2024 Community Award Winners

The recipient of this year's Individual award is **Tom Courts**, owner of an award-winning butchers shop on the High Street.

Tom took over the shop in 2016 and his business has gone from strength to strength, making a significant contribution to the success of the High Street amongst an outstanding collection of shops.

Alex MacDonald, Chairman of the Community Council said, "Tom's generosity of spirit and action are well-known. He is not only a successful businessman but he has also supported many events, organisations and individuals in the town."



Alex explained that the idea of the Community Award was proposed by his predecessor, Tom Courts Snr, and introduced back in 1981. This is one of a number of family connections on the list of winners, with Tom's late father having previously won the award in 1986.

The Group winner is the volunteers of the **Big Green Market**. Since July 2021 the BGM has held a pre-loved market on the first Friday and Saturday of each month in the Parish Church Halls.

Over £30,000 has been raised in that time

for community groups and organisations—a real boost to the town emerging from Covid restrictions whilst also allowing people to declutter!

The BGM has a team of about 60 volunteers with up to half of them helping each month. There is a real buzz in the market, as the volunteers get stuck in to help set up, organise

donated items for sale, and then pack everything away again.

Alex MacDonald added "It was an inspired idea which might have been very ordinary, but the enthusiasm and dedication of those who prepare, deliver and refresh the market each month show a dedication to our community which is simply outstanding."

Supper at the Sally returns

Thanks to an enthusiastic team of volunteers and massive support from the community, Supper at the Sally, the friendly, pay-whatyou-can, Saturday evening pop-up event is back.

Piloted last year by BCDT Development Officers and volunteers it provides good food in a friendly environment at the Salvation Army Hall on Lonsdale Crescent at 5 pm-6.30 pm every Saturday.

Diners have given ten out of ten to the food, the friendly atmosphere and the service, enjoying delights such Tom Courts Sausage Casserole, Spaghetti Bolognese, "best ever" tomato soup and a "banging" jam sponge and custard with donated, locally made quince jam. The project is a real community effort thanks to a brilliant response from volunteers, funders and local businesses. Fife Council helped by arranging Food Hygiene training for volunteers and Burntisland First Aid Trust sponsored two volunteers through First Aid training. Go Fibre, Fife Council Warmer Places Fund and Forth Ports have all helped with funding.

Totally Locally Burntisland also paid for aprons for the volunteers with an embroidered logo. Locals have donated cooking pots and the Big Green Market donated pre-loved crockery and cutlery.

Jane Searles one of the volunteer team and BCDT director explained "The amazing kitchen team include professional chefs who are helping to train and upskill volunteers so that they can build their confidence and experience, and potentially move into paid work or volunteer in other projects in the town. We will keep the project going as long as there are enough volunteers who can commit to running it and enough funds to support it. Community Council Bullets......

The Community Council holds its regular meetings on the third Tuesday of each month, at 7pm in Burntisland's Burgh Chambers. **Dates for the next three meetings are: Tuesday 19th March, 16th April, and 20th May.** Please note the change to a different meeting day since the last issue.

Members of the public are welcome to attend or to raise matters of interest to them. Meetings are also available to join using Zoom videoconferencing—please contact the Secretary or Chair if you wish to join online via Zoom.

A summary of issues discussed during recent meetings is set out below. Full minutes can also be found on the Community Council website.

- It's the start of a new, four-year cycle for the Community Council. We
 welcomed new members Isla MacDonald, Kizzy Wapplington, Jonna Lange
 and Gemma Craigie-Sharland. We're very grateful for the past service of
 those who decided not to stand this year: Elizabeth McLaughlin, Clare
 Slater, Lynne Ralph, Brendan Burns and Fiona Watson.
- Our public meetings have now changed to the 3rd Tuesday of each month, in the Burgh Chambers at 7 pm. All can be joined by videoconference via Zoom. All it takes is an e-mail to our Secretary or Chair.
- The Community Emergency Plan will be updated to reflect our experience
 of the 'Beast from the East' and also Covid. Both the Toll Community Centre
 and Burntisland Community Development Trust will be engaged in that
 process.
- NHS Fife have again refused the proposal for a second pharmacy in Burntisland, so an appeal was registered by us and by the applicant in early December. Most communities of our size have two separate pharmacies. We currently depend on one, which leaves all of us vulnerable to a single point of failure. We have been working hard but NHS Fife have not yet sent the appeal to the National Appeals Panel.
- Two new Blue Badge parking spaces will be provided in the High Street.
- Bollards will soon be erected to prevent motor vehicles accessing the new cycle path at the Links opposite Erskine Church.
- Speed surveys will be carried out on part of Cowdenbeath Road, Aberdour Road and Kirkton Road.
- Design work is under way for dropped kerbs at crossing points on Aberdour Road
- 20mph repeater signs will be erected at Ramsay Crescent / Duncanson Drive
- New Christmas lighting was put in place for the vicinity of Union Street, St Andrew's Court and the War Memorial. We're grateful to Sott Pallets, the Sands Hotel, Parish Church, Bel & Etta and the Rosyth Concert Band for their sponsorship. We're grateful also to the Big Green Market and all voluntary helpers for their support.
- We have opened dialogue with Forth Ports and Fife Council regarding the
 possible development of a Green Freeport at Burntisland. Few details are
 yet available but we expect discussions to continue as the proposals
 become more fully developed.


We've also been busy looking at some

The café is always open on Wednesdays from 12 noon to 2 pm in the Parish Church Hall at the top of Kirkgate. We provide lunch and limitless tea and coffee. There is no charge at all! The café exists to provide a meal and company for anyone who would like to come. We have many regular visitors now and it's become a place to meet up with friends, make new friends and find a welcome. Bacon and egg rolls are still a firm favourite as is a fruit crumble.

We are grateful to Tom Courts our local butcher who makes sure we have the best bacon in town and Ross McCauley who sources the freshest of vegetables and beautiful fruit which features in our soups and crumbles. We have also received donations from the Big Green Market. Our volunteers continue to be the backbone of the café. They're a great team; always smiling and ready to speak to all our visitors. Running the café is only possible because of the brilliant Burntisland businesses, community and volunteers who make sure we can provide a warm welcome and tasty meal.

The café is also a place where people can get access to information, advice and encouragement. Two folks from the Community Social Work team come along fortnightly; we've all really enjoyed getting to know them. It's a great place for them to let folks know what's going on, a space to fill out forms, and signposting to the right place has led to great outcomes for folks.

Bridgehead Healing team come along regularly too, and folks can enjoy a hand massage, encouragement through hearing more of what is in the Bible or there is an opportunity for some prayer. They set up tables in a corner of the hall and it's a drift in service that's much appreciated by some of our visitors.

We've been pleased to welcome visitors to the town as well. One day last year we had a large group of visitors arrive – very wet – and very thankful to have found our sign on the High Street directing them to the halls. They were from a charity based in Kirkintilloch, through in Burntisland for a summer trip, and we were very pleased to feed them soup and crumble.

It was so wet that many of our regulars had decided not to venture out therefore we had lots of soup and crumble on offer. We laugh still about the order for 'sixteen crumbles please'. Not the usual size of order we expect in the kitchen all at once. We were very grateful for the dishwasher that day...

We are thankful too for those folks who come along and donate the cost and more of the food they enjoy. Your generous donations help greatly. Most of all we enjoy your company.

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Burntisland Primary School

Nursery

This term the Main nursery are learning about how pizzas are made and where the different toppings come from, to try and teach them about food miles and the work put into their food. They are also discovering the local services. They have decided to continue the visits to the local care home, Linksview, where they help and interact with the elders, doing things like potting flowers. They have a weekly visit to the forest, where they learn about nature and wildlife and when it gets warmer, they will also have the choice to go to the beach.

The Bungalow nursery children are learning how to take care of the environment by looking after and feeding the birds in the garden. They have made and hung out bird feeders using pinecones, lard and seeds to attract and feed birds. By observing the colours and patterns on the birds, the children have been using a chart to identify and record the different types of birds.

Primary 1 are learning how to add and subtract in Numeracy. They will be learning about time, measure and counting in 2s, 5s, and 10s. Their topic this term is fairytales. They will be reading classic fairytales and then creating their own; developing crucial writing skills. For Health and Wellbeing, they are focusing on the 'Cool in school' subject as well as how they are all unique. They are learning about the artist Yayoi Kusama. In P.E they will be developing their ball skills.

This term **Primary 2** have been learning about place value in numeracy. They will be working with tens and ones for their place value as well as looking at strategies to help their addition and subtraction knowledge. For literacy they are focusing

on onomatopoeia, alliteration and adjectives. For writing they will be using talk for writing, they learn a short story then change a few key features when they come to writing their own version. For P.E they have been practicing their gymnastics skills. This term primary 2 have their sharing their learning assembly. For their topic they will be learning about the human body. During that topic they will be concentrating on the human skeleton, heart, lungs and skin.

This term **Primary 3** are doing creative writing to develop their knowledge on a beginning, middle and end of a story. They will also be developing how to describe a character, as well as looking at different poetry and writing their own poems. In Numeracy, they will be focusing on addition and subtraction, multiplication and division. For Health and Wellbeing they will be looking at how to eat healthy, stay healthy and keep their minds healthy.

Primary 4 are doing the Iron Age as their project. They are learning to use speech marks and commas correctly in their sentences in their Report Writing. For Numeracy, they are doing multiplication and division problems. In Health and Wellbeing, they are developing ball skills through netball and basketball.

In Health and Wellbeing this term, we will be focussing on keeping our minds and brains healthy and in PE, we are learning how to play Volleyball.

Primary 5

This term P5/6 are moving on to learn about the Industrial Revolution as their topic. They have been working to improve their division skills in numeracy as well as a focus on money and problem solving. In literacy they have been learning how to use

direct speech and how to write 5-part stories and will look at journalistic and dialogue writing. Across the classes, children will be developing key skills in

sports such as volleyball and rugby. For outdoor learning they will be going on explorations to the woods and also to the beach. Coming up this term they have their sharing the learning assembly about Industrial Revolution

In term three, **Primary 6** are developing their multiplication and division skills along with learning about shape. Their focus for HWB will be substance misuse and for P.E, they will be focusing on hockey and football. For their topic this term, they will be learning about The Titanic. They will be linking this project to their literacy and drama.

This is a busy term for **Primary 7**. They have been continuing their topic on WWII. They are learning about the breakout of the war and fighting on the western front. They have been practising ceilidh dancing for the upcoming transition event, where they will attend a ceilidh with the other schools in the cluster. As well as that, they will be doing lots of outdoor learning, going on walks and learning about nature.

This term, they are also entering the Speaker's Competition; a popular event where they give a talk on a subject of their choice. They will also be taking part in the Burns Competition where they learn and perform a Burns poem. For Health and Wellbeing, they will be developing their understanding of substance misuse and its impact on individuals. In numeracy, they are learning about how to use and understand charts.

I have always been grateful for the continued support I have received during the last ten years, it has always much appreciated and never taken for granted.

I am still in post until the end of this term and will continue to be committed, dedicated, and connected to the BPS Family throughout and I know the Leadership Team will continue to give their all to ensuring continuity for the school and wider community.

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Burntisland Playgroup



We normally use this space to tell everyone all about our adventures however as the time is now to apply for a space for your child to attend Burntisland Playgroup we thought it would be better to tell you more about Playgroup.

Was your child born between 1st March 2021 and 28th of February 2022?

If so you can apply to us for a place for your child at Burntisland Playgroup.

Who are Burntisland Playgroup?

Burntisland Playgroup is a registered Scottish Charity, who has offered early education and childcare to Burntisland and surrounding areas for over 50 years. We work in partnership with Fife Council who offers funding per child when your child attends our setting from the term after they turn 3 years old. Within this partnership, Fife Council also supports us by supplying us with a peripatetic teacher who visits every 3 weeks and with access to courses for our staff to complete to ensure their knowledge and understanding is up to date. They also provide us with a development officer and we have an annual visit with our Quality Improvement Team to ensure we are offering the children in our care the support and learning that a Fife Council nursery would provide. We are pleased to say we have very positive experiences with all the support offered from Fife Council.

What are the Playgroup opening hours?

Our operating hours are 8.45am until 2.45pm Monday to Friday, term time and we are based in the Toll Community Centre.





Who works for Burntisland Playgroup?

The Playgroup operates under a parent committee and is a living wage employer. We employ 3 full time staff members, 2 part time staff members and 2 relief staff who have contracted hours to ensure that your children get to know them before they are called in as relief.

Are you the same as nursery?

Yes! We operate in the same way as a nursery. We follow the same curriculum and we have the same qualifications as nursery staff. We are a smaller setting with a maximum of 24 children in our yearly intake. We have access to a large hall, our own toilets and free flow access into a secure garden. Our children all have their own Personal Learning Journals which documents your child's learning that takes place in the playgroup. We use our local community and visit the woods and the beach as well as the train station, recycling area, shops and traveling around the town on the small bus.

Will accepting a place at Burntisland Playgroup effect my chances of a space in the School for P1?

No. Every family has to apply for a space in

their chosen School online at Fife Council in the January before they are due to attend in the August. We have been very fortunate, that most of our parents choose to keep their children with us until they attend Primary One. We have never had a child refused a space from the local school or nursery. There is always the option to move your child to any other setting. Your child's funding travels with them and as a parent it is entirely up to you where your child should attend.

Is there a waiting list? And can my child attend prior to their funded session?

We currently have spaces for this session (August 2023–June 2024) and the next (August 2024–June 2025).

There is the option to apply for a "fee paying" space from 2 years 10 months. There is a cost for this space and we do ask that you use us for at least one term of your child's funded placement.

I have already applied for a space at nursery, can I apply for Playgroup?

Of course you can! Some families aren't aware that we are here so even if you have already applied for nursery you can still contact us to discuss what we can offer and if you feel it is what you are looking for then it can be easily resolved. Your child's funding follows your child wherever you choose to enrol them.



The twinning adventure last summer was the amazing trip we had hoped and planned for. Our twinners had a tremendous time making new friends and establishing social links that will stand the communities of Burntisland and Flekkefjord in good stead for many years

Flying from Dyce to Stavanger we were welcomed by all the Norwegian twinners eager to meet their Scottish counterparts. It is immediately apparent that the twinners are going to have a great time as they start to chat and laugh at our attempts to speak Norwegian replying in their perfect English.

At Flekkefjord Council Chambers we meet the families who will be looking after us all. We also had a surprise visit from members of the Burntisland Sailing Club. Flekkefjord town has with great civic pride as the Council logo adorns flag poles down the street and even the drain covers in the road. Is a delight to wander through the narrow streets of the Old Town. All around the town centre are old bicycles painted bright colours and fitted with flower filled planters.



Every twinner to ever visit Flekkerfjord will ride the Flekkefjordbanen. This is the decommissioned railway that runs along the valley. The line now carries adapted tandem peddle bikes which are great fun.

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Burntisland Sailing Club celebrates its 70th Anniversary!

Celebrating 70 years of fun on the water, Burntisland Sailing Club will be hosting activities through the year to commemorate this major milestone.

The Club started in the harbour soon after the war in 1954 to encourage "affordable sailing" in Fife through dinghy sailing. During generations of constant activity it has grown in strength to the present day with a sizeable number of cruising and racing yachts.

Among the major milestones in BSC's history have been a new clubhouse built by the members in 1984, putting pontoons in the East Basin with the assistance of generous grant funding in 2018 (bringing 16 boats off moorings into the shelter of the East Basin and its all weather access) and recently, 20 more berths on pontoons funded and built by a massive effort from the members in 2022.

All this has enabled the Club to go from strength to strength, last year engaging in more racing than any other sailing club on the Forth. In addition, not only have members cruised to many of the harbours in and around the East coast but also sailing as far as Flekkefjord in Norway. A recent association with the newly formed Black Rock Coastal Rowing Club will see a new skiff rowing from the harbour through 2024.

Right in the heart of Burntisland, the Club is in the most accessible deep water harbour on the Firth of Forth, a cruising ground with the reputation of being one of the best in Britain, with many historically significant, welcoming and picturesque harbours within a day's sailing of Burntisland.

Sailing is in the town's heritage and BSC provides affordable adventure, company,



social activities, the means to gain new skills and much more, centred around the sea and sailing.

Sailing boats always need crew and BSC is offering free opportunities to try racing and cruising this year in a variety of yachts, with those who want to sail being matched up with boats and skippers needing crew. Mentoring in seamanship and navigation skills continues through the year.

To help this, the modest membership fees have been put on hold for a year for new members and there will even be free tea and biscuits on race nights!

Once Spring arrives please be careful if using strimmers and other garden machinery as hedgehogs will not run from noise but instead ball up so please always check long areas of grass and bushes first.

It is so rewarding making them well again to be released and seeing them be released back to the area where they came from is the best part. We've had quite an upgrade since those early days and now have a dedicated hospital room thanks to everyone's support.

All our fundraising efforts go straight to the hedgehogs care and we are always looking for new ideas or crafters to make things for us to sell

money for us to go ahead and buy a large much needed incubator for the very poorly hedgehogs that come into our care.



Burntisland Harbour Access Trust



After a year of rumours, we at last have an idea of what the Forth Green Freeport might look like in Burntisland. The picture above comes from the launch of the Freeport proposal – at the time of writing, it is just that, a proposal. The yellow triangles are the floating base units for wind turbines, presumably built elsewhere and awaiting their towers and blades. These will come in by ship for final assembly on the jetty.

Forth Ports Ltd (FP) own most, if not all, of the land over which the Burntisland freeport will be developed and could acquire ownership over the seabed on which the "T" jetty will be constructed.

The proposals have the potential to bring economic development and employment to the Burntisland Community. But the Burntisland Community will be concerned about road traffic through the town, fair wages for those employed (no advantage taken of relaxed freeport legislation), the potential damage to the East Dock by the possibility of filling it in to create more space, any compromise to the tourist potential of Burntisland (recreational boating, fishing, diving, camping, to name but a few), and last and not least community access to the breakwater.

At the open meeting with representatives from Forth Ports and Fife Council, hosted by the Burntisland Community Council on 20th November, we took the opportunity to make some alternative suggestions of which the following have been endorsed by the Community Council:

- The proposed jetty for assembling floating offshore turbines be run out from the West, rather than the East, Dock. This would concentrate industrial activity in areas historically used for such activity.
- Consideration be given to developing the onshore area of the East Dock, with public access restored. The area could be developed to improve existing activities—coastal freight, offshore servicing, ferrying, recreational sailing, excursions to the islands, whale watching etc.

These activities could be complemented with other recreational and tourist facilities – Recreational Vehicle (RV) park, heritage museum, sea bathing, floating restaurant, solar park, natural history, boat park, dive training etc and, of course, recreational walking and cycling.

 The next phase of the Edinburgh tram network is to be a North/South line with the north terminal at Granton. A restored Burntisland all weather ferry slip would allow the revival of the historical Granton/Burntisland ferry service. Combined with the Active Transport routes already created, or proposed, for Burntisland, the station area could be developed as an Active Transport hub.

On the issue of public access, BHAT has sought legal advice and we have now received our lawyers' report. This advice has been expensive and we are very grateful to those who contributed to our "Open the Gates Legal Fund" appeal, without which it wouldn't have been possible. The opinion is that public rights of access have been established through more than twenty years' unfettered access by members of the public. It seems likely that rights under the "Right to Roam" legislation may also apply and we've discovered that an obligation to provide community access applied when the foreshore and seabed were sold for the building of the East Dock and that these conditions still apply.

We now intend to pursue the reinstatement of public access directly with all parties: Forth Ports, Fife Council and the Scottish Government. We firmly believe that this can be achieved without compromising the creation of the freeport. You can read the full report on our website: www.burntislandharbour.co.uk

At the same time we are seeking more information and pressing for further opportunity for community input, which in our view is long overdue. 

Craigencalt Rural Community Trust

This winter has been really wet, leaving paths muddy and slippery, and the fields so soggy. At Craigencalt, hare and deer abound and now the beautiful stoat in ermine white can be spotted.

However, once the snowdrops and daffodils can be seen peeping through the ground we know that Spring is just around the corner. The first big event in our calendar is the annual Spring Walking Festival. This has been running since 2014 and the event is welcomed and anticipated by many people who enjoy getting out in the fresh air and meeting new folk.

The festival will start on 20th March and run until 10th April covering part of the Easter break. Walks in the local area are rich in both beautiful coastline and countryside. There is always a good choice of walks, varying in length, difficulty, and interest. All are welcome and the event is free but we do ask people to register the walks of their choice as this helps with our organisation.



Our description of walks will be available on the Craigencalt Trust website by the end of February and posted on noticeboards too. So if you enjoy getting out in the fresh air and meeting new folk, the Walking Festival is definitely for you.

The annual 'Come and Try Day' event at Kinghorn Loch is to be held on Saturday 4th May, from 1-4 pm. The loch may be small but it is full of activity all year round, and this event gives everyone the chance to come along and try something new. There is choice, with sailing, canoeing, rowing and radio-controlled yacht clubs in attendance. If you prefer a quieter pastime there is also bird watching or just enjoy a walk around with the dog.

The Trust is in its thirteenth year and has completed many projects during that time to provide a paths network and to improve facilities and safety at the loch. Our current projects are making good progress. We are seeking to further improve safety at the loch. As more people take up open-water swimming, we are putting in a ladder while also improving landing for canoes and paddleboards. The bridge at the loch outlet is being made fully accessible too. Both projects are fully funded and with help from volunteers, work should soon commence.

The Rock Rest Project (pictured) is nearly finished. The resting place among the rocks with access path, rockery and fences is complete, and at a workday in December the granite seat was installed. A picnic table on the lower platform will follow soon with sympathetic planting and bird feeders. It is encouraging to see that people are already enjoying this new area, tucked away in the bank of the old quarry.

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

New Year, new determination to be in nature more! A big mental health blip took me by surprise a few months ago and made me realise I had stopped making time to do many of the things which make me, me. Being in nature is my biggest thing of all, not just walking through it on my way to the shops but being in it with the express purpose of looking closely, absorbing, revelling. I used to take part in lots of different volunteer counts for the British Trust for Ornithology and other conservation charities and I loved it. The counting itself—being out, looking, noting down what I saw. But also inputting the data afterwards, knowing I was part of a big network of people around the country, the world even, all contributing to conservation science.

Children were born, life got fuller, I unintentionally stopped more and more of these activities. My closest to home was a monthly WeBS (Waterbird Survey) count of the Binn Pond. Just a small site, the pond on the west side of the Binn. Not a large variety of waterbirds, not large numbers, but if you sit and wait there's always something.

Through winter there are often Teal, Britain's smallest duck, very shy so listen for their chiming calls, like little silvery bells. Sometimes also larger ducks, Wigeon, with gold-streaked foreheads. In spring Little grebes nest on the pond and year round you may see Coot, Mallard, Moorhen, Heron. I was dismayed to discover I hadn't count the pond for nearly two years so on 14th January I fixed that.

Starting from our home I decided to take note of all the birds I saw and heard for the duration of my walk. In the hedges and shrubs of our garden were House sparrow, Coal tit, Blue tit, Blackbird, Robin, Starling, Woodpigeon, Feral Pigeon. Eight species as I walked down the steps and along the garden path. As I walked along Ferguson Place Jackdaws were 'chack, chack'ing at each other from the chimney pots. When we had to have our chimney rebuilt I asked the stonemason to embed wire mesh about two feet down inside the stack, so Jackdaws could still nest in there but without their sticks - and chicks falling down into our blocked off fireplaces. Carrion crows were on the roof of the old school. I looked up into the branches of a silver birch in the nursery garden in case the Waxwing I saw there four days earlier was back. It wasn't.

In the air over the school were Herring gulls and Black-headed gulls. I looked down into the Toll/Cot Burn where sometimes there's a Grey wagtail or Mallard ducks but neither today. A Coal tit or Great tit strongly sang 'teacher teacher' in the evergreens of the first house past the burn. The Binn glowed in the low winter sun. A Buzzard was up there and Magpies were in trees and on rooftops as I walked up Cowdenbeath Road. Out of the town, distillery wall on my left, a Heron flew across the road ahead of me, gliding like a pterosaur. Landed in the tussocky field and started slow-stalking along as it watch for small mammals, frogs, toads. In olden times people thought the shrill shriek of a Heron at night was a witch overhead on her broom. If they saw the Heron fly across the moon, long legs sticking broomstick-like behind, it may have reinforced the idea.

Cross the road and into the blissful calm which descends the moment you step into the wood. Halfway up the steep bit, where it flattens for a short way with the old quarry on your left, are a handful of tall pines. They were alive with movement so I spent a while with binoculars and ears out. Blue tits, up to all sorts together. I didn't spot Goldcrests, Britain's smallest bird, but I felt sure they were there.

At the same time, on the woodland floor ahead of me, a Wren, Britain's second smallest, teensy tail sticking bolt upright. Into that beautiful open meadow where three Chaffinches flew over into the wood. A Rook flapped past, bald grey beak and face shining light grey against black feathers – black with a metallic purple sheen if you get a good view in the right light.

And arriving at Binn pond. As often there seemed to be almost nothing there, just two Coots swimming in the open water. Half an hour later, having stood quietly in various different places (a short way upslope, silhouette camouflaged a bit by the trees, is good.) and listened and watched carefully, I counted two Coots, two Wigeon, six Teal, two Mallard and one Heron.

Onwards, up the old holloway so muddied by cattle, out onto the quiet country road behind the Binn. East along Standing Stanes Road, meandering along farm tracks here and there for sweeping views to the Lomonds. Onto the winding track which leads eventually down past the horses and the Binn village. Down through the woods to emerge opposite the golf course. From pond to home, I had also seen Raven, Redwing, Dunnock, Pheasant and heard but hadn't seen a Skylark. Twenty seven bird species in total and probably plenty missed. I also saw five Roe deer, one Hare, and sadly one dead Badger on the verge.

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
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
