Community Council Bullets.....

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month at 7.00 pm in Burntisland Burgh Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last two meetings is set out below.

- Christmas lights have been very well-received so far. New lights were installed on street furniture, trees and also within the Burgh Chambers. Fund-raising continues so that the total installation can be extended and maintained for future years.
- A new Paths Group has been formed, with the remit of keeping paths accessible, informative and in good condition. Comments have already been forwarded to the Fife Coastal Path Group with a view to enhancing Burntisland references on their map, brochure and website.
- We will be supporting a donation from the Common Good Fund in order to enable conservation work on paintings which are currently on display in the Burgh Chambers.
- Shell and ExxonMobil at Mossmorran have engaged independent consultants to review and advise on global best practice in terms of flaring and noise pollution.
- There is an ongoing investigation into the feasibility of re-locating the former Beamer lighthouse to a new site in Burntisland, so that its historical interest can be protected.
- We welcome a proposal by the Central Burntisland Tenants and Residents Association to acquire and test new, seagull-proof bins.
- Despite the challenging weather, the Christmas Market had been a success and about 100 people had called in to the Burgh Chambers to enjoy hot drinks and snacks.
- Thanks were extended to ExxonMobil for their sponsorship of pantomime tickets and travel which benefited about 80 senior citizens.
- We are awaiting a final report on the prospective future development of the Burgh Chambers, which will enable a more formal project group to be established and led by the Community Council.

The Burgh Policy By PC Elizabeth James



et me start by wishing you all a happy and prosperous New Year. Hopefully, you all managed to spend the Festive Season relaxing and eating good food with family and friends. Lewis and I would like to say thank you for the Christmas cards that we received. They certainly helped to make the stations magnolia walls a bit more colourful.

We are also pleased to report that 2018 saw recorded crime in Burntisland drop by 12% and there was a noticeably marked reduction in calls to the police about anti-social behaviour involving youths, both trends that we hope will continue.

In November last year, shortly after Bonfire Night, we were contacted by a concerned resident of the town regarding someone's use of a drone at the event. So, if you were lucky enough to get one for Christmas, please use it with consideration for others (including all animals) and keep the following in mind:- a person in charge of a small unmanned surveillance aircraft, which is equipped to undertake any form of surveillance or data acquisition, must not fly the aircraft in any of the following circumstances except in accordance with permission issued by the Civil Aviation Authority.

- over or within 150 metres of any congested area;
- over or within 150 metres of an organised open-air assembly of more than 1,000 persons;
- within 50 metres of any vessel, vehicle or structure which is not under the control of the person in charge of the aircraft; or
- during take-off or landing, a small unmanned surveillance aircraft must not be flown within 30 metres of any person (excluding the operator).

Anyone requiring more information should head to the site dronesafe.uk

In the coming months we again will be launching a campaign to recruit more people for our Community Speedwatch Team who help us in our efforts to discourage motorists from speeding on the approaches to and in the town. Please be assured that it is not our intention to persecute drivers. However, we continually receive complaints about cars being driven at speed, and often witness it ourselves. Warnings, both written and verbal, are issued at our discretion, where appropriate,. However, where we find any person driving with blatant disregard for speed limits, we will issue tickets which may incur both a monetary fine as well as penalty points.



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"Lest We Forget"

ast year's Remembrance Day service, which also commemorated the 100th anniversary of the end of the Great War, took place on Sunday 11th November. This was a joint service held in the Erskine Church and conducted by Rev. Alexander Ritchie and Rev. Alan Sharp. After the church service, representatives of the various armed services and local organisations paraded to the war memorial where a record number of residents had gathered and where a short service was held. This was conducted jointly by Rev. Ritchie (Erskine United Free Church), Rev. Sharp



(Parish Church), Father James (St. Josephs RC church) and Rev. Norby (St. Serfs Episcopalian church). During the wreath laying, members of the Guides, Scouts and Air Cadets read out the 139 names of local men who gave their lives during the two conflicts.

After the service the Community Council invited those taking part to the Burgh Chambers for refreshments. Members of the youth organisations were provided with refreshments in the Parish Church Hall.

Would You Consider Joining the Community Council?

ollowing October last year's election process, Burntisland Community Council, unlike many of its local counterparts, comprised a full complement of 15 elected members. According to the rules, the Council can co-opt up to four other members who would have full rights of participation but would be ineligible to vote on any matter. In recent developments, one elected member has resigned for personal reasons and one co-opted member has been appointed.

To achieve its goals, the Council needs to be fully representative of the community and possessing essential skills that will enable it to take key projects forward. Current activities include seeking improved access to local landmarks and paths, and developing a new and sustainable future for the Burgh Chambers buildings. A recent visible success was the reintroduction of Christmas lights in and around the High Street, a project which is ongoing.

The Council is keen to co-opt its full complement of members and would encourage anyone interested, to attend a couple of our meetings to grasp an understanding of what would be expected of them. Based on current information, the Council plans to take a decision on new members in April and as such, the Council Secretary, George McLauchlan (contact details on page 2) would be keen to hear from any interested individuals.

Community Fund

hanks to generous seed funding once again from Tom Courts Burntisland Butchers, the Community Council can offer small grants to local groups whose activities help to benefit Burntisland. We've topped up the fund with a contribution from our own reserves, so here is what's possible.


- Grants of £25 to £150 are available, though most will be at the lower end of that range.
- Groups must be located in Burntisland.
- Applications must be made in writing either hard copy or e-mail to the Secretary of the Community Council.
- Applications can be for any purpose except for projects which have already been completed.
- Applications should show how the grant would make a difference.
- Grants will be decided normally at Spring and Autumn meetings of the Community Council.
- Grants will not normally be made for personal items.
- There will be a maximum of one grant per group per year.

We do want to make a difference, but clearly we're targeting small projects for groups which have limited reserves. Grants have already been made to the Over 70's Christmas Treat and the Toll Community Centre. So, if your group has a small project in mind, we'd like to hear from you.

The next round of grants will be made soon and applications should please be with our Secretary by early March.

Scots Verse Competition



November, St Andrew's Day, the Burgh Chambers was the venue for the formal presentation of awards to the winners of the 32nd annual Scots Verse Competition involving pupils from Burntisland Primary School.

Alex MacDonald, Chairman of the Community Council, welcomed a large audience of Council members, school staff and families of the winners. In his opening address, Alex explained how the competition was started over three decades ago to mark the 700th Anniversary of the death of King Alexander III who died when he fell from his horse whilst riding between Burntisland and Kinghorn. Alexander was a monarch who favoured dialogue and discussion in settling disputes rather than physical conflict. It was felt



that by taking part in this competition, pupils at the local primary school would benefit from understanding old Scots words and by presenting them in a meaningful way before a large audience.

The winners had been selected a few days earlier at the school by a panel of Community Council judges, from an impressive body of pupils who confidently delivered their recitations on a wide variety of topics. The overall standard had been such that the final decision on the winner in each category had been extremely difficult.

Each winner performed their own piece of verse before receiving a medal inscribed with their name and the Coat of Arms of the Community Council and an impressive trophy to retain for a year. Themes of the poems, all non-traditional, included "Mince and Tatties", "Bogie Man (the nasal variety)", a "Crocodile" and Brussel Sprouts". The very confident and amusing presentations received loud applause from the enthusiastic audience.

The presentations were followed by a sumptuous finger buffet which was enjoyed by all.





t the end of 2017 the Community Council agreed to take responsibility for providing Christmas lights in the town. 2018 was the first full year that fundraising took place. We were extremely fortunate in receiving a generous donation at the beginning of our campaign from Briggs Marine. Substantial amounts were also received from Fife Council and from the Common Good Fund, The Local Co-op, as a result of huge efforts throughout the year, raised a substantial sum. An appeal to the public to support our efforts was met with great success. Local youth groups and individuals all joined in to ensure a magnificent display.



This year's lights were provided by Blachere, a Fife based firm. The state-of-the-art lights are hired in a 3-year deal and are erected, maintained and stored by the company. It is hoped that subject to further fundraising the display can be extended next

Some of the money raised was used to decorate the trees at the entrance to the Links and at the top end of the High Street. These lights remain on the trees throughout the year and can be lit whenever required. Again, subject to fundraising, it is hoped to extend this display further along the street.

The Community Council has already started planning for the display for 2019. Christmas lighting is expensive to provide, but I think we can all agree, the finished product adds some cheer to our town in the winter months. Co-op's Huge Donations to Local Organisations

Shipyard Stalwart Retires after 50 years of Service.

he Club enters a new year for the first time in decades without Jim Thomson. Now aged 70, Jim has taken the decision to retire. Older

Shipyard minded people may remember him as a player, having joined the Club in the late sixties from Nairn Thistle JFC, playing at the back for the Shippy for many years as a solid defender. Remarkably, he only ever picked up one caution - yellow cards had not yet been introduced in those days. He still hotly disputed his caution to this day which he maintains was unjust. A highlight of his playing career was captaining the side in the Qualifying Cup final against St Cuthbert Wanderers in 1971 which we unfortunately lost 5-3 on aggregate.

His managerial career was undoubtedly his most successful time at the Club with a conveyer belt of trophies arriving at Recreation Park. The Kirkcaldy and District Amateur League Title was won on several occasions along with many local cup competitions. The Fife Amateur Cup was won three times under Jim's leadership as the Club remained a dominant force in Fife Amateur football. It was senior football that probably brought Jim three of his finest moments at the Club. One when a Fife Cup tie produced this famous newspaper headline "Shipyard shocker for Premier League Pars". Remarkably the



Shipyard knocked out of the Fife Cup, a strong Dunfermline team, fresh from beating Celtic on the Saturday. We won 5-4 on penalties after drawing 2-2 in 90 minutes. Also, who could forget that memorable Scottish Cup run in the 1994/95 season when Jim's team reached the last 32 of that famous competition. Annan Athletic, Girvan and Civil Service Strollers were all dispatched in the Qualifying Cup ensuring entry into the draw for the Scottish Cup proper. The draw handed the Club a bye in the first round before St Cuthbert Wanderers were thrashed in the second. Now, was it going to be Ibrox, Celtic Park, Easter Road or Pittodrie? Unfortunately not, as Keith or Huntly away came out the hat and the latter went on to knock the Shippy out. On the back of that run the team were awarded the Fife team of the year and Jim was awarded the Manager of the year. There was also a Civic Reception held in the Club's honour hosted by Provost Stan Bolam in recognition of what Jim and his team had achieved.

As Chairman Jim saw his beloved Shipyard win the Fife Cup for the first time in the Club's history when a young Cowdenbeath side were beaten 4-0 in the final played at Recreation Park in April 2018.

It goes without saying how much Jim will be missed at the Club having been a player, captain, manager, committee member, secretary and chairman. Don't forget handyman, grasscutter, line marker and linesman among many other duties that he carried out. Jim joins two other legendary figures in the club, Hugh Lawler and Jim Anderson who also served Burntisland Shipyard for many, many years.

Everyone at the Club would like to wish Jim and his wife Christine a long and happy retirement.

Talking of devils, the Beacon will also be well represented in the *Devil o' the Highlands* race – an ultra-marathon from Tyndrum to Fort William along the West Highland Way. This year we will have 10 Beaconers hoping to complete the 42 miles and 6500 feet of ascent when the race takes place on 3rd August.

If you are interested in running whatever your goals, whether it is to complete a 10k or to just get fit why not join us - we welcome runners of all abilities from novices to seasoned marathoners. We meet every Monday at 7.00pm at the Beacon Leisure Centre.




Poppy Appeal

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



"The F word"

Diabetes, heart complaints, high blood pressure and arthritis are just a few of the health problems associated with excess weight. In fact if you have an obese cat with high blood pressure this can lead to

permanent blindness.

How can you tell if you have a portly pet? Ask yourself this: When you stroke them, can you feel their ribs? Do they go in at the waist? Are they reluctant to go for walks, do they sleep more or are they less active? If you answered no to the first two and yes to the second two, chances are you have a fat pet.

There is no quick fix, but reducing your pet's food intake and increasing their exercise is a great place to start.

We would advise giving your pet a complete dry food. Canned or wet food is made up of 80% water. You can now buy low fat or reduced calorie foods from most shops. Stop feeding treats and titbits from the table. If you have a dog, give them vegetables like carrots. Instead of stuffing your pockets with treats, give them some of their regular dried food, but remember to reduce the amount of food you give them at meal times. Take them for more walks. Burntisland is surrounded by amazing countryside, which could improve your fitness levels too.

Cats are more tricky, especially if they go outside. They are more than likely to subsidise their diet with fresh meat. Some cats also have multiple owners. These clever kitties go from house to house claiming starvation, when in reality they have a perfectly good human catering to their best needs at home. (Did you know you can now buy cat collars that say 'please do not feed?) Try playing with your feline, encouraging it to be more active. Often, once they start losing weight cats become more active naturally.

Obesity is a problem that is, excuse the pun, getting bigger all the time.

So let's do something about it. Let's make 2019 the year of the fit pet.

Craigencalt Trust News



he New Year brings the start of a new project for the Craigencalt Trust.

This involves the creation of a new path through the trees at the road entrance to the Craigencalt Farm rising up the wooded hillside to the Kissing Trees Road. This avoids anyone needing to use the dangerous road through the bad bend on Red Path Brae. The path will be a great safety improvement to the benefit of all. Fife Council has agreed to install a length of path and pavement at the top of the hill, so that all pedestrians can be guided well away from the blind bend and on to the straight part of the hill on way to the Kissing Trees. We are very grateful for this support. The path will also provide a new, safe, circular route that will take in extensive, beautiful views over the Forth, and pass by fields of primitive rare breed sheep and nearby highland cows, which are already a well photographed attraction. Being disability and family friendly, it will be a pleasant scenic walk for families with buggies and an easy route for runners and cyclists.

As the season turns, visitors can once again enjoy the mature areas of snowdrops that flower each year.



inter is hard for wildlife. Even if we don't see the extreme snow of February and March

2018, birds will still benefit from any assistance we can give. Scatter seed, apples and dried fruit on the grass; put seed mixes, peanuts and fatballs in feeders; make water always available. Now is also the

time to plant bare-rooted hedging, fruit and nut trees and the like. All will greatly help grow our town's wildlife by being food sources and nest space and roost space.

It's not just the birds, we benefit too - take ten minutes to sit and watch with breakfast or coffee break. Anything might show up! Birds need a lot of extra energy to survive the cold so, as natural fruits and seeds in the countryside run out, they're drawn to our gardens to find it. A year ago I wrote of the fieldfares,

redwings and song thrush which came to our garden in the snow. A month ago, just before Christmas the first tree sparrows I've seen here appeared on our feeders. A

pair of them, feeding for half an hour alongside house sparrows, robin, dunnock fluffed against the cold they can be really and tits. I haven't seen them since.

So how do you tell if it's a house sparrow or a tree sparrow? Firstly, location: in urban and suburban spots it's almost always a house sparrow. Tree sparrows are associated with farm and countryside. Secondly its face: if it has an all chestnut

hat, bright white cheeks with a crisp black spot on each and a slim black beard then it's a tree sparrow (male and female tree sparrows are identical). If it has chestnut on the back of its head but the very

> top is grey then it's a male house sparrow. House sparrow cheeks are also much dirtier than the tree sparrow's and don't have those black patches. They do have the black beard but it's shabbier, less slick. Female house sparrows look different, they're less distinctive, all light browns and tan. Identify the males

and the females will be alongside them.

Blue, coal and great tits probably visit your feeders often too. Coal tits are the smallest although when feathers are rather dumpy. They have three white

stripes on their black heads - bird feeder badgers! Blue tits are beautiful with their yellow/yellowgreen tummies and greenish wings. They have a white face with bold blue

bandings around the chin and through the eye and up on top of the head. The male tends to be more brightly coloured than

the female, sometimes as blue as blue can be. Great tits are the largest of the three. They have black heads with white cheeks and yellow tummies down which a vertical black line runs. You can tell if it's a male or a female great tit because on the female the black line is really narrow and on the male



it's much wider.

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


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
