10 years of making Burntisland FABulous!

Back in 2012 a leaflet was put through the doors of the townspeople, asking if anyone was interested in establishing a bloom group, taking over the planters that had been cared for by the Community Council in previous years. After a couple of meetings, a committee was established under the name Floral Action Burntisland (FAB). We decided that we didn't just want to be another 'in bloom' group and the acronym allowed us to develop the slogan 'making Burntisland fabulous'.

From small beginnings, FAB very quickly established themselves as a well-known and respected community group within the town. This was helped by the work carried out being visual for all to see around the town – perhaps our high-viz vests with our logo on them may have helped too!

Each year we have always aimed to add something new to our campaign, by installing new planters, adding more basket trees along the Links or enhancing neglected areas across Burntisland. There are also many things we do that people don't realise and that aren't specifically aimed towards plants. Over the last 10 years we've had the sea wall painted on more than one occasion, refurbished all the benches on the High Street, repainted various railings in the town, and enhanced street cleansing on the High Street. These are the things people don't necessarily associate with FAB but together with the floral enhancement it ensures the town looks its best for residents and visitors.

We have had the pleasure of working with various groups over the years including the Scouts, Girlguiding, and the pupils and staff at the school. We have worked closely with Starley Hall to ensure integration with the pupils who have supported us with a variety of projects over the years.

On average, it costs us around £4–5,000 per year to deliver our campaign. The support of local businesses and residents have meant that we have been able to achieve all of what we have wanted to do for the last 10 years, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of you who have supported us. Our fundraising efforts have had a positive impact towards our projects, such as our coffee morning and our raffle.

The ultimate success of FAB is due to the volunteers who have worked tirelessly offering thousands upon thousands of hours of their own time to ensure Burntisland looks at its best all year round. From those who have been part of our committee to the support volunteers who support us at key times during the year, they have all played a key role in making sure we achieve our aim. Our volunteers come from all walks of life (no gardening experience is necessary) but all have one thing in common – they love our wee town and want to give something back.

We have taken part in both local and national bloom campaigns and have achieved great success in these with a Silver Award in Beautiful Scotland and a Gold Award in Beautiful Fife. Although we do what we do for Burntisland, it is always nice to receive some recognition for all the hard work we have achieved and the projects we have developed.

From day one I have held the position of chairperson with great passion and pride. I know nothing about plants or gardening but like all our volunteers I have a love for Burntisland and enjoy making the town aesthetically pleasing for residents and visitors. This role has allowed me to meet a wide range of people, establish working relationships with local community groups and businesses, and ultimately led me to being chosen as Citizen of the Year in 2018.

As FAB moves into the next decade of its existence, I have made the decision to stand down as chairperson at our next AGM in February. This decision hasn't been easy however I feel that after a decade I have achieved what I set out to do, and feel that someone else at the helm will ensure FAB continues making Burntisland fabulous for years to come!

Community Council Bullets.....

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month, at 7pm in Burntisland's Burgh Chambers. **Dates for the next three meetings are: 11th November, 9th December, and 13th January.**

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues raised during the last three meetings is set out below. Full minutes can also be found on the Community Council website.

- Audit Scotland continue to monitor Fife Council's progress towards a new policy for Common Good management. A revised policy is now expected to be approved by March 2023.
- GoFibre, in competition with BT, are offering full fibre internet connections to about 3,000 individual homes in Burntisland. There have been about 500 expressions of interest so far.
- We are awaiting consultation from Fife Council on the naming of new streets at Kirkton Lea, the new housing development off Kirkton Road.
- Together with Fife Council, we are exploring the possible use of the roundhouse site as a managed facility for mobile homes.
- Our appeal against the refusal of consent by NHS Fife for a second pharmacy was successful. However, that simply means that the proposal will be considered afresh so nothing is yet certain.
- We are working closely with Burntisland Community Development Trust to update and extend the Community Action Plan. The current version has helped numerous groups in the town by providing evidence to support funding applications.
- A small service to mark Merchant Navy Day was held outside the Burgh Chambers on 2nd September.
- Work continues on the possibility of replacing the Links water feature. Early indications give a cost of nearly £500,000, with very little funding committed so far. It is, however, unique in Fife and we are pushing hard for priority funding.
- We plan to have two meetings per year in a location other than the Burgh Chambers, in order to explore the options for greater accessibility.
- Orders have been placed for additional Christmas lights. We are especially grateful to the Big Green Market for their generous donation in October. Plans are in hand for a fundraising concert by the Rosyth Concert Band on 3rd December.
- Fife Coast & Countryside Trust will be placing signs near to the slipway, advising power craft to keep out of the bay, which is a designated bathing area.

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Acoustic Music Club

Burntisland Acoustic Music Club was born out of the former Barn at the Loch music nights at Kinghorn Loch, which became wellknown throughout Fife for the quality of the performances and the relaxed and friendly atmosphere. The pandemic and subsequent closure of the Barn left a big hole in the local acoustic scene, so when restrictions had sufficiently eased organisers Andy and Helen Pay struck up a partnership with the Bowling Club to provide a new venue.

Unlike "open mic" events, performers request a slot in advance, leading to around eight different acts playing each night. The evenings have been running monthly since June and have been very well attended and popular. The club is run with the support of Burntisland Community Development Trust and has raised over £350 for the town's Ukrainian community. Future recipients will include the Christmas lights fund and other local initiatives.

With a minimum admission fee of just £2 or £3, good music, a bar and a comfortable, warm room, it's the perfect way to unwind on a Friday night! Future dates are 11th November, 9th December and 13th January from 7.30–10.30pm.

Remembrance Sunday

The traditional parade and services to commemorate those who gave their lives in defence of our country take place on Sunday 13th November. This year will be the first full parade since 2019 and also commemorates 40 years since the Falklands conflict.



The parade will consist of representatives from the Armed Forces, Fife Council, Community Council, Ex-service personnel, members of youth organisations and members of the public. It will assemble at Harbour Place in time for a 10.15am departure. Led by the Burntisland & District Pipe Band, the parade will march via the High Street and Kirkgate to the Parish Church for the formal service commencing at 10.45am.

Following the service, the parade will reform and march to the War Memorial to join members of the public for a short commemorative service and the laying of wreaths at noon.

The parade will then return back along the High Street past the Burgh Chambers where on dismissal, participants will attend an informal reception hosted by Burntisland Community Council.

Christmas Lights Group

Each year Burntisland High Street and the Links are lit up with beautiful Christmas lights on the lamp posts and lights in the trees. This comes at quite an expense but is so worth doing.

Fundraising is required to help pay for the annual recurring costs of the Christmas lights, which includes servicing, repairs and breakages, and to also purchase additional lights.

We have received support from Fife Council's Local Planning Budget, plus £1,200 from the Big Green Market in October. Luke Drummond held a bonus ball draw, and over £1,400 has been raised so far via a GoFundMe page set up by Lee-Anne Purvis—you can continue to donate at the following link: www.gofundme.com/f/burntisland-high-st-and-linkschristmas-lights

Burntisland Christmas Lights Group

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PC Stuart Kinnes and **PC Trevor Farley** welcome you all to the November 2022 community Police section of the Burgh Buzz. We hope you are all well.

Our number one concern that we have received from the community is the continuing complaints of vehicle speeding and anti-social driving. The main areas of concern are Kinghorn Road (A921) and the High Street. In the coming months PC Farley and I will be continuing to focus on these areas. We will be deploying with our UNIPAR device (speed gun) with licence endorsable speeding tickets being issued to offenders. In regards to anti-social driving, the Police have powers to seize and retain vehicles if the owner/permitted driver has been driving in such a way to cause alarm, distress or annoyance to members of the public.

We can't stress enough how important road safety is. With the darker mornings and evenings that winter brings upon us it is imperative everyone is aware of their responsibilities as a vehicle owner and



driver. Road safety is one of our main priorities as a community team. We will be working with our colleagues in road policing to really drive home how important road safety is given the amount of concerns that have been raised with us.

It's the time of year that we ask for local residents and business owners to be vigilant and mindful of their properties' security. With the hours of daylight reduced in the winter we ask that you check any external security lights you may have are still operational. We have had a small number of break in attempts to sheds and outbuildings in recent weeks locally. Appropriate security helps reduce these types of incidents and opportunist thefts greatly.

Our monthly community surgeries at the Toll Community Hub on Burntisland High Street continue to be well attended. We are hopeful that the sessions have been of benefit to those members of the community who have attended.



The surgeries are monthly and the dates will be advertised via the Toll Community Hub website and a poster in the shop window on the High Street.

As always, we will take this opportunity to remind the public that there are various ways of reporting crime.


Burntisland 1883 model railway

The first weekend in October saw the return of the award winning Burntisland 1883


Model Railway Exhibition. It is now 20 years since the East of Scotland 4mm Group entered and won a competition to build a portable layout. In liaison with Burntisland Heritage the group opted to model Burntisland given its significant history as a port which built the world's first roll-on rolloff seagoing goods ferry. The award winning model has been exhibited in France, the Netherlands and throughout the UK to considerable acclaim.

The whole model is set against a backdrop of the town, and shows the station as a terminus before the line was extended for the opening of the Forth Bridge in 1890. It measures 13 metres and stretches from the West Dock, past the station and east Dock under the Lammerlaws Bridge to the site of the former Roundhouse.

The return of the model was viewed by P6s and P7s from Burntisland Primary School over two days and several hundred visitors



over the weekend. Admission to the exhibition was free but we are grateful to everyone who made generous donations which has gone towards facilitating the exhibition.

So far some brilliant ideas have been flooding in. Everything from seagull-proof bins to more toilets and parking facilities in the summer, from new paths on the Binn to a



new tidal pool, more affordable housing and improved access to the station. Do you like any of these ideas or do you have any of your own?

What happens next?

Once everyone has had the opportunity to fill in a survey form and we have had at least 500 responses (hopefully more!) and have spoken to as many community groups as possible, we will spend December and January pulling all your likes, dislikes, suggestions and ideas together. In the new year we will hold a big drop in event and invite you to come in and help us to prioritise all the great ideas. These will then

be brought together in a new Community Action Plan for 2023-2028. This new plan will be regularly reviewed by a partnership between the Community Development Trust and the Community Council and hopefully other community champions who will join this group.

Why is a Community Action Plan important?

Nobody listens to me? Nothing will ever change? Nope, not this time folks. If we were to come up with a wish list by sitting at our computers, quite rightly it wouldn't hold much sway with decision makers.

However, if a Community Action Plan is well supported and a large number of you have made a contribution through filling out a survey, talking to each other or by having a captured conversation in a group, then an Action Plan can act as a real catalyst for change. Community groups will find it easier to raise funds for issues detailed in the Plan, funders need evidence that communities want projects to happen and a Community Action Plan provides that mandate. Fife Council will listen more to our ideas if the whole town is behind them and outside agencies will know from the offset what Burntisland thinks about certain issues.

Next year the Scottish Government are asking communities to influence local authority planning decisions by preparing Local Place Plans, a good and well supported Community Action Plan will feed directly into a Local Place Plan for Burntisland.

Haven't we had an Action Plan before?

Yes, well remembered! The last Action Plan 'ran out' in 2021 but due to Covid restrictions, it was carried forward rather than renewed. The Community Council did consider doing a simple refresh of the old plan but people got together and decided that the community might have different priorities now. Back in 2015 when the last plan was written up, who would have thought we would be facing a global pandemic and BEAT would be delivering emergency food parcels to people in Burntisland? COP 26 was held in Glasgow, bringing global climate change concerns to our own doorstep, how does this impact on a coastal town like ours?

Let's all work together to create a new vision for Burntisland and make some great ideas become realities. Fill in your survey today if you haven't done so already!

Burntisland Primary School

In **Primary 1**, the classes have been loving learning about 2D shapes in Maths and have been consolidating counting to 10 and 20. They have also been learning sounds and have identified sounds to write their names.

The children have been discovering new things about their school and why uniform is important. This has meant lots of learning about the primary school badge.

The pupils in **Primary 2** have been learning about dinosaurs and they have been creating their very own dinosaurs and even giving them names! The classes are reading a great series of books called "Harry and the Dinosaurs". There has also been lots of learning in class about phonics and in Maths, the children have been working hard, learning different ways to add numbers together – for example, using a number line!

In Literacy in **Primary 3**, the children have been taking part in daily writing with a focus on punctuation and vocabulary. The classes have been reading "Leo and the Place Between" and have been loving this! In Numeracy and Maths, the children have been developing their understanding of place value, Venn diagrams and bar graphs. The topic in Primary 3 at the moment is fairgrounds and the children have loved this topic!

In Literacy in **Primary 4**, the children have been developing their use of openers in their writing, as well as adjectives and writing in full sentences. In Numeracy, there has been a focus on place value, considering numbers before and after, doubling and halving. Finally, the Primary 4 children have been studying green plants as a part of their topic - they have been loving learning about this!

In **Primary 5**, the topic is...Mary Queen of Scots! The children have created an assembly all about this and have found it incredibly interesting.

They have also been learning about subtraction and addition in Numeracy and in Literacy, the children are now doing a daily write! In P5Y, three children even managed to win a Bronze Medal in a dancing competition!

Primary 6 have a Health and Wellbeing topic this term and they are loving this. This has involved fitness as a PE topic and cooking as part of their understanding within the Food and Health aspect of the Health and Wellbeing curriculum. In Numeracy, the focus has been place value and number patterns.

Primary 7 have had an amazing first term! In Numeracy we have focused on place value and addition. We'll be finishing our week with some tricky word problems. In writing, we have been engaging in the daily write, with the children growing in confidence and enthusiasm.

Our topic is discrimination and our book "The Divided City" has been really exciting and has also been our focus for comprehension. In gym we've been working on both fitness and indoor athletics as we build towards some exciting sports events next term.

Another new term has started at playgroup with the children, returning and new, all settling well. We are expecting quite a few more children to start over the next couple of months and it will be lovely to welcome all them and their families to our setting.

We have been busy learning all about recycling, what kinds of items can be recycled, and what happens to recycling after we have put things in the bin. Toll Community Centre & Community Hub

It is my honour to lead a committed and hard working team of staff, volunteers, and Trustees, that have all made a real difference to the Burntisland Community, and who continue to do so.

Despite the many challenges faced throughout the last few years, and the more recent staffing and IT issues, I would very much like to emphasise, and reassure you, that the Community Centre and Community Hub are both open and operating as normal. This is thanks to the tremendous support of the volunteers and the wider community, who are helping to keep the Centre operational.

We've not been visible on our Facebook page recently, due to IT access issues, and occasionally operating on reduced hours in the Centre Office, but we are open and you can contact us.

Please do get in touch if you have any questions or requests for hall/room bookings and we'll get back to you as soon as possible.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, the Toll Community Centre, in partnership with Burntisland Community Council, changed the way we conducted our core business. The BEAT initiative was formed, whereby we listened to the community of Burntisland and provided services such as food parcels, prescription pick-up, free bus passes for vaccinations, school bag activity packs, and more.

As we navigate and negotiate our way through the twists and turns of post Covid-19 pandemic, where BEAT is no longer in existence, the Management Committee and staff, are keen to work towards effective strategies to "Life after Covid, at the Toll", whereby we concentrate on our core business, pre-pandemic.

The Charity/Pop-Up shop in the High Street is still operating, thanks to our volunteers. Fairshare food supplies and very limited emergency food parcels are still available. The Hub is also used for the monthly Police public meetings. Meanwhile in the Community Centre, BOSS, Playgroup, Wednesday Club, Slimming World, Sewing class, Sitter size class, Bike Project, and First Aid training continue with their ongoing programmes.

We are keen to ensure that the Centre and Hub are on a solid footing as we face increasing energy costs and continue to operate for the community. But we realise that change in our service can create anxiety for the Staff, Members and Volunteers as well as the Burntisland community, and the Trustees are keen to communicate any such changes to you, through our Toll Community Centre Facebook page, as soon as access has been restored.

We are working together with the Community Development Trust by providing input for their updating of the Community Action Plan, developing new volunteering opportunities to work with the Centre and our partners, and establishing improved use of the Centre hire and the Hub as a safe and private place for external agencies to meet with clients from the town.

Looking forward, the Bike project will be open for sale of bikes of all ages, we offer free Wi-Fi usage at the Hub and Community Centre, plus competitive hall and room hire rates. Watch this space for the return of the Youth Club in conjunction with Fife Council, as well as Children and Family Events.

Burntisland Harbour Access Trust

Forth Ports finally met with representatives of Burntisland Harbour Access Trust, Burntisland Community Development Trust and Burntisland Community Council on 5th October. At that time they were waiting to hear if their bid to set up a green freeport had been accepted. By the time you read this we'll probably know. Google "Forth Ports Freeport" for links to more info.

They anticipate that most activity would be centred on the West Dock but the East Dock would be available if needed as a "complementary" area. Existing tenants will retain access under the terms of their leases/agreements. Burntisland will not be able to access Forth Ports funds for development but will become a customs site should Forth Ports be successful and third parties wish to develop a bonded warehouse.

Fife Council is part of the bid consortium. You might wonder how the Council was able to make an objective decision about allowing the harbour to be fenced off when it had a vested interest. We're looking into the possibility that planning guidelines were breached. Forth Ports admitted that the freeport has been under discussion with the Council for at least two years but said that they have been unable until now to keep the community informed because it's been commercially sensitive, with non-disclosure agreements having been signed. They will now be happy to meet periodically.

We proposed that passes could be issued for entry to the public, like at other freeports, but they flatly rejected this using health and safety as the reason.

What a freeport would mean for the town, such as employment, is anyone's guess at this stage. The prospect of increased HGV passage through the town was raised, to which their response was that in another of their ports a development was turned down for that reason.

If their freeport bid is unsuccessful, they said they will be looking to develop the land anyway.

Regardless of what else happens, or doesn't, the new gates will be operational as soon as the equipment is ready. The fence and gate across the breakwater were installed in the wrong place and will be moved back to the position shown on the plans attached to the Listed Building Consent, i.e. to align with the fence along the eastern end of Scott Pallets. This means that only the first 40 metres or so of the breakwater will be accessible, which is especially bad news for anglers.



They admitted that the lifting derrick on Shanks' Pier shouldn't have been moved. Fife Council has asked for a retrospective Listed Building Consent application or for it to be reinstated. We pointed out that they would need to be mindful of Listed Building requirements when planning any development, which they acknowledged.

They stated that they would consider allowing us to continue using the area below South View but there are no guarantees that it won't be required at some point.

They acknowledged the existence of an old document granting rights to Burntisland residents to use the outer harbour but stated that it was written in an ancient dialect that doesn't translate well and nobody could understand it. We're trying to trace this document.

They said they will take responsibility for clearance of litter on site and along the seaward side of the breakwater.

They are adamant that the community right to buy will never be triggered as "Forth Ports don't sell land". Well...they have sold land before, including very substantial areas for development at Leith for example, and with the current unstable political and economic situation, which may continue for some time, things may change.

Will it happen? The last 40 years have seen proposals for an oil rig graving dock, a chalk processing plant and a residential development, none of which saw the light of day. The Alcan Blue Shed did come but was redundant almost immediately.

Where do we go from here? We could accept the locked breakwater gates, retreat to the Scholars' Brae viewing platform to look across at what might have been and reminisce about the good old days. Or we could say - who do they think they are?! They have locked off a much loved community asset. If we value our health, our heritage, our community, or value our values we need to do something. We're not giving up - we're in for the long haul. And let's not forget that we also have our right to buy registered over the land owned by Network Rail, which stretches eastwards from the railway station to the access road where it joins Lammerlaws Road.

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I'm afraid I have to write about dogs this time. I'm not anti-dog, I promise. But I am anti when they're allowed to disturb wildlife.

Towards the end of September I was walking home from the studio, thinking it would be a nice relaxing end to the day to go the longer way via the shore. Through the docks, past the Beacon. "Bark bark bark, woof woof woof woof, BARK BARK BARK BARK BARK...". A dog was racing with huge excitement across the bay. The tide was far out so it had a vast stretch of shallows to bound through. That's nice, happy doggy.

But such disturbance. For maybe five minutes I watched as it charged one group of birds, then another, then another. Full tilt, madly barking. I don't know if it was trying to catch them, nor if it could have, but it was charging at them and wild with the excitement of the chase. I was wild too.

Hundreds of birds forced into the air oystercatcher, redshank, godwit, curlew, plover, herring gull, lesser black-back gull, black-headed gull, common gull... It even charged straight at a heron. People were staring. I halted nervously by a man I thought the owner and asked... "Not mine. It's going wild", he said. I began to think it might be lost or having a fit.

A minute later it ran from the shallows and up the beach to its owners who were standing by the prom having a chat. I slowed to ask did they realise their dog was causing such disturbance to highly sensitive and declining species. But I couldn't. I get all shaky, just about lose my voice, do lose my nerve. Failed, I walked on. Ten minutes later and home in my garden I heard the barking start up. I suppose birds had settled back to their feeding and the dog could have its fun all over again.

A few weeks later, I was shown photos of five mute swans on the beach, two adults and three full grown young. I've never heard of swans on our beach. Have you? What a thing to see. And guess how it ended? A dog chased the swans out to sea. The owner was asked why they let that happen (someone obviously braver than me) and defensively gave the response that dogs aren't required to be on leads there.

Not required perhaps, but they are required to be under control at all times. Chasing wildlife isn't under control. Would an owner allow a dog to chase sheep up behind the Binn? Surely (hopefully) not. How can people be so unaware of our collapsing biodiversity? Don't they want their children and grandchildren to live in a world which still has wildlife? I just don't get it.

You might be thinking - What's the problem? They didn't catch anything. No wildlife was harmed in the walking of this dog. But say a bird is exhausted, hungry, unwell. Flying out of the way of a dog (or a walker/paddleboarder/photographer/ jetskier/artist) uses energy. If it happens once in a day, no matter. If it happens five, ten, twenty times in a day, that could be the difference between life and death. More so if it's in the breeding season when materials need to be gathered to build a nest, when a nest needs to be protected from predators, when food needs to be gathered to feed young, or in cold weather when lots of energy is required just to survive the night.

Paw Print". Google it. I'd love you to listen to it and share with your friends. Again, it absolutely isn't anti-dog, but it's fascinating and full of interest and ideas.

WWF's most comprehensive ever study of "trends in global biodiversity and the health of our planet" has been published today as I finish this article. The Living Planet Report 2022 reveals global wildlife populations have plummeted by 69% on average since 1970. Sixty-nine percent! Every action matters.

Join the debate and share your stories and images of local wildlife and habitat on the Burntisland Wildlife and Woodlands Facebook Group. Recently on there we've had a gorgeous male sparrowhawk; grey partridge at the docks (a bizarre location for a rare and threatened farmland species which rarely fly far); shieldbugs, insect hotels, cormorant city, mergansers, guillemots, conkers, hedgehogs; Funghenge (that's all the explanation you're getting); and a request for people to share the locations of rowan trees around the town to help build a map of places where we might be lucky enough to spot feasting waxwings or thrushes this winter. Red berried trees but also the nonnative Japanese rowans with yellow berries please. Do you have any in your garden? On your street? In your nearest park? Let us know.


