the pupils will be doing this term.

### Primary 1

The Primary 1 class topic is Winter and Fairyland. In Maths pupils have been learning how to measure, numbers to 100 and addition and subtraction. In Literacy the children have been learning what, why and how? They have been studying Storyworld key words and all about character description. In Primary 1/2, the class topic is Superheroes and Winter.

### Primary 2

The Primary 2 class topic is Space. In Maths pupils have really enjoyed learning about co-ordinates. In Literacy the class novel is "Back to Earth with a Bump." The children are developing their comprehension skills by completing a range of activities relating to this book.

### Primary 3

This term pupils in Primary 3 will be studying Ancient Egypt and in Maths, they will be working on the topics of Money and Times Tables. In Literacy, the children have started reading their new class novel, "How to Train Your Dragon" and they are loving it!

#### Primary 4

Children in Primary 4 will be learning all about Scotland this term. In Maths, lessons have concentrated on angles and fractions. and in Literacy pupils have been focusing on Vocabulary, Connectives, Openers and Punctuation.

### Primary 5

Primary 5 pupils are taking on the role of investigators this term, through their topic, Kidnapped! This subject will test children's literacy, numeracy and problem solving skills. All will be revealed in due course!

### Primary 6

Pupils in Primary 6 are really enjoying their topic on Civil Rights. Later in the term, they will take an adventure trip to the Caribbean! (Not really, but they will be learning all about it!) In Maths, children are fully engrossed and enjoying learning about fractions, decimals and percentages..

### Primary 7

In Primary 7 pupils are studying Conflict as their topic. This involves learning about World War One, World War Two and modern day conflict. Money is their topic in Maths which involves understanding budgets, profit and loss.

## **Scots Verse Competition**

In mid-December a formal presentation was made in the Burgh Chambers to the winners of the 31st annual Scots Verse Competition involving pupils from Burntisland Primary School. The competition, for forms 1 to 6, had been held earlier in the term and had been judged by members of the Community Council. Alex MacDonald, the Council Chairman, conducted proceedings and prior to introducing the individual winners he explained the origin and reasoning behind the competition.

The contest was first held in 1986 to mark the 700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of King Alexander III who tragically died after falling

from his horse whilst travelling between Burntisland and Kinghorn. Scotland enjoyed a period of peace and prosperity during Alexander's reign, mainly because he favoured dialogue and debate to resolve disputes rather than taking up arms. Inspired by these qualities, the then Chairman of the Community Council, Douglas Kerr, proposed a competition in Scots Verse amongst the primary school students of the town.

He felt that all participants in such a competition, not only the winners, must surely benefit from the experience of learning new words from the old Scots language and presenting them publicly in a meaningful way.

The winners in each category receive a trophy to keep for a year together with a medal inscribed with the winner's name and the Arms of the Community Council. The trophies are named individually after prominent members of the community who although from diverse backgrounds and holding divergent views, all firmly believed in settling differences through rational debate.

Each of the six winners were

introduced in turn and confidently performed their individual pieces, only one of which was traditional, before a large audience of Council Members, teachers and families. Their prizes were presented by Community Councillor, Christine Dewar after whose mother (who also appears on the front page of the 1st edition of the Buzz) one of the trophies is named. The presentations were followed by a buffet, enjoyed by all.

# First Aid update by Alex. MacDonald.

We are keen to hear from people who already have a qualification in first aid and would now like to take it further. There's a definite buzz from making a difference to someone who is injured or ill, but often there is so much more that can be done with better skills and more equipment.

So why does it matter? In November and December our volunteers responded to 7 people who had collapsed – either through alcohol, drugs, or an underlying illness. Another person had concussion following a head injury. Another had mental health problems. Yet another had a suspected fracture of the pelvis.

Naturally it's not always like that. We can go for weeks on end dealing with only very minor injuries. However, we need to be prepared for any eventuality.

So there will be an opportunity – open only to people who already have a basic certificate – to learn new skills and perhaps become one of our volunteers.

Our next course will start at the end of February and will be strictly limited in terms of the numbers we can accept. The minimum entry requirement is a current certificate in first aid, gained over a 3-day course or equivalent.

We'll build on that by teaching new skills about oxygen delivery, spinal injuries, moving patients and much more besides.

This rider made a full recovery after being treated on the spot and then transferred.

In the coming weeks our volunteers will have the pleasure of attending show jumping, ice hockey and student balls – each with their own mix of risk and entertainment. It's the kind of variety and challenge which led a regular customer to say that she had been "singing your praises as to how efficient and attentive we find Burntisland First Aid."

Road on the way out of Burntisland. We are an independent school that works with local authorities throughout Scotland to offer residential or day placements, specialist care, and education to children of Primary and Secondary school ages.

Babcock International based in Fife has set their apprentices the task of designing and building playground equipment for our school. The Babcock team have been working with our young people to find out their views on the equipment they would like to see on the school grounds. The apprentices left with lots of ideas and are now designing a 3D printout of how the environment will look when it is finished.

FAB are fab! Our kids have had a great experience working with Floral Action Burntisland over the years and continue to do so. In the past the pupils have helped plant flowers at the railway station roundabout, made mosaics for the Beacon car park, and recently they made a Bug Hotel for the railway station. Frank from FAB comes to the school on a regular basis to teach our pupils how to prepare and maintain an allotment space and shows the kids how to grow vegetables. We appreciate the time that these

volunteers give to passing on their skills to our pupils.

Our woodworking department formed links with Kinghorn Primary to collaborate in creating and building benches that Kinghorn pupils could use in the playground. There were eight kids involved in the construction. Each of the pupils built and painted a bench and the benches were joined together to make one large octagon bench. This was then presented to the primary school. As well as gaining joinery skills the pupils also gained great satisfaction in knowing the benches would be put to

good use.

Our senior pupils continue to support Dunfermline Foodbank and before Christmas Simon and Jordan helped the Foodbank with their annual Christmas collection. They worked alongside

foodbank staff and corporate supporters from Nationwide and RBS. Both boys worked extremely hard sorting products, lifting and carrying crates, loading and unloading the van and speaking to staff at the stores. They also made a donation to the foodbank by filling a trolley with £30 worth of food for those in need. Jordan and Simon have been volunteering at the foodbank for 6 weeks as part of their Prince's trust award and are on track to complete the unit this year.

Tracy's class organised a visit from Maasai warriors. This UK charity works in the Maasai areas of Kenya helping families out of poverty through education, and access to health amenities. Also, they provide local, clean water. The charity assists people to become more economically active. Helping Kenya to help

itself is their main objective. They are a team of volunteers with no salaries or costs thus 100% of monies they receive go to the projects in Kenya.

We are grateful to Watson's of Burntisland for giving one of our pupils, Ewan, the opportunity to gain work experience in their shop. Each time Ewan returns he is excited to tell of everything that he has learned. He has picked up quite a few skills in the short amount of time he has been working at Watson's. These skills were evident when he helped cook the Christmas meal. Likewise, we appreciate the work experience

that Kingsgate in Dunfermline are giving to William. He enjoys his daily rounds with the security staff checking that all is good in the centre.

It has become a tradition for the kids at our school to make the Guy for Burntisland's Bonfire. This was the tenth year the pupils have created the Guy. On bonfire night the kids joined the rest of Burntisland to watch the spectacular bonfire and fireworks. As the Guy burst into flames one of the pupils who made the Guy, Shane, he shouted, "I can see my old red trainers melting into the fire. That will get rid of the smell!"










## **HERITAGE NEWS**

2018 is going to be a very busy and interesting year for Burntisland Heritage. Early spring will see the completion of the Old Kirkton Church restoration project and the site will be open to the public and visitors for the first time in decades. In 2014 a project team was established whose main long term aim was to save the church from further decay and ultimate collapse. The project was planned to safeguard the future of Burntisland's oldest building. The church which dates back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century is a nationally important Scheduled Monument.



An informative new leaflet which takes a "Step back in time at Kirkton Old Churchyard" and "uncovers the story of the old church" has been produced for wide distribution. The site will be officially reopened on Palm Sunday on the 25<sup>th</sup> March.
2018 also marks our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of summer exhibitions. The first

2018 also marks our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of summer exhibitions. The first of these was held in the Burgh Chambers in 1994 and have continued every year with changing themes since 1999 at the centre at 4 Kirkgate. Given the success of the 2017 'Burntisland's Gifts and Treasure' display the intention is to build on this and select material from each of the 25 exhibitions illustrating the huge diversity of the town's rich history and heritage. A huge thanks to all of friends of the trust past and present without whose help none of this would have been possible.

To celebrate our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. plans are now in progress to bring the national award winning Burntisland 1883 model railway exhibition back to the town in September. The model which shows the station and docks as they were in 1883 was last on display in our Upper




eligible local groups, but we will try to reach a decision early in the New Year.

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Ithough a new arrival in our house means I haven't been out exploring much, in December I did have one very exciting walk up the Binn and onto farm tracks beyond. It was still night, thick fog over the land, baby asleep on my chest. Two Tawny owls were calling either against or to each other in the wooded slopes above the golf course then several more from trees across the open field-land.

The classic owl song, 'twit twoo', is made by Tawny owls. It's thought to normally be a duet by the female who calls a sharp 'keewick' ('twit') and the male who replies with hollow vibrating 'hoo-ooo-oo' ('twoo'). Our other four UK-resident owls sound very different, raspy Barn owls shriek and hiss. Long-eared owls sing a one-note 'hoo', like blowing in a bottle, slowly repeated. Short-eared owls don't make much noise but when they do it's a faster series of low hoots. Little owls have a short haunting cry.

Soon after the owl night, I was back up the Binn for my monthly count of waterbirds on the Binn pond for the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). This time the water was an ice

rink and nothing was showing other than one heron among nearby tussocks. Even when not frozen this pond is tricky as all but the centre is crowded with rushes. Counting involves waiting a long time for things to either swim out into the open centre or to make a sound.

Knowing some of the songs and calls of nature brings so much more chance of encountering wildlife - Great spotted woodpecker for example I usually see only because of first hearing its sharp 'chip - chip - chip' call. The same day as my frozen count a call helped me spot a new species for the site. From low Silverbarton Hill west of the pond erupted loud harsh screeches - Jays! The first I've seen here. Feathers pinky-tan, black, white, blue wing flashes, these crow cousins were moving noisily through the trees in a group of three or more. Do you see jays locally? How long have you known them to be in the area?

## Craigencalt Trust News by Marilyn Edwards

The weather has been much colder this winter, with ice covering large parts of Kinghorn Loch at times, but this has not deterred the sports groups using the loch for training, or the Trust volunteers

from workdays. Team work from the groups, and an ice breaking Coastal Rowers crew, has enabled the base and frame of the nesting platforms to be anchored in the shallow water at the head of the loch. Now with a timber covering to be added very soon and old trees, rocks and planting for camouflage cover for the nesting birds in Spring, together with bespoke shelters for ducklings against predators, the survival rate of our water birds should be much greater. This has been a challenging project for the Trust, but enjoyed by all those involved. We hope the platforms will provide an interesting place for the study of bird life. Recently, the bird hide has seen a hive of activity again with folk arriving each day to catch a glimpse of the resident

kingfishers as they dive for fish directly in front of the hide. Our thanks to our local bird enthusiasts for keeping the area so clean, thus attracting beautiful birds.

A new planned timetable for 2018 has been agreed for the Trust. Last November there was another successful visit to

Inchkeith which will be followed up in the Spring by a talk from Ian Archibald, entitled 'Islands of the Forth'. In April, the Trust hopes to host another Mini Walking Fest over a 2 week period, featuring a family walk with storytelling and

other enjoyable walks. A programme will be issued nearer the time. We hope to run a set of moth and butterfly surveys during the summer months and everyone is invited to come along. This will involve selecting suitable warm, damp evenings to set out traps and returning the following morning to see what has been around. It is fascinating to observe the massive range of different moths that are here. Most of us are familiar with the garden bird counts encouraged by the RSPB. Moth counts increase our knowledge of our local environment in the same way.

Our ever popular 'Come and Try' day will take place on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> May. The choice of water sports and leisure activities available at Kinghorn Loch increases each year and the event is always well supported. We hope that even if the lochside road closure is still in place, that folk from Burntisland will still manage along to this free taster afternoon.

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






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
