Burntisland Hedgehog Haven

Did you know we have an abundance of hedgehogs living in the town? We are so lucky to have them here as they are now on the red list vulnerable to extinction.

In 1950, there were an estimated 36 million hedgehogs in the UK, but in recent years it is now said there are only around 1 million left with numbers falling by 97%. The plight of the hedgehog really saddens me and I would hate to lose them altogether.

How my love of hedgehogs began...

I never saw any hedgehogs growing up on the south coast of England. When we moved to Burntisland I soon realised there was a good population here. I started to learn as much as I could about them and began leaving food out in the garden. Sure enough in they came and it was good to see the food disappearing! We even set up some cameras to be able to watch them.

My first encounter with a sick hedgehog wasn't as good. I rang the Forth Hedgehog Hospital in Rosyth but they were full so I called the SSPCA. They took some details and told me it sounded fine and to just release it when it got dark.

I felt uneasy doing this as it was a windy and rainy night. My instincts told me to bring him in and the poor thing was so cold, so I warmed him up with a hot water bottle and he looked so much better. I then made the mistake of going to bed. Poor "Spike" didn't survive the night, as he needed to be kept warm and I shouldn't have let that hot water bottle cool down.

How the Hedgehog Haven came about...

The following year my husband and I encountered three hedgehogs out in the day looking very poorly on separate occasions. One was covered in fly strike and I knew it was a race against time before the eggs hatched into maggots and the poor thing would start to be eaten alive. I rang the Hedgehog Hospital but again they were full so I grabbed a toothbrush and tweezers and set to work to get the fly eggs off.

After removing them we headed up to the wildlife hospital at Fishcross. It's such a trek and with so many hedgehogs needing help it set the wheels in motion to try and learn more of the medical side of hedgehog care.

I began volunteering at Forth Hedgehog Hospital on Saturdays, which soon turned into two mornings a week. I then saw a post on Facebook from Sandy Boyd who was closing his rescue in Wormit and was looking for someone to take over. I purchased some of his equipment and then became a fosterer for



the Forth Hedgehog Hospital to help free up cages so more hedgehogs could be admitted. Sandy's books and leaflets on hedgehog care really got me interested in going further and setting up my own rescue. These lovely spiky friends need all the help they can get!

So if you see a hedgehog out in the day which is not moving with purpose (i.e. it doesn't have nesting materials in its mouth or in a hurry) please secure it in a high sided box and contact us as it will need help. Hedgehogs do not sunbathe and ones that do are extremely ill even if they look ok. Healthy hedgehogs only come out at night with the exception of nesting or nursing mums.

Community Council elections

In August of this year there will be an opportunity to build a new Community Council, whose members are full of vibrancy and creativity, for the four years ahead.

Why should you be interested? In a nutshell, if there are fewer than 7 nominations there will be no Community Council in Burntisland for the first time in 45 years. The Community Council is the only statutory body which is focused exclusively on Burntisland— whether its people, its infrastructure or its environment.

With a tiny regular income of around £1,200, we actually manage budgets of about 10 times that in the current financial year—and it has been much higher for special projects.

The focus of new projects will be entirely at the discretion of the new Community Council and will take into account the key findings of the new Community Action Plan. So it might include the provision of post office and banking facilities; making the train station more accessible; re-opening public access to the harbour; managing the impact of the summer fair; or whatever other initiatives would make Burntisland a better, safer and happier place to live.

To put your name forward, you must be on the current electoral register for Burntisland and be nominated by two people who are also on that register.

The closing date for nominations will be **Thursday 31st August**. Nomination forms will be available nearer the time, but as a starting point you might like to attend some of the Community Council meetings before then. Currently on the second Friday evening of each month in the Burgh Chambers, it is likely that all future meetings will also be available via Zoom.

The current members will also welcome enquiries and will direct you to the most appropriate source of information.

Community Council Bullets.....

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the second Friday of each month, at 7pm in Burntisland's Burgh Chambers. **Dates for the next two meetings are: 12th May and 9th June. There is no meeting in July.**

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. A summary of issues discussed during the last three meetings is set out below. Full minutes can also be found on the Community Council website.

- We have escalated to the Chief Executive of NHS Fife our concerns about the current pharmacy service in Burntisland. In turn, NHS Fife are responsible for approving or rejecting proposals for an alternative or additional pharmacy. It is now 8 months since the most recent appeal against rejection was upheld, but there is no evidence so far of any action having been taken by NHS Fife.
- A number of small grants have been made to local organisations, namely Floral Action Burntisland, Burntisland Heritage Trust and the Central Burntisland Tenants and Residents Association.
- The community notice board at Union Street has now been refurbished. Access is available via the Toll Community Hub, the library, Burntisland Community Development Trust or the Community Council Secretary.
- The Community Event at the school on 18th March was hugely successful, with over 400 people and over 20 local groups attending. The results are currently being fed in to the resulting Community Action Plan for the next several years.
- Some 30 years after first having been requested, an upgraded path is being constructed between Glebe Place and Meadowfield, with an extra path connecting from Kerr Court.
- The Common Good Fund has been used to buy equipment which will enable future Community Council meetings to be streamed via Zoom. The kit will also be available to other local organisations who use the Burgh Chambers or who have independent access to an appropriate Wi-Fi router. Online access to our meetings should be requested via the Chair.
- It is now very likely that the water feature on the Links is at the end of its operational life. There are no funds immediately available which would allow an early replacement to be installed. We continue to press Fife Council for enhanced funding and/or fundraising.
- Plans are in hand for the renewal and/or extension of Christmas lights, with up to £5,000 being committed for this year.
- We were sorry to learn that Yvonne Crombie has now moved away from Burntisland and has stood down as a member. She has played a very valuable role in planning the Exiles Reception, in helping to judge the Scots Verse competition and in facilitating the overall response to the Covid restrictions. We wish her well.

Community Award Presentation

In February, a civic reception was held in the historic Burgh Chambers to honour the winners of the annual Community Award. For the first time, this year the Community Council conferred awards in all three available categories.

The individual award winner and recipient of the Citizen's Shield is Bill Kirkhope. The group award shield was presented to Central Burntisland Tenants and Residents Association, represented by Lynne and Paul. And the inaugural winner of the young person award is Joana Barron.

All three received a personalised certificate, presented by Alex MacDonald and Cllr Julie MacDougall.

David Torrance MSP also presented a framed copy of his Scottish Parliament motions, which recognised each winner.

With this we were able to execute a warrant for drugs on the High Street during the most recent quarter. We are actively developing intelligence all the time to allow us to carry out further operations of a similar nature.

Please come and speak with us if you see us out and about. We're continuing the Police surgeries held in Toll Community Hub on Burntisland High Street, with our next surgery scheduled for Thursday 25th May, 10am–12pm.

Due to the dynamic nature of policing we are unable to offer a Burntisland surgery in June. We will however be in Kinghorn Community Centre on Tuesday 20th June at 10am–12pm.

We are aware that this quarter will bring in better weather and as a result an influx of visitors, please be aware of any issues raised by this. We also ask you remain vigilant in relation to bogus workmen as mentioned last issue, please look out for any neighbours you believe to be elderly or vulnerable and using the details below please alert us to anything you think may be suspicious. We anticipate a rise potentially in Anti-Social Behaviour due to the longer evenings and better weather, again please raise any concerns via the usual contact methods.

We have also seen more of and will continue to be a presence in relation to speeding motorists as we are fully aware that this is an emotive issue for Burntisland residents and will take appropriate action where necessary.

These were just some of the lovely written comments we received at the Community Action Plan prioritising event in March.

Working with the Community Council and a small army of community minded volunteers, we were delighted to welcome 400 people through the doors see the results of the householder surveys and stakeholder interviews. 22 community groups took a table at the event giving them the chance to showcase their work and opportunities to network and connect. Dr Bike and the Toll Centre joined forces to offer free bikes for children whilst the Broomhill Garden Club and the Big Green Market had yet more activities for the younger members of our community.

We had free tea and coffee available throughout the day along with delicious cake supplied by the Cornerstone Community Café. The fabulous Pipe Band opened the event at 11am and we were further entertained by the Primary School's String Group, Andrea McDonalds School of Highland Dancing and George Fisher with his new extended version of 'Who'll feed Sammy'.

Sammy the seal was very much on people's minds as they cast their seven votes for the initiatives and projects they most wanted to see happen. Reopening access to the harbour was high on the community's agenda, along with action on the lack of Post Office/banking facilities in the High Street which is causing difficulties for residents and businesses alike. Also very high on the list was proper access to the railway station and revisiting the current arrangements for the summer Shows. These are all issues very specific to Burntisland and specific community solutions were suggested by many voters.

Many people left their contact details and asked to be kept up to date with developments and progress in the themes they were most interested in, and even more people indicated they wanted to get involved in being part of the changes they wanted to see. If you didn't manage to get along on 18th March, it isn't too late to get involved in key issues. If you want a tidal pool, facilities for motorhomes, safe areas to exercise your dog or any other ideas that you suggested in your own survey, e-mail us and we we'll keep you in the loop.

Now the votes have all been counted, we

are working towards the creation of a new Community Action Plan to share with you all in the next few weeks. We want the new plan to be regularly reviewed and be responsive to new issues and opportunities, could you play a part in the new review group?

Now it's not the case. We're so well-known that people usually bring a couple of donation bags to each market. That means

we can replenish our stock on both days (thanks to our volunteers who sort the back room and keep everything on rotation!)

So now, you don't need to join the queue to grab the goodies. Bargains – the very best ones – are available throughout both days, and often some of the real treasure doesn't hit the shelves till later in the day.

Donations are always welcome...unless...

If you're doing a wee spring clean and pulling together some items to donate, here's what we can accept: good quality clothing, shoes, handbags, jewellery, bric-abrac, household items, books, vinyl, crafting supplies, toys and games.

We can't accept electricals because we can't guarantee they're safe when we sell them (we don't have funds to conduct PAT testing). We don't have storage for larger items or furniture, and we have so many CDs/DVDs that aren't shifting.

You'd be surprised what else turns up at the Big GREEN Market. We've had to bin some

unusual items over the years, including outof-date medicine, torn or unclean garments and second-hand underwear. If you're doubting donating an item, ask yourself, 'If I saw this-would I buy it?' If the answer's no then it's probably seen better days, so please don't add it to your bag.

Burntisland Primary School

In Numeracy, **Primary 1** have been learning about adding and subtracting, and have been learning to identify the values of different coins. They have loved pretending to be shopkeepers as they learn how to use the correct coins to pay for products! They have started learning how to read o'clock and half past the hour on a clock.

In Literacy, the P1 children have been learning new sounds, and have been trying to use capital letters, finger spaces, full stops and, for a challenge, they have been trying to use connectives. They have also been learning how to identify 'true', 'false' and 'can't tell' information in stories.

As part of their Health and Wellbeing, they have been taking part in P.E. where they have been perfecting their ball skills by throwing, catching and dribbling. As well identifying adults who they can go to in and out of school if they need support.

Their topic has been fairy tales. In this topic, they have been learning about the different parts of castles, traditional fairy tales and flags.

Primary 2 children have been focusing on trying to start learning their times tables by counting in 5's, 10's and 2's. They have been developing their understanding of subtraction too!

In Literacy, they have been learning how to place words in alphabetical order and they have been writing trickier sentences with connectives and openers. They have also been learning to recall stories.

In Health and Wellbeing, they have been learning to have a growth mindset. In P.E. they have been dancing and taking part in Cosmic Yoga. Their recent topic was The Human Body and their new topic is Space.

This term, children in **Primary 3 and Primary 3/4** have been learning all about Ancient Egypt as their topic and doing some art including hieroglyphics and creating their own Egyptian Gods.

In Numeracy and Maths, they have been ordering fractions and learning about halves and quarters. They have also been focused on addition and subtractions and they are developing their understanding of time using analogue and digital clocks.

As part of their writing they have been learning how to write creatively, using similes in their stories. They have also been doing writing daily, as the whole school have, to improve their tools for writing.

In ICT they have been learning how to sign into Glow and they have been improving their typing skills.

P3 and P3/4 have enjoyed taking part in Kitbag sessions with Miss Shiels, going out at least once a day for their Daily 15 and they have been learning all about Emotion Works with Mr Bryson.

Primary 4 and Primary 4/5 have been learning all about Vikings as their topic this term. They have learned where they came from, what type of boats they had, the type of houses they had, what was in their houses and what their long boats looked like. Their Viking based art looks amazing!

In Numeracy, they have been developing their understanding of multiplication and division and they have been working on different strategies to use to solve multiplication and division calculations.

In writing, the focus has been using adjectives to enhance their writing further, as well as trying to use commas accurately.

In Health and Wellbeing, the focus has been on understanding different relationships and how to manage different relationships.

The topic in **Primary 5** has been learning about the mind and body. They have been finding out about what a healthy diet is and learning strategies to keep the mind healthy as well as how to keep the body healthy physically. Kitbag sessions have also been a part of their Health and Wellbeing.

In Literacy, they have been using skimming and scanning of their class novel which is The Train to Impossible Places. During Daily Write, they have been focusing on adjectives and openers. To inspire their writing, they have used films and objects. They have been doing a wide range of maths which includes measurement, angles, perimeter, area and percentage.

Football, gymnastics and orienteering have been a part of their PE as well as hockey and volleyball.

In ICT, P5 have been using Publisher and PowerPoint and they have also been learning about online safety.

The topic in **Primary 6** is the Titanic and they have been doing art associated with it and lots of research. Children have really enjoyed this and made 3D models as part of their homework.



In Literacy, P6 children have been focused on punctuation and activities in relation to The Titanic Detective Agency, which is their class novel. They have also been writing newspaper reports.

In ICT, the children have been using Excel and have been using Zu3D to create animation. P6 have also used this time to do research on their topic.

Children in **Primary 7** have had a focus on adding and subtracting fractions, decimals and percentages in their Numeracy and Maths work. This has been a really challenging topic!

In Literacy, the children have been trying to use ambitious vocabulary to improve their work in their Daily Write. They have been reading Divided City and recently finished The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas. For their WW2 topic, P7 have been learning about the dig for victory campaign and V.E. day.

For P.E. they are taking part in athletics activities, and have just finished their rugby sessions. Also, as part of their Health and Wellbeing, they learned about how important it is to have a healthy diet and good sleep pattern by looking at the 5 Ways to Wellbeing.



With all the shrubbery having died back it's been a perfect chance to clear some of the less accessible areas around the town.

We have been taking part in Keep Scotland Beautiful's Spring Clean campaign, and held a number of litter picks. Firstly, up at the Broomhill viewpoint where we cleared 10 bags of rubbish and also managed to get the council grounds maintenance team to come and cut all the bushes back, so thank you to them. Another litter pick was at the Toll Park and the Cot Burn where we cleared 7 bags full plus other bigger items.

The play park and wooded area along the Haugh Road has also been given a good clean up which resulted in 13 bags full plus lots of fly tipped items.

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Keep Burntisland Beautiful

We then cleared 21 bags of rubbish and multiple larger items including 12 tyres from the bushes around The Point. Lots of old rubbish as one of the crisp packets we picked up was from 2008!



This is on top of our lovely members who litter pick on daily walks around the town. Thank you to everyone who helps keep Burntisland beautiful and to everyone who has come along to support our litter picks!






Floral Action Burntisland

Burntisland Heritage Summer Exhibition

100 Years of Shipbuilding—Burntisland and Kinghorn building for the world

This year we are offering a bumper helping. From Saturday 17th June you can step back in time to the early days of the steamship and to shipbuilding in Burntisland and Kinghorn. Our 2023 exhibition takes you from the early days of the Iron Screw Steamer to the specialist ships of the late 1960s and 100 years of supplying ships to the world.

The Abden Yard of John Key & Sons opened in 1868 and at that time was at the forefront of Iron shipbuilding driven by Kirkcaldy built steam engines. We look at the beautiful iron framed sailing ships launched by the yard, the first iron Whaler and the wonderful Paddle Steamers such as the Willie Muir. The yard supplied many of the steamships plying the world's oceans delivering goods and emigrants to the farflung empire.

Just as Kinghorn was closing a modern yard was opening in Burntisland. Driven by the

demands of WWI and the extraordinary drive of two brilliant brothers. We look at the innovation that saw the yard go from a bare stretch of land to the launch of its first ship within 12 months. We examine the 'Burntisland Economy Ship', that saw the yard through the hungry thirties. The amazing WWII effort that saw production break all records and the innovations that helped the Allies win the war.

Step into the 1950s and 1960s where specialisation was required to survive. As ships grew larger Burntisland was unable to compete and like the Abden yard 50 years before, time caught up with it.

All of this ties in with our model boat collection which we exhibited for the first time last year.

We hold complete detailed records of every ship built in the town and every Burntisland Shipyard Journal published. Come in and look round this FREE exhibition and browse our extensive collection of local news cuttings and photographs.



The Exhibition will be open from 11am to 4pm every Thursday, Friday and Saturday, from 17th June up to the end of August.

Live on the Links at 40

Burntisland's live music festival, Live on the Links, (or wherever), has without a fanfare or trumpets reached its 40th anniversary this year. The Links has a bandstand, uncovered and until recently unpowered, used for events like the Crowning of the Summer Queen next to the fairground.

Back in 1983, with a band rehearsing progressive music and nowhere to play it, I found another use for the bandstand. With permission easily obtained locally, along with Steve MacAndrew and Chas Gemmill, we organised a festival, with my band Boxed Set, Scarlet Lies, and Rab Watson's Troops of Tomorrow playing that afternoon.

The first Saturday in August was picked because by that late in the summer season, the shows would have naturally moved from the front giving us space. Sponsorship from local traders paid for the canopy, sound system and electricity generator, and we played our music to our friends, with some of it captured on early VHS tape. Along with our pals from Kinghorn and Kirkcaldy, we numbered around 350 midafternoon, as reported in the Fife Leader.



A year later we repeated the event, with John Cooper paying for the generator while the canopy and sound system was donated directly by sponsors. I dropped out after that, and further events were organised by Chas among others, but mainly by Rab. It was found to be easier to get a curtainsided lorry than cover the bandstand and different locations on the Links were tried, with turning to face the town bringing Gus close to being arrested! The last of these was really in 2000, when permissions came with further costs and it looked to be over.

In 2008 I mentioned to Rab that it was 25 years since our first event. We decided in principle to attempt to hold an anniversary event, in particular in memory of our bandmates and friends who had passed away. We were offered a vacant slot in the Civic Week marquee programme, and we sold tickets to pay for the sound system.

With the success of this event and having raised only part of the money on the night needed to buy a memorial seat, I decided to hold further events called "Too Cauld for the Links", at Pettycur Bay Caravan Park offseason in November. Two were held, one of which made money and the second one lost it again, as poor attendance didn't cover the costs.



Late 2013, I decided to create a funk band, since I had a notion after 30 years inactivity, and after a guest spot with Rab, to play live again. We rehearsed in the Smugglers, and having paid so many times for hire of a sound system I bought my own in 2014.

So in 2016, Rab and I made our triumphant return to the Links. As a joke I had decided to parody Rick Wakeman with the wide sleeves of a wizard's costume. Since I had no band by then I performed two pieces of my own playing solo piano to open the festival.



Rab had invested in a gazebo to cover the bandstand in case of rain, however in the afternoon the wind blew it off completely! And it turned out that the sound system I owned wasn't powerful enough to play outdoors. In addition, things had changed since the 80s. We no longer had as much room, the weather was less predictable, and drinking alcohol outdoors was controlled. We also needed licences and insurance, electrical test certificates and permission from the council and the police.

With our return to the bandstand I was able to keep the promise to put a memorial on the Links, and bought a brass plaque with the money left from the Pettycur events.

We were encouraged by a community survey which showed enthusiasm for having a festival, although frequent calls for young people to help on the day fell largely on deaf ears. It did possibly encourage Fife Council to provide power to the bandstand. It appeared that we were finally achieving recognition of some sort in the town.

In 2018 I proudly played my own music again, with the Wizards of Progg. It's what I had created the event for. A year later, in what would turn out to be the final event on the Links, the day ended with torrential rain in the early evening. By that time though we had expanded to have bands playing in the pubs as well over the weekend, and we held a successful Chill out Sunday in the Sands Hotel.

Covid prevented the 2020 and 2021 events, but Rab announced that with rising costs, he would no longer underwrite the festival. The gazebo was also lying in bits needing repaired, and that having once again borne the responsibility of setting up the stage and taking it down, he was calling it a day.

With music licenses, insurance, and the hassle of fencing around the beer tent, it was no longer about playing music for our friends. Everyone was making money, except the musicians, and we had lost our independence. The cost had risen to £1500.

In 2021 I finally met Stuart Nicol and finding out his pedigree as a drummer, we decided to play together, in a revival of The Wizards of Progg. Of course, we would need somewhere to play, so I took up the offer of a free hall hire and ran Live at the Links over two days at The Sands Hotel in 2022. I had a sound system big enough for there, and no worries about the weather!

2023 will be the 40th Anniversary. I want to step down too, but I also want to reach a nice round number and we need to have somewhere for The Wizards to play. Things have come full circle.

This year in particular, we have a lineup designed to get feet tapping immediately. "No easy start" says Howling Al, who will open the proceedings at Burntisland Sands Hotel on Saturday 24th June, with a wide range of bands plus a DJ. That's followed by solo artists and duos and a more chilled day on the Sunday 25th, organised by Ronnie Mackie. The event will be run by Fiona Combe.

Lastly a big thank you to everyone whose enthusiasm has kept the event going for so long, all the musicians, sponsors, the volunteers and our families without which an event like this couldn't happen. And thank you Burntisland for giving us a warm welcome.



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Museum of Communication Exhibition 2023

When Broadcasting Came to Scotland

Each year the Museum of Communication based at 131 High Street in Burntisland opens for a public exhibition. Last year we had a successful and well attended exhibition to commemorate the 100 years since broadcasting started in Britain. Thank you to everyone who supported us!

In 2023 we are celebrating the centenary of public broadcasting in Scotland. The exhibition opens on Saturday 13th May, everyone is welcome. It will appeal to all ages and will run until the end of September. There will be **no charge** for entry although donations towards the work of this unique charity are always welcome.



Take a Look inside the history of Broadcasting in Scotland at MoC

The exhibition will feature famous radio and TV programmes and events illustrated by items from our collection - crystal set radios, valve wirelesses and TVs, recalling the great moments in broadcasting history, events of the day and other memorabilia. We will have a broadcast demonstration for young people to enjoy and explain some of the technical aspects of broadcasting. We also will show how broadcasting has evolved into today's world of online streaming, smartphones and HDTV.

The first radio service in Scotland was launched by the British Broadcasting Company on 6 March 1923. Station was called **SSC** and located in Bath Street in Glasgow. The small crowed studio often housed an orchestra, pipe band, choir, solo singers, actors and speech-makers trying to send news, current affairs, sport, religious addresses and entertainment into people's homes. The service quickly expanded to



include the new stations based in Aberdeen, Dundee, and Edinburgh.

Edinburgh's studio was located in the back premises of a music shop on George Street, broadcasting local afternoon and *Children's Hour* productions and evening programmes on Friday nights. The output from Scottish stations was even picked up in the United States during 1924! In 1927, the BBC combined the local stations into the BBC Regional Programme. These merged to form the BBC Home Service in 1939, and, apart from a break in the Second World War, it had some national 'opt outs' until the establishment of a separate BBC Radio Scotland in 1978.

In 1935, BBC Scotland moved Broadcasting House to North Park House in Queen Margaret Drive, a site partly chosen due to the attraction of the nearby tennis courts, gardens and bowling greens!

Television had a sombre start in Scotland with the broadcast of the funeral of King George VI on 15 February 1952. The Kirk O'Shotts transmitter broadcast programmes that came from London but some with Scottish content. The first Scottish broadcast was from Edinburgh's large music studio to the whole of the UK. The show featured a prayer of dedication, a speech by the Lord Provost of Edinburgh, followed by ten minutes of Scottish country dancing. A BBC manager in London said the "Speeches were dreadful- most depressing." Luckily, the audience was won over with programmes such as the first TV play, JM Barrie's 'The Old Lady Shows Her Medals', news and parliamentary coverage and the first television outside broadcast at the Edinburgh Festival Tattoo.

By the mid-60s TV and radio coverage had reached over 97% of Scotland. The 'Great Glen Chain', a ribbon of links and transmitters across Scotland was expensive to set up but showed that the BBC was earnestly extending its services to outlying and thinly populated areas. BBC2 started in Scotland in July 1966 and the BBC launched regular colour transmissions in July 1967. A mobile control room was used to make the first Scottish colour programme, *Ring in the New*, for that year's Hogmanay. Eventually, BBC Scotland established the right to optout of the network more and more.



In 1980, to celebrate 50 years of broadcasting from Edinburgh's Queen Street studios, Radio Scotland's *Good Morning Scotland* was televised, pioneering breakfast television. The TV hit of the '80s was comedy drama *Tutti Frutti*, written by John Byrne and launched the careers of Robbie Coltrane, Emma Thompson and Richard Wilson.

Following the creation of several new stations, Radio Highland, Radio Aberdeen, Radio Orkney, Radio Shetland and Radio nan Eilean, the first national radio station was launched. Radio Scotland opened with a televised ceremony at Glasgow's Kelvin Hall in November 1978.

BBC Scotland increased the number of programmes it made to be shown on the networks, an ambition greatly aided by the move of BBC Scotland's new headquarters to BBC Pacific Quay in 2007 where state of the art digital studios were built and by the decision of the BBC centrally to move a number of programme departments, out of London.

BBC Scotland now makes a wide variety of programmes for numerous networks - the network radio, the terrestrial TV channels and digital stations such as CBeebies. This month will see the coronation of King Charles III.

St Serf's Scottish Episcopal Church

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Burntisland Harbour Access Trust

Well, the fence may be up around the harbour and the gates locked, but the *Fight the Fence* campaign has not yet conceded defeat. The results of the recent public consultation for the Community Action Plan, with restoration of harbour access figuring highly on the list of priorities which people want to see achieved, reinforce our mandate and strengthen our resolve.

We continue to explore the issue of whether the fence is actually legal. It may be that it contravenes existing rights of public access including customary rights, those conferred in the harbour acts and bylaws and in old title documents. It's a legal minefield which requires expert analysis, so we have compiled a comprehensive brief to determine if there are grounds for overturning Forth Ports' action. Our specialist lawyers' response suggests that we may have a case, so we have applied for funding to enable us to give them instructions to get to work.

The other main strand of BHAT's activity involves investigating the possibility of acquiring vacant land for community use. There are three land areas of current interest (see map: land owned by Forth Ports outlined in red, land owned by Network Rail in yellow, and thirdly land owned by Fife Council in white – namely the Roundhouse car park and the small car park opposite the Beacon)

Why do we want to purchase this land? Both Fife Council and the Scottish Government are keen to promote tourism, with an emphasis on all-weather assets. Where better than Burntisland? We have a stunning south facing maritime setting with direct rail links to Edinburgh, Dundee and Perth. We already host the Highland Games, the Shows, Civic Week and Bonfire Night, we have museums, a vibrant High Street, the Links, the beach and a range of maritime activities from whale-watching to sailing, and a heritage steeped in history as personified by the Parish Church or indeed the harbour.

What do we need? Car-parking certainly, but also a framework and land within which to develop and expand our potential. While Forth Ports strive to develop the basin area of the East Dock, they are unlikely to entertain any alternatives to Freeport activities: however the derelict railway land and car parks sit to the north and east of the basin as wasted assets. It is these areas that BHAT seeks to purchase within a framework of community use, a framework that will ultimately include the East Dock Basin and the Breakwater. BHAT has made a bold start in acquiring the legal "first refusal" on the land if it is put up for sale by Forth Ports and/or Network Rail. We have in fact written to the latter asking if they are prepared to negotiate with us without further delay for the sale of their holding, much of which lies unused and uncared for - it could be such a useful community resource.

Returning to the Community Action Plan, our stand at the Community Futures Event at the school in March was busy throughout the day. Attendees commented and voted for a variety of suggested uses of the land were it to come into public ownership. We gained a number of new members and several residents supplied details of their own history of enjoying access to the harbour over the years, all

grist to the mill when it comes to attempting to demonstrate customary rights.

We're continuing to liaise with the Fife Council's



Active Travel Officer about the proposed new pedestrian and cycle route, part of which will pass alongside the harbour. The damage to the wall on the harbour's western peninsula, caused during the botched demolition of the Butters Bros crane, has been reported to the council's Planning Enforcement Officer. The wall forms part of the Grade 2 Listed structure and the law requires that it be repaired.

Finally, intriguing new padlocks have started appearing on the harbour fence. See if you can spot them next time you're walking past...

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

Burntisland Nature Watch

The big Community Action Plan Event in the Primary School has now taken place. Twenty-two local groups had stalls, including **Burntisland Biodiversity** (Facebook group, formerly known as Burntisland Wildlife & Woodlands), **Burntisland Hedgehog Haven** (New to Burntisland! - please follow them on Facebook) and the Scottish Wildlife Trust. There were live music and dance performances. Greener Kirkcaldy brought e-bikes to try and refurbished kids bikes for families to take away – for free! There was such great home-baking.

Around 400 people attended and made their votes and comments on the ideas being considered for the forthcoming Community Action Plan. The results strongly show that local wildlife and habitat are of great importance to townspeople, and that we must protect and enhance what we have. Comments from the day include:

- Front gardens plant a tree / hedge / wildflowers / make a wildlife pond - so passers by see nature-full gardens and are inspired to do the same. Include hand-made signs "grass left long for nature", "sparrows nest here", "goldfinches love dandelion seeds" white marker pen on broken slates is an easy option.
- Making / improving habitats on the Links & turning empty spaces into wildlife havens.
- Nature walks / talks / drawing / painting sessions.
- Create hedgehog accessible gardens 'untidy' areas, piles of garden trimmings in the corners rather than in brown Council compost bins, small holes under fences and gates.
- Carefully consider private & public lighting as it removes the joy and awe of connecting with night sky (the stars visible from the Links and some garden areas are wonderful) and is known to

be having hugely detrimental effect on insect populations and to be disturbing to much other wildlife.

- Protect trees we still have and plant lots more.
- It's all linked improve outdoor spaces and facilities and it will encourage more people to interact with nature and to be more educated about climate.
- Council policies, particularly planning, need to focus on supporting Net Zero and protecting environment/ biodiversity.
- Stop building on our green spaces.
- Plant bus stop roofs with wild flowers.
- No more toxic spraying of green space.

An inspiring event leaving us with loads of suggestions of actions to undertake both individually and collaboratively. Post your ideas and questions on the Burntisland Biodiversity Facebook group or contact me directly. It would be great to start sharing the different skills and enthusiasms we all have.

We also asked what wildlife people have been most excited to see in the town. Answers included sparrowhawk, starlings & sparrows in numbers, house martins & swifts, bats, hedgehogs, and an owl hovering over a Ferguson Place hedge. It was me who saw the owl, 11.30pm one night. It was too small for a tawny owl, hovering flutter-winged over a tall thick privet hedge. Almost definitely a longeared owl. Was it trying to hunt small birds roosting in the hedge? Was it thinking of roosting there itself? After a few moments it flew off low and completely silent around the back of James Park houses.

My other most exciting recent sighting has been on a meandering walk from Aberdour to Burntisland via field paths, woods, country roads and coastal path. Suddenly a loud hollow drumming great! A great spotted woodpecker. It was fairly close and drumming well so we quickly managed to work out roughly which tree it was in then spot it with our binoculars. We could see the bright red under-tail which all great spotted woodpeckers have, and also could see it had no red on head or neck, telling us it was an adult female. Adult males have a smallish red rectangle on the back of their neck and juveniles have a large and obvious red patch on the very top of their head. The under-tail red of the juvenile is much paler than on adults.



The drumming of the woodpecker is a sound of Spring, made by both males and females. It is their 'song', a short, fast, drilling, made by rapid back-and-fore hammering of beak against a probably dead and hollow tree trunk or limb. It rings out far across a wood to claim and hold breeding territories. I saw one drumming on the metal cap on top of a telegraph pole alongside the Settle-Carlisle railway line, the sound was tremendous.

The rest of the year if you want to spot a great spot you need to listen for their call, a short 'kik' / 'kek', usually repeated but sometimes just heard once. Look quickly up and you may see the bouncing flight of a starling-sized bird as it flies from tree to tree. Or you might hear a treetop tap tap as a woodpecker works to retrieve grubs from a piece of dead wood.
